"The Navy specified a 'visual-deterrent' appearance for the new vessel, which the design satisfies with a futuristic and 'menacing' faceted hull profile above the waterline."

Leads one to recall Soviet warships bristling with weapons; Italian cruisers with sleek, graceful lines; and the tall pagoda-like superstructures of Imperial Japanese Navy battleships. (Okay, some of us fondly recall the appearance of Royal Canadian Navy 'Cadillacs' when they were first built, but that wasn't a 'threatening" look.) Visual deterrence has not been a major operational requirement for Western navies, and certainly is not a term that has come up in writings about the Royal Canadian Navy. Still, naval types instinctively understand the utility of a ship's appearance as part of the spectrum of 'signalling' national messages. You want to have the properly looking warship sitting off someone's coast when you want that state to pay attention!

RUSI(NS) has written a number of pieces on ship breaking (e.g., "Breaking Up Former Canadian Warships" https://rusi-ns.ca/breaking-up-former-canadian-warships/), what with the Royal Canadian Navy and Canadian Coast Guard ships sent in recent years to the breakers here in Nova Scotia. Further to this developments article, a check was made of the status of Canada's ratification of the Hong Kong Convention (full title "Hong Kong International Convention for the Safe and Environmentally Sound Recycling of Ships, 2009")(HKC). What appears to be the appropriate government website "(Agreement on safe and environmentally sound recycling of ships: Hong Kong Convention" https://www.canada.ca/en/environment-climate-change/corporate/international-affairs/partnershipsorganizations/safe-recycling-ships-hong-kong.html) provides no indication of when ratification might occur. A colleague noted that India has recently signed onto the HKC (see "an a new ship-recycling law help India regain its status as the world's top dismantler of vessels?" https://economictimes.indiatimes.com/industry/transportation/shipping-/-transport/can-a-new-shiprecycling-law-help-india-regain-its-status-as-the-worlds-top-dismantler-ofvessels/articleshow/72918468.cms). Ratification is getting close - it requires China or both Pakistan and Bangladesh for the HKC to be ratified. The HKC is not relevant to Canada or Europe as Canadian breakers operate to compliance and protection requirements more stringent.

Challenges with defence procurement is a bit of a self-inflicted wound. Self, meaning the Canadian electorate and the governments we elected in the last century. "...in 1989, Canada entered a decade of budget cuts and military downsizing which greatly curtailed the availability of recapitalization funding for DND. Without funding, few big procurements were put forward and much recapitalization was deferred (despite identified need). Life extension and modernization programs, rather than replacements, were initiated for major combat fleets, and innovative solutions such as contracted pilot training were launched, in part due to the financial shortfalls. With much less big kit to buy, and amid public service reductions across government, the procurement workforce was reduced by more than half in some instances."

The French translation of Arctic and Offshore Patrol Ship used by the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) is "Navires de patrouille extracôtier et de l'Arctique" (http://www.navy-marine.forces.gc.ca/fr/flotte-unites/npea-multimedia.page?). The name, with its "Arctic and Offshore/extracôtier et de l'Arctique," is so written to emphasize that the ships are deployable both in the Arctic and anywhere globally (likely for coastal/offshore operations). That point was recently emphasized by the Commander RCN in "Canada's new Arctic patrol ships could be tasked with hurricane relief" (https://www.cbc.ca/news/politics/arctic-offshore-patrol-ships-frigates-irving-canadian-navy-1.5404650).

Also, the name of a RCN ship should be written in French as "le NCSM SHIPNAME" rather than "le HMCS SHIPNAME" as NCSM (navire canadien de sa majesté) is French for HMCS (Her Majesty's Canadian Ship). Also, one never writes a definite article before a pronoun.
