Bill S-213, which passed both the Senate and House of Commons unanimously, to make July 27 Korean War Veterans Day. The Korean War began June 25, 1950. By the time the Korea Armistice Agreement was signed on July 27, 1953, more than 26,000 Canadians had served in Korea and 516 Canadians had lost their lives in service.

Canada, plus 20 other countries, went to the aid of South Korea and turned back the scourge of communism. About 7,000 Canadians continued to serve in the tense theatre of operations between the signing of the Armistice and the end of 1955, with some Canadian troops remaining until 1957.

In 2013, the Government of Canada marks the 60th anniversary of the Korean War Armistice with events in both Korea and Canada on the newly established Korean War Veterans Day on July 27, in honour of all Canadians who served in the Korean War, and those who served on duties in Korea following the signing of the Military Armistice Agreement that ended the war, on July 27, 1953.

On Sunday, July 26, 2015, I was privileged to attend the Korean War Veterans Parade in front of the Alberta Provincial Legislative Building, as I have done several years before. I am sad to observe the number on parade was getting less each year. There are no more WWI veterans alive in Canada today and the number of WW2 veterans is limited. The date for the 2016 Korean Veteran parade has not been announced as yet. Good chance it will be on Sunday, July 24. Please make an effort to attend the parade and pay our respect.

"Gutting of our militia has no end" This is the headline on June 28, 2016 on Christie Blatchford's comment in the National Post. Ms. Blatchford has been a strong critic of the Federal Government over their treatment or mistreatment of the military. 

CANADIAN MILITARY READING

Rick Hillier - A Soldier First, August 2010, Amazon.ca



General (retired) Rick Hillier wrote about his road from a Newfoundland lad to become Canada's Chief of Defence Staff. Hillier uses plain language and can truly relate to soldiers under his command. There are politicians and senior officers that he thinks were not doing their job. He was frustrated by the bureaucratic process within the Canadian system to get anything done, whether it is the recruiting process, buying a replacement part for equipments, or simply awarding a medal for a deserving soldier in theatre. Hillier suggests that compared to the military in the US, which by law must be 85% ready for deployment, that is fully equipped and trained, it would be a "miracle if Canadian military is 25% ready for deployment. Hillier spent two years as an exchange general with the US Army and was attached with the III Corp as the Deputy Commanding General at Fort Hood which has over100,000 soldiers within the base.

I had the privilege of working under General Hillier in Bosnia Herzegovina

when he was the Commander of the Multinational Division NW. He was a great commander and you will through his book, learn how to be a good leader.



CANADIAN GEAR

C7A1 ASSAULT RIFLE





The C7A1 assault rifle is an improved version of the basic C7 combat rifle, incorporating a low-mounted optical sight. It is a Canadian adaptation of a U.S. firearm known as the M16A1E1. The C7A1 eliminates the carrying handle of the C7 and substitutes an optical sight. The weapon is equipped with a 3.5x optical sight, which is mounted in place of the carrying handle.

C7A1 rounds are 5.56 x 45 NATO standard. The weapon has an effective range of 400 metres and a rate of fire of 700 to 940 rounds per minute. Along with the optical sight, optional attachments include the M203A1 40mm grenade launcher, the AN PAQ 4 Laser pointer and the Image Intensification Night Sight (Kite sight). It has been in service with the Army since 1986.









What's Out There?

Sukhoi PAK FA (Russia)

The Sukhoi PAK FA is the replacement of Mig-29 Fulcrum and Su-27 Flanker. It is designed to directly compete with F-22 Raptor and F-35 Lightning II. This stealth multi-role fighter with a length of 22 meters and with a maximum speed of 2.45 mach or 1,615 mph was put into service in 2013. One thousand units are projected to



be built by 2020 and a unit will cost \$100 million. Its main weapon is a 30mm GSh-30-1 gun and 10 missiles.

Compared to Canada's F-18 and the proposed purchase of the Super Hornet, the Sukhoi-PAK FA will be like a Lamborghini to a Ford Focus
