## The Canadian Armed Forces and COVID-19 -- June 12 update

Colleagues and partners in defence,

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 outbreak in Canada, the Canadian Armed Forces have been heavily involved in the whole-of-nation response. Three months later, Op LASER continues to be a tremendous effort *across* the Defence Team — from the Canadian Rangers, to Regular and Reserve Forces members, to civilian staff. Yet, as rates of infection decrease across the country, the Canadian Armed Forces, are beginning to resume regular business in a controlled environment. Though many of our Op LASER activities will continue, some will soon conclude.

Two weeks ago, we received a request from the Province of Quebec to extend our work in long-term care facilities (LTCF). It was necessary to take our time and thoroughly consider how a long-term deployment could impact the CAF ability to resume regular operations and activities. As I noted last week, a long-term deployment of our medical personnel poses significant challenges to CAF readiness. Without our medical teams in their normal roles, much of our regular business — recruiting, training, operations, contingency planning, and transition of members looking to release from the military — cannot occur.

It is with this in mind, that the CAF will remain in Quebec and Ontario facilities until June 26<sup>th</sup>. Our focus is on ensuring our military personnel are where they need to be to make the biggest impact. Working in close collaboration with the provinces we have already begun to transition out of facilities that have stabilized, and our personnel have moved to support other facilities that are in the greatest need of assistance. We will continue to monitor the situation closely and ensure that our eventual transition out of facilities is closely coordinated with provincial authorities, and conducted in a safe and responsible manner. Furthermore, the CAF will stay in individual facilities beyond June 26<sup>th</sup> if it is needed for them to stabilize in accordance with transition criteria. The CAF will also hold a limited number of augmented civilian care teams in reserve should acute needs arise.

While the CAF is still operating in these facilities, their health, and the health of those they are serving remains a top priority. All symptomatic personnel are already being tested, and we have developed a new testing strategy to ensure the following:

- All CAF members will be tested prior to their deployment to a LTCF;

- CAF members will be re-tested if a province or facility mandates additional testing;

- All CAF members having ended a mission will self-isolate for 14 days, and then be tested prior to returning to their communities.

We take great pride in the support we have provided to LTCF residents and staff throughout this deployment. Many of the worst-affected LTCFs are stabilizing. The overall number of new cases across facilities is decreasing. And conditions including hygiene, staffing, and access to Personal Protective Equipment are improving for residents and staff. These positive effects are thanks to the tireless work of dedicated health care practitioners with the support of our Canadian Armed Forces.

Over the weekend, the Government announced the replacement of two 30 year old <u>Challenger Aircraft</u> with a modern Challenger model. The newer model meets international requirements, and will provide flexibility to meet a range of requirements. We also released a Request for Proposal for the transport of future interim jets from Australia to Canada, which will enable the Globemaster fleet, which has been providing these services to date, to address other priorities under its role as premier transporter for military, humanitarian and peacekeeping missions. These interim jets will help distribute flying hours among more airframes as we extend the life of our CF-18 fleet.

From an operational perspective, though many of our international operations and exercises paused at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, we are beginning to resume activity in that space as well. By mid-June, approximately 90 CAF members will deploy on Op UNIFIER to prepare for the resumption of collective training with the Security Forces of Ukraine. CAF members will isolate for 14 days upon arrival in Ukraine, prior to joining the mission. And HMCS *Fredericton* is participating in BALTOPS 20, an annual international maritime-led joint exercise held by NATO in the Baltic Sea region.







And they can and will deploy 'unmanned aviation, surface, and undersea systems,' 'intelligence-collection systems,' 'secure communications and data transfer,' and 'sensors and other systems to achieve and maintain maritime domain awareness.'


