





"The new small transports, perhaps based on the oil and gas industry's typical offshore support vessel, could represent a revival of a defunct class of warship..."

The fast transports "were numerous, inexpensive and flexible and, by all accounts, successful."

Yes, 'balanced' navies have been proven to be best, allowing them to carry out a range of national missions with appropriate resources (think "when all you have is a hammer..."), and to be balanced a navy needs various types of ships including small specialized vessels.

Remark: the term "offshore support vessel" used in a naval context, especially when referring to troop landings, is assuredly going to be confusing with the civil understanding of the term which tends to be logistics-focused. The initialism OSV will be uncertain in vessel contact tracking systems.

Interesting, the author's assessment as to what constitutes old age for ships, or at least for merchant ships. Around 20 years? Canadian government fleets, albeit benefitting from capable onboard and dockyard maintenance staff and programs, easily push twice that.

More interesting is the conclusion which a reader can make that the US armed forces may be greatly challenged in getting significant forces deployed overseas in response to a major crisis, what with the state of the US reserve sealift fleet. If Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) deployment plans are dependant on the availability of US resources, that assumption may need checking. The CAF did have a full-time charter vessel once for moving material overseas (and back home). Maybe some arrangement to meet Canadian needs (e.g., multi-role: cargo/vehicle carrier - humanitarian assistance and disaster relief vessel - training ship for naval and Defence civilian seafarers) should now be considered. Certainly the Canadian shipyards are ready to build or convert such ships.

The capability to integrate mine countermeasures into vessels of opportunity (VOO) would be a great force enhancement to the Royal Canadian Navy. Maybe the Naval Reserve Divisions should be issued small vessels ('tenders') again, in addition to their boats (often RHIB - rubber-hull inflatable boats), which could take on a VOO underwater operations role (mine countermeasures, survey, diving support, unmanned underwater/surface vehicle control).



Sale of these guns from the paid off Iroquois-class destroyers makes sense. The guns were newer than the ships (45 years old in the case of HMCS ATHABASKAN when she was paid off) as they had been installed when the class underwent mid-life refits in the mid 1990s. Such sale is not uncommon, and could provide useful capability, or at least parts, to allies and partners.

The flip side of this practice is when used equipment is installed in new-build ships. The Canadian Surface Combatants (CSC) or other ships being built under the National Shipbuilding Strategy may receive radios or weapons or sensors already in use or coming off older ships of the Royal Canadian Navy (or elsewhere. This practice should not be looked upon as a failure of the CSC or any other project, rather, it should be looked upon as smart use of proven, appropriate and available equipment.

Does the Kremlin Have an Alternative?

The article poses an interesting question. This summer saw some of the largest anti-Putin demonstrations since 2011. These most recent demonstrations by the growing opposition are in regard to the municipal elections. The Kremlin Electoral Commission disallowed most real opposition candidates. The elections saw the defeat of many "United Russian" candidates. United Russia is usually known as Putin's own party, despite having "resigned" from the party to become President. Despite the elimination of opposition candidates' people voted against the "Kremlin" choosing to elect hard line communists rather than members of the United Russia.

In recent surveys by the Levada Institute, Putin's popularity has plummeted to a new low of just 32%. Considering his overwhelming control of Russian media, this is not good. Rather than address opposition issues which include things like pension reform, which directly affected his support base, he has chosen to "disqualify" opposition candidates and when further demonstrations occur, send in his personal troops, the National Guard. The trouble this time, his tactics are not working, and demonstrations have become larger and more determined. Putin has no solutions and the citizens of Russia now realize this problem.

Will the current regime survive? Is it possible that the world might see a general collapse especially if there is a major catalyst such as a collapse of the Russian economy already a basket case mainly due to incompetence and corruption as well ongoing sanctions? Time will tell, but it is unlikely to get better.




New C2 being tried: Littoral Combat Force Commander, commanding Littoral Combat Groups.






