Aging hulls, mechanical and electronic systems in the cruisers, all requiring greater maintenance. The oldest of the Ticonderoga-class in active service is about 35 years. That says something about how long a Navy should push retaining ships (implicitly, sailing and not spending inordinate amount of time alongside). At some point the cost of upkeep just does not make it worth holding on to a ship. Our Halifax-class frigates have gone through major modernizations but that was for select systems. For HALIFAX herself, the ship was launched in 1988. Bring on the Canadian Surface Combatants! And as always, it is important that the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) include strong Fleet Maintenance Facilities.

Not that Canada has a (publicly declared) fleet size objective, but the article's point on what to count is interesting. Should advanced drones, particularly large surface and sub-surface ones, be considered as fleet units and so counted? Or should they just be thought of as systems just like the multiple boats and target drones the RCN already has? A decision to think of large drones as fleet units could change public discussion and understanding of what our Navy is and does. One has to figure that planners are already thinking about the effects of large drones on fleet structure and operations.



Other:

Post-Election Thoughts

It is likely that the issues no one talked about during the election will be the major events that will dominate this government's term in office. Foreign affairs and defence were not discussed. So many issues in these areas are now apparent.

Canada is now in a very real quandary of its own making regarding the Arctic. The ongoing lack of effort is finally really going to hurt when the world declares the North West Passage as international waters. The magic lines that Canada has drawn may be meaningless and Canadian laws may hardly make any impact on major powers determined to exploit the Arctic. Russia, China and the US are likely to challenge the status quo shortly. It will be a blow to the Canadian public to see the loss of what everyone accepted as a known fact, that of Canadian sovereignty in our north. In retrospect, Canada has done very little to maintain our sovereignty. Little or no development, virtually no population or infrastructure development, no navigation aids to speak of and very little mapping of the ocean bottom are just some examples of neglect in our North. There have been a number of articles on China's ambitions in both the Arctic and Antarctic. Canada can and will be challenged this decade. The Government may legislate all it wants but we are on very soft ground. Our lack of effort will have hurt us in a manner that we do not fully appreciate as yet.

Russia as an example is building new submarines, armed ice breakers, re-building fourteen military bases, increasing naval and air patrols in the North and even challenging US and Canadian airspace. A Michael Byers' article in regard to the Arctic was missing the whole Russian rearmament

program. Militarization of the North has always been there. Canada just merely put its head in the sand as a method of dealing with the issues.

New fighter aircraft is an issue that will not be easily solved. There is considerable debate whether the F-35 has the necessary "legs" to patrol our part of the continent, and it has but a single engine which while more reliable than past engines is insufficient for such a hostile environment with few airfields suitable for that aircraft. The numbers of airframes for the second largest landmass is inadequate at best. 88 cannot do all that we have tasked the air force to do. These tasks include air defence, NATO missions, training, and maintenance as well as accounting for normal losses. The numbers are hardly larger than that of Finland or Norway. This is hardly the effort of one of the largest economies in the world faced with an increasing number of challenges.

The China challenge will continue in other areas. Our trials with China are just beginning and Canada is woefully unprepared for a hostile player who is willing to conduct directed activities against us. One has to question whether our defence forces are sufficiently robust to deal with a belligerent power. One wonders whether Canada has focused on Russia whilst ignoring the very real threat from China.
