The Canadian Armed Forces and COVID-19 -- May 29 update

Colleagues and partners in defence,

Eleven weeks into this pandemic – many parts of the country are experiencing warmer weather, the curve is flattening, optimism is growing, and as a whole we have made some good progress. Yet we mustn't lose sight of the fact that the fight against COVID-19 is very much still ongoing and the threat it poses is still very real, with the first global wave continuing, and a second wave expected in the coming months.

This threat remains evident in the long-term-care facilities (LTCF) in Ontario and Quebec, where CAF members continue to support on the frontlines.

From the outset of this operation, it was clear that the CAF would be there to provide emergency relief and the necessary operational space for the provinces to develop sustainable, provincially sourced solutions. Since then, we're pleased that three facilities in Quebec have stabilized and CAF personnel have transitioned out of them. As the situation fluctuates by facility, the Government has received requests for assistance from both Ontario and Quebec to extend our work. In Ontario we have committed to extending our support in five facilities until June 12th. Quebec has requested our support until mid-September. The Federal Government is currently reviewing this request.

As long as we operate in these facilities, we'll continue to take all proper precautions including taskspecific training and the proper use of personal protective equipment (PPE). As of Thursday, there are 40 active cases of COVID-19 among CAF members deployed in the long-term care facilities, 15 in Ontario and 25 in Quebec. We will continue to release these numbers daily from Monday-Friday on the <u>CAF COVID Webpage</u>.

You are aware of reporting this week concerning observations of CAF members deployed to Ontario and Quebec long-term care facilities. As is the case for any deployed operation, Canadian Armed Forces members have an obligation to report their observations as they pertain to the mission. In this context CAF personnel on Op LASER supporting long-term care facilities are required to document and report any observation that could be detrimental to LTCF occupants, their employees, our personnel and to the mission. CAF licensed health care providers are also legally and professionally obliged to report any situations where there are reportable concerns with the professional conduct or practice of an individual health care professional working in a LTCF. As such, in the course of their duties in Ontario and Quebec LTCFs, the CAF's Augmented Civilian Care (ACC) team observed and documented a number of issues relating to the provision of care to residents. The CAF have also shared their observations in general with the managing authorities of the designated LTCFs and the relevant provincial authorities. Authority for any subsequent action in this regard remains the responsibility of provincial authorities and the LTCFs. We continue to proudly serve Canada's most vulnerable populations through these uncertain times and we will continue to do so while exercising the highest standards of conduct and performance.

On Tuesday, DND and the CAF took further action in the fight against COVID-19. Through our Innovation in Defence Excellence and Security (IDEaS) program, we <u>launched a call</u> to innovators across the country for solutions to some of the key COVID-19 challenges Canadians are facing. We're committing \$15 million to fund some of the most promising solutions.

Specifically, we're looking for submissions in three key areas:

- Proposals on how to safely and quickly decontaminate enclosed environments;
- Innovative designs and material to decontaminate PPE and other equipment;
- Data gathering solutions to support the early detection and community-based monitoring of outbreaks.

We're taking proposals until the 23rd of June, and I invite you to share this call with your networks and encourage all those interested to apply on our <u>IDEaS webpage</u>, and help make a difference.

On Wednesday, the CDS and Deputy Minister held a virtual town hall with CAF General Officers, Flag Officers and Executives to discuss business resumption across the organization. We are preparing for the near-term resumption of a range of designated business activities across DND/CAF that were previously suspended/deferred. Our focus through this time will be on ensuring that any and all activities be resumed in a progressive, deliberate, and safe manner, to ensure the ongoing and future operational effectiveness of the CAF while protecting the health, safety and overall wellness of our personnel. This includes putting in place additional measures for our vulnerable personnel, including the prioritization of alternative work arrangements. Each environment has specific business resumption plans, and our near-term focus will be largely on training and recruitment. For instance, the Commander of the Canadian Army recently recorded a <u>podcast</u> to explain how resumption will occur. On Sunday, with heavy hearts, the Royal Canadian Air Force brought Captain Jenn Casey home to Halifax. This was followed by a touching Celebration of Life at CFB Moose Jaw on Thursday. We continue to keep Jenn's family, friends, and coworkers in our thoughts.

I know many of you are interested in updates on the investigations of the Snowbirds and Cyclone accidents. This week we <u>reported</u> that we found parts of the *Stalker-22* fuselage and remains of our fallen. And we expect that preliminary reports concerning the areas of focus for both accident investigations will be available in the near future.



(One can argue over what 'short-term' means in the context of a pandemic.) When looking at long-term solutions, the

military should not be considered, and whatever solution is developed should apply to much a wider range of major problems, not just pandemics. Canada needs to be more resilient, with strong emergency response resources, maybe even a civil emergency reserve.

As Canada is often described as a 'middle power,' there is some useful thinking in this article.

" All middle powers display foreign policy behaviour that stabilises and legitimises the global order, typically through multilateral and cooperative initiatives. However, emerging and traditional middle powers can be distinguished in terms of their mutually-influencing constitutive and behavioural differences."

Constitutively, traditional middle powers are wealthy, stable, egalitarian, social democratic and not regionally influential. Behaviourally, they exhibit a weak and ambivalent regional orientation, constructing identities distinct from powerful states in their regions and offer appeasing concessions to pressures for global reform.

[However] emerging middle powers by contrast are semi-peripheral, materially in egalitarian and recently democratised states that demonstrate much regional influence and self-association. Behaviourally, they opt for reformist and not radical global change, exhibit a strong regional orientation favouring regional integration but seek also to construct identities distinct from those of the weak states in their region."

This article maintains that the Chinese Communist Party represents the actual will of the Chinese people. "This study concludes maintaining a credible theatre-wide submarine monitoring capability is a critical enduring peacetime function, but NATO is not currently capable of doing it.

It identifies four critical findings with significant impact on NATO's current and future ability to conduct ASW:

NATO should create a theatre-wide ASW Commander, vested with the proper authorities to more efficiently coordinate NATO's limited ASW resources across ships, submarines, and aircraft.
NATO should identify a common aircraft replacement for the P-3 Orion series.

NATO should identify a common mechanism for MPA and MPH post-mission acoustic analysis and request national aircraft mission support centres adopt this standard.
NATO should develop Experimental Tactics and test them for ratification into formal doctrine."

Reads like NATO has regressed from its heyday in the late 1980s.

As a powerful challenger to the current rules-based international order, the CCP regime's "closeness" to Huawei and laws surrounding information sharing with the government have led Western leaders and commentators to raise alarms about the risk of backdoors in the technology that would leave western critical infrastructure and governmental processes and secrets exposed to cyber-attack. Although much attention has been geared towards Huawei as a potential threat to Western security, 5G technology poses significant security challenges more generally, regardless of the provider. The trustworthiness of these networks will require technological solutions that are perhaps not advancing as fast as the deployment of the 5G networks.

The vulnerabilities of 5G networks pose fundamental strategic concerns for the defence, geospatial, signals, and human intelligence sharing arrangement between the Five Eyes nations, Canada, the United States, the United Kingdom, Australia, and New Zealand. Can the alliance survive intact if a member is perceived as operating within a compromised information network?

Moderated by the former director of Canada's intelligence agency, our international panelists will discuss their country's current position and the direction that nation is taking on this question, explore potential technological solutions to the security threats posed by

5G technology and specifically potential ways out of the impasse with China and Huawei, and finally assess the impact of 5G as well as the implications for future Five Eyes cooperation moving forward.
