



Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny fighting for his life after alleged poisoning

It has been a while since a major Russian opposition leader has been attacked so blatantly. Poisoning has been a key method of disposing of enemies of Vladimir Putin. Alexei Navalny has had many attempts on his life in the recent past including last year when a noxious substance was thrown at him causing vision issues in one eye. This attempt seems to be more serious. It is likely that the poison was introduced at an airport tea shop immediately prior to the flight.

The Canadian press has not really covered increasing discontent in Russia, in particular the East which has been rocked by demonstrations. The Putin regime is in trouble. The economy is still tanking, Putin's own popularity has fallen and recent arrests of persons thought to be honest and championing the rights of people such as the very popular Governor of Khabarovsk, Sergei Furgal, have opened a Pandora's box of problems. Demonstrations have been large and are directed directly at the Putin regime which would have been unthinkable even a few months ago. The loss of a key opposition leader and the arrest of political potential rivals may cause the opposition demonstrations to slow because of the "threat."

Russia is at a turning point. It is beset with major issues including the economy, Chinese territorial claims in the far East, unrest issues over the recent election in Belarus which puts another strong man at risk, plus elements of the security forces, especially the police, being less reliable, are almost a perfect storm. How Putin manoeuvres about these issues will be critical not only for Russia but the entire world.

The questions are: are the Russian people finally finished with this regime? Will Navalny's poisoning be the final straw? Or will Putin continue to survive with an increasingly unpopular regime?



# The Department of National Defence and Canadian Armed Forces update -- August 18

Colleagues and partners in defence,

Throughout the summer, the Canadian Armed Forces have been gradually, and safely resuming regular activity. On August 4<sup>th</sup>, Her Majesty's Canadian Ships *Glace Bay* and *Ville de Québec*, and MV Asterix, deployed to the Eastern Arctic waters to take part in Operation NANOOK/TUUGAALIK – the CAF's signature northern operation. Op NANOOK is designed to exercise the defence of Canada and to secure our northern regions. Joining the

CAF on this operation are some of our closest partners — the United States Coast Guard and Navy, the French Navy, and the Royal Danish Navy. The Royal Canadian Navy will participate in a variety of defence and security exercises alongside our allies to foster cooperation and to test their ability to operate in challenging environments. This year's deployment will end on August 24<sup>th</sup> — a shorter deployment than in previous years due to the current COVID-19 restrictions. As one of the cornerstones of Op NANOOK is to keep our northern communities safe, participating members will not visit any ports or take part in any community relations events this year. We are also ensuring the health and safety of all personnel involved through a number of precautionary measures, including increased cleaning routines, mandatory testing, and enhanced personal hygiene requirements.

Training is an important part of maintaining a modern military. Equipping our people with the equipment that will support them on operations is another. Major defence procurement projects continue to unfold despite the pandemic and its workplace disruptions.

Production of the first Armoured Combat Support Vehicles began earlier this month at the General Dynamics Land Systems-Canada facilities in London, Ontario. These vehicles will support the CAF both here at home and overseas by providing ambulance, mobile repair, and vehicle recovery services. And on August 11<sup>th</sup>, Minister Duclos announced the start of maintenance for Her Majesty's Canadian Ship *St. John's*. This work is being carried out as part of an initial \$500 million contract with Davie Shipyard for maintenance of three Halifax-class frigates. This includes equipment upgrades, inspections, structural renewal, and routine hull maintenance. This is critical to ensuring the long-term sustainment of the Halifax-class for the Government of Canada.

Finally, it is important to recognize the important contributions and achievements of individual CAF members on the world stage.

On July 29<sup>th</sup>, Major Gillian Parker of the Royal Canadian Air Force received the NATO Meritorious Service Medal (NATO-MSM) for her work while deployed in Germany. As the Training and Exercises Officer for NATO's Exercise Trident Juncture 2018, Major Parker was responsible for leading the air component of the multi-national exercise. After three years of planning and coordination, approximately 55,000 military personnel from NATO's 29 member-states participated in the integrated exercise. Major Parker's efforts were instrumental to its success. We commend her for her hard work and dedication to Canada and to our multinational partnerships. She is a true example of excellence and professionalism, and we are proud to have her represent our country on the international stage.

Finally, Sunday, August 9<sup>th</sup> marked <u>National Peacekeeper's Day</u> – a time to recognize those who have proudly upheld Canadian values through their peacekeeping efforts, working to bring peace and security to some of the world's most volatile regions and vulnerable communities. We thank Canada's peacekeepers who are currently deployed around the world, and those who served before them. And we remember and honour the 130 Canadian peacekeepers who made the ultimate sacrifice in service of peace and freedom.
