




Russian history is filled with stories of the Russian people putting up with abuse...but only for so long.

HMCS Regina dons new 'dazzle' paint ahead of RIMPAC 2020 exercise

A good article, certainly for its sweep. RUSI(NS) understands that the commemorative paint scheme chosen for HMC Ships



*Regina* and *Moncton* is the "Admiralty Disruptive Scheme, D-Day." The scheme was intended and used for the Second World War D-Day landings and was an inshore, littoral, scheme most likely to disrupt ranging from shore batteries. It differs from the First World War dazzle scheme developed by Norman Wilkinson (see: "When the British Wanted to Camouflage Their Warships, They Made Them Dazzle" <u>https://www.smithsonianmag.com/history/when-british-wanted-camouflage-their-warships-they-made-them-dazzle-180958657/</u>). The disruptive scheme is curvy whilst the dazzle scheme is straight lined. There are a number of other disruptive schemes that were in use in the Second World War, e.g., the "Modified Western Approaches Scheme" borne by HMCS *Sackville*, and "Modified Western Approaches Scheme" borne by HMCS *More and World War* "Admiralty Straight Lined Disruptive Scheme" is closest to the dazzle scheme of the First World War but was not used for *Regina* and *Moncton*. Use of the term dazzle therefore conveys an incorrect message when used for those ships. That said, it is a term that probably resonates better with the general readership and was therefore used, it is supposed, by the headline editor. It is appreciated that Mr Coyne wrote 'often referred to as "dazzle" paint,' not implying it was the official term.

There are plans to publish a RUSI(NS) Information Note on the paint schemes. Meanwhile, there are a number of info sources online including the fan blog Camoupedia (<u>https://camoupedia.blogspot.com/</u>).

# To mark the 150th anniversary of a renowned Halifax based infantry regiment, noted Nova Scotian author Leo J. Deveau will give a presentation entitled, *The Princess Louise Fusiliers: 150 Years of Service and Sacrifice*

The Princess Louise Fusiliers (PLF) is a reserve infantry regiment of the Canadian Army, garrisoned in the North Park Armoury in Halifax, Nova Scotia. The Regiment traces its origins to 1749, shortly after the founding of Halifax. The PLF was officially constituted as a part of the Canadian Militia in 1869 and was named the **66th Halifax Volunteer Battalion**. On 14 November 1879, the regiment was named the **66th Battalion "Princess Louise"** Fusiliers, after Princess Louise who was a daughter of Queen Victoria and the consort of the Governor General of Canada. The Regiment was given its present name in 1920. Throughout its history, the Regiment has earned a total of 18 battle honours, and its members have participated in all of Canada's major deployments, including South Africa, the First and Second World Wars, and Afghanistan, as well as in numerous international peacekeeping missions and domestic operations. In 2018, the unit was tasked to develop Assault Pioneer elements. PLF members provided assistance during the New Brunswick spring floods earlier in 2019, and recently provided support to the citizens of Nova Scotia in the recovery efforts following Hurricane Dorian.

Leo J Deveau is a former public librarian, now author, freelance researcher, newspaper columnist, commentator and speaker. He is a director of the Halifax Military Heritage Preservation Society, a member of the Writers' Federation of Nova Scotia, the Royal Nova Scotia Historical Society and the Royal United Services Institute of Nova Scotia. Besides having recently authored *Fideliter The History of the Princess Louise Fusiliers*, which will be released before Christmas 2019, in 2017 he authored *400 Years in 356 Days A Day by Day Calendar of Nova Scotia History* which is now an authorized history resource for junior and senior high school students in Nova Scotia. He is currently conducting research for a book on the life and times of Sandford Fleming when he resided in Halifax between 1864 and 1869. In addition to his writing and research projects, Leo has spent his last three summers conducting city tours for thousands of visitors on the double-decker buses throughout the City of Halifax – he calls it a form of exercise away from a desk! He holds degrees in English Literature (Acadia University) and graduate degrees in Education (Dalhousie University) and Library Information Management (Dalhousie University).
