President's Comments

Battle of Queenston Heights

On behalf of EUSI, I attended the Battle of Britain Parade at 408 THS Hanger at CFB Edmonton on September 15. In addition to members of 408 Squadron, three other Cadet Units were on parade. Weather was great, for a change, and the 4 Griffins did a fly pass was also stunning. The Reviewing Officer was BGen(retired) Bill Buckham, who remains active within the RAF community.

Members of EUSI have been speakers for the Historica Canada, Memorial Project for several years now. We are especially busy with speech engagements just before Remembrance Day. I spoke at the Edmonton Desk and Derrick Club on September 18. I had no idea this club has been around since 1959 and all members are female, retired or still employed



business executives in various industries but mainly in the petroleum industry. It is parallel to the Petroleum Club in Kingsway Avenue in Edmonton, which was demolished two years ago. For those members not residing in Edmonton, this is for your information.

It was on Halloween Day, 31 October 2006 that I landed in Oslo, Norway to meet with the Norwegian Ambassador to African Union (AU) to plea for continuous support for the AU operation for implementing the Peace Accord in Darfur, Sudan. As the Deputy Commander for Task Force Addis Ababa, a Canadian Contingence tasked to support the AU operation, it was my duty to ensure logistic support is available. The AU peacekeepers were running out of clean water and fuel. Soldiers were eating uncooked food for lack of cooking fuel. I bought two goats for my staff and the meat were cured under the sun, but not Canada meat inspected. Bills were unpaid and private contractors were cutting off logistic supports. When I landed in Oslo, it was dark, windy and cold. I had on summer clothes for African weather. Fortunately, I got the commitment I needed.

When I completed my AU deployment eight months later, I had lose 30 pounds of my body weight, having to fight against bouts of Amoebic Dysentery and other forms of viral infection. These are the environmental hazards that soldiers took upon themselves as a part of the job on behalf of Canada.

So, on the eves of Remembrance Day, I ask you all to thank our serving soldiers and veterans for the sacrifices they made in order to preserve our Canadian values and promote democracy all over the world. And most of all, thank them with "real" appreciations and not empty words by telling our government to treat our wounded veterans and their family with dignity and endorse the compensation they deserve.







I know, I didn't see this coming either . . .




CANADIAN MILITARY READING

A SOLDIER FIRST: BULLETS, BUREAUCRATS AND POLITICS OF WAR

I first introduced this book about six years ago. Since Hillier, Canada has had a number of CDS. I dare say, Hillier is my voted best CDS who served Canada. He was instrumental in procuring the C-177 Globemaster transport plane after it became apparent we needed the plane to have that edge for the Afghanistan War. He put his job on the line when he approached PM Paul Martin. The entire acquisition project for having the plane in active service was less than a year. Unheard of in the Canadian bureaucratic public works department, and never happened again. Just look at the delay and the mess with the CF 18 project. To experience the kind of respect for our soldiers, Canada needs a CDS who is not politically correct and put the well being of the military ahead of his own career. That kind of leadership is lacking right now.



A Soldier First provides considerable insight into the man who so publicly represented the Canadian military for three years. The book covers the general's complete career, from officer cadet to four-star general. In fact, of 23 chapters, only the last eight recount his time as CDS. The first 15 chapters, however, contain themes that help account for how he was shaped as a soldier: an outstanding officer and a leader of considerable prowess. Woven throughout his account is his obvious love of soldiering, and the deep admiration he has always felt for the men and women in uniform who served alongside him throughout his career. His determination as CDS to showcase these soldiers, sailors, airmen, and airwomen, and to explain to Canadians what they mean to the country, reflects this devotion.
