

To state what should be obvious: maintenance shipyards are a major part of a fleet's readiness.

Whilst the emphasis in the article is on US yards that maintain nuclear-powered aircraft carriers and submarines, the points can be cause for reflection about Canadian yards, especially Her Majesty's Canadian Dockyards Halifax and Esquimalt, that maintain Canadian warships and submarines. The Fleet Maintenance Facilities in HMC Dockyards are significant strategic assets. Care must be taken of their people and equipment. That care is best done by ensuring the facilities remain part of the Department of National Defence.

Lessons here for the Royal Canadian Navy, which for last few decades has been operating less as a North Atlantic escort force and more as a globally-engaged navy. Our frigates are employed more like cruisers, so need to have the equipment (accommodation, communications, air conditioning, etc.) to operate in the oceans of the world.

And recruitment can always be a challenge. Ships sitting alongside in harbour are not good to attract and retain sailors.

Canada has been successfully breaking government ships in Canada without the labour and environmental issues experienced elsewhere in the world. Breaking of naval and Coast Guard ships at Sydney, Nova Scotia, has been a contributor to the local economy. Canada is a signatory of the Basel Convention but has not ratified the Hong Kong Convention.

Colleagues at Marine Recycling Corporation (<u>www.marinerecycling.ca</u>) note that company has three facilities in Canada, responsibly recycling vessels whereby all vessels are rolled out the water using pneumatic air bags, ensuring complete environmental protection and cost efficiency in the process. Their Vancouver Island facility has a large building into which vessels of all sizes are rolled, making it the world's first large-scale indoor vessel recycling facility. They have recently completed some haul outs of vessels for disposal at their facility in Lake Erie (see photo). Canada is a global leader in this field.

"It is the responsibility of leaders at every echelon to prepare their organizations to adapt to and overcome technical and doctrinal surprise in the next conflict. That starts with each organization realizing and admitting that being surprised results directly from our failure to anticipate, our bias, our failure to see how the enemy evolves, and our hubris. It continues with changing our organizational mindset from one that expects predictability and enemy conformity to our vision of the fight to one that expects to be surprise. And, it continues further with a deliberate and sustained program of training and leader development to develop the individual and organizational adaptability to overcome battlefield surprise in future conflicts. As the Army and the joint force prepare for large-scale, multi-domain combat operations, our future success and survival may very well depend on our preparation to adapt to and overcome battlefield surprise."




How the United States Could Lose a Great-Power War



# **Paws Fur Thought**

# Did you know:

Paws Fur Thought (PFT) is a volunteer driven organization that advocates and fundraises to pair service dogs with veterans suffering from PTSD. PFT was founded, in 2013, by Medric and Jocelyn Cousineau.

PFT runs as an initiative of the Nova Scotia/Nunavut Command of the Royal Canadian Legion

PFT major financial supporter is Wounded Warriors Canada & the Order of St George

PFT receives no funding or support from any level of government

It takes between 13 to 18 months to train a puppy from birth to placement

PFT has paired 119 service Dogs from St Johns to Vancouver Island

PFT has another 27 dogs under contract and in various stages of training

It takes approximately \$15-20,000 to train the dog and the handler to the point of meeting Public Access Testing

PFT has been involved in many studies and committees to develop strategies to standardize service dog and provider requirements

Paws successfully fought to end the discriminatory policies in the Tax Act against Psych Service Dog Handlers.

**PTSD Facts in the Veterans Community** 

In 2011 Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) stated they have 14,000 plus active PTSD case files

50% of all veterans are considered treatment resistant by VAC

There is an estimated need for 2,500 service dogs in the veteran community

Currently qualified schools have a combined output of 100 dogs per annum

The need in the first responder community is estimated to be 5 times the size of the veteran community
