Recently, the Department of Veteran Affairs held a discussion group in Edmonton at the Delta Hotel to explore what concerns our veterans, in particular, lump sum payment versus a monthly compensation, and any other concerns. My personal opinion is that for majority of the EUSI readers, the matter of lump sum payment/monthly allowance does not affect them as most are older and the subject matter mostly affects younger or recent veterans who participate in combat in Afghanistan.

However, the matter of clawing back the military pension once the individual receives CPP continues to be a concern for military and RCMP veterans. Many of us have lost income for many years because of this unfair policy. For some serving members who are nearing their retirement age, this is also a concern and affecting their decision to retire or hang on for a few more years. There were some actions to petition the parliament to address this unfair policy. However, in the last few years, little has been done and conveniently omitted by the government to address this matter while attention has been focused on lump sum payments or not. 2018 Symposium

The 2018 Symposium will be held on a Saturday sometime between end of September and beginning of October. The exact date will be determined by availability of invited panelist and decided upon by the board of directors. The theme of the 2018 symposium will be on Canada's defence policy against a nuclear attack and damage control to address environmental contamination and destruction of infra structures. Does Canada even have policies to address these issues? I saw the panic in Hawaii when a false alarm was raised, despite an alarm system in place for years for nuclear attack. It is the aim of the symposium to stimulate discussions and dialogues in an area that is so critical to the well being of our national security. 

In response to the recent British accusation of political assassination, a spokesperson with the Russian Foreign Ministry, through its state operated media, announced that no one threatens the most powerful nuclear country with an ultimatum. So, what does Russia has in Nuclear weapons that makes the Siberian Bear think she is invincible?

RUSSIA has just completed a major nuclear exercise, testing its land, sea and air weapons from all four corners of the continent-spanning nation.

But one test stood out.

The missile rocketed out from Russia's Plestek Cosmodrome, passing above the atmosphere before plummeting back to earth some 5800km away — striking targets in the Kura test range.

"A squad of the Strategic Missile Force fired a Topol intercontinental ballistic missile from Plesetsk towards the Kura test range in Kamchatka," the Russian Defense Ministry is quoted in <u>the state-owned TASS News</u> Agency.

The statement also said Russian President Vladimir Putin was directly involved in the multifaceted exercise,

and personally controlled the launch of all four of the missiles.
