
Defence Policy Initiative Monitoring

"The (US) Navy to date has not recognized that the past and future employment constructs and incidents do not seem to justify the cost of the amphibious ships we are procuring. Larger, cheaper platforms provide inherent survivability through physical size and allow the Navy to procure more ships..." By "larger, cheaper" the author means merchant ships and merchant ship-type (e.g., the US Expeditionary Transfer Docks). Could the Royal Canadian Navy benefit from similar thinking and build multi-role capability, whether tending towards 'weapon trucks' (i.e., containerized weapons embarked in simple ship) or auxiliary (logistics, humanitarian assistance/disaster relief) into merchant ship hulls?

These two articles are from different but related perspectives on Microsoft's relationship with Chinese universities. There was hope in the 1990s and early 2000s that China was moving toward an open society as designed by Deng Xiaoping during his leadership during the late 1980 and early 1990s. It was a time of hope and optimism. Since Xi's ascendency to President in 2012, China has returned to a much darker period and now leads the most repressive regime in recent Chinese history including offensive actions against its neighbours, land grabs such as in the South China Seas, and economic warfare such as seen in Canada with canola or Australia in regard to coal. The ones who have suffered most are their own citizens especially in Tibet and East Turkestan (Xinjiang province) where China has embarked on a campaign of cultural genocide which includes concentration camps for minorities.

The articles show the difficulty for any Western technology firm. Agreements and relationships were made during a period of increased trust and improving relationships with a country looking to the future. Since the appointment of President Xi, China has returned to a much darker past. Its own people are now increasingly subject to decreased human rights and even fewer opportunities to seek redress against the wishes of the Communist Chinese Party (CCP). The biggest losers in China's recent changes have been the Chinese people themselves. Whistle blowers, human right activists, artists, religious community members of virtually all faiths, lawyers, and critics of President Xi are all falling afoul the Chinese 'legal system.'

Most Western companies entered the Chinese market during a time of increased openness and hope for a much better future. The bookstores in the West were filled with books focusing on the great benefits that could be gained by investing and helping China move its economy into the modern world finance

system. Chinese labour was amongst the cheapest in the world, and many companies raced to become the newest partner of a strong emerging market. Who could blame them? Most Western companies did not understand how the malevolent changes by Xi would be used. Western technology offered in good faith has now been perverted by the CCP into an often all-pervading surveillance system. It evokes Prime Minister Churchill's comments on "perverted science." Does any Western business entity really wish to be known for the development of instruments of cultural genocide, or be part of the creation of a truly Orwellian surveillance system? Does it mean forgetting one's own principles and that of your own country to support a regime that is immoral and devoid of ethics? It is a question that Western businesses must ask when they decide to enter the Chinese market.

Washington Tries a Softer Approach in Anti-Huawei Campaign

This article signals a major change in US policy with regard to the use of Chinese equipment in 5G networks may be underway. Up to this point the US had been demanding its allies invoke a total ban on Huawei (and probably ZTE) for national 5G networks but Europe seemed disinclined to adopt complete bans. However, on 11 April, the US Secretary of State's lead praised German efforts "At this point we're looking for governments to adopt security standards like we're seeing in Germany."

The Germans had stated that "Systems may only be sourced from trustworthy suppliers whose compliance with national security regulations and provisions for the secrecy of telecommunications and for data protection is assured. Network traffic must be regularly and constantly monitored for any abnormality and, if there is any cause for concern, appropriate protection measures must be taken."

The US view now is that the PRC suppliers are unlikely to meet these standards. France and Japan appear to be following a similar route. Canada's Cyber-Security Director, Scott Jones, is currently reviewing Canadian measures; it is likely that Canada will use a similar system as adopted by our key allies.

2019 Update: Cyber Threats to Canada's Democratic Process

This is an update of Communications Security Establishment's 2017 report on the cyber threats to Canada. Almost every major Canadian media outlet commented on the update this week, but this commentary will rely on the actual report itself. It is short and very well explained.

Its central findings are that it very likely that Canadian voters will encounter some form of foreign cyber interference related to the 2019 federal election. While the paper-based election machinery is safe we should expect attempts to sway voters' decisions, with a particular emphasis on polarizing issues.

The report contains some excellent examples of past bizarre Russian misinformation efforts: One campaign in September 2017 attempted to replicate the political discord surrounding protests in the American National Football League in a Canadian context by promoting headlines such as "The Canadian Football League is Protesting THEIR OWN National Anthem!" and "Canadian NHL Player CONSIDERING 'Taking a Knee' During U.S. Anthem."

In 2016, false information appeared on social media about a "failed Canadian raid" on Russian separatist positions in Ukraine, alleging that 11 Canadian military personnel had been killed. Users shared an English language version of this fictional report over 3,000 times on Facebook. A similar false report about three Canadian soldiers dying after their vehicle hit a landmine in Ukraine spread on pro-Russian websites in May 2018. The authors of the false reports likely intended to portray Canadian troops – who are present in Ukraine in non-combat roles – as reckless and ineffective in their operations.

There was, regrettably, no mention of Chinese activities nor does CSE propose the more aggressive responses undertaken by our allies such as cyber counterattacking election meddlers or ordering social media to actively cull misinformation. The report remains an excellent short read, nevertheless.

New Zealand Navy's biggest vessel ready for launch in South Korea

This article is cause for some reflection. But not to make build-time and capability comparisons between New Zealand's AOTEAROA and the Canadian Protecteur-class replenishment oilers (AOR) building under the Joint Support Ship (JSS) project. There is an issue in the building of a naval ship, whether combatant or auxiliary, in a foreign yard versus a state's own yard. Having a national capability to build and to refit and repair ships, in Canada's case on both coasts, is critical.

One could guess that the argument was made during planning for JSS that Canada should send the work to the South Koreans or Norwegians instead of to Canadian yards, busy as they were to be and with a

backlog of naval and Coast Guard ships to build. But what needs to be asked is that, given regional dynamics, what are the risks inherent in sending one's oilers to South Korea – in the case of the New Zealand ship presumably by a rather wide route around the East and South China Seas – for extended dock working periods every few years over the next three to four decades? Also, given the current levels of stability in the Korean peninsula, what are the risks inherent in having to leave them there, out of the water, for a year out of every four to five years? Can anyone say with confidence that this risk can be quantified, and has it been costed into the figures being discussed for the New Zealand AOR?

By rebuilding national capacity, Canada is frontloading costs in time and treasure in order to avoid that risk over the 30-year-plus life of the AOR program. There is a security argument there that many people may not have considered.

Though for some years manned submarines will serve well as control vessels for underwater drones. Whatever mix, there needs to be planning for it now. Probably is with the Department of National Defence, but there is not much public discussion and understanding. And certainly nothing from the government of a National Shipbuilding Strategy 2.0 that envisions what the CANSUBFOR will look like and what needs to be done (procurement) to get there.
