

"Sovereign industrial capability" - now, there's a concept that needs more attention in Canada. Certainly recent focus on sourcing personal protective equipment (PPE) during the pandemic has raised public awareness of such a concept even if that term isn't being used. What is and should be Canada's sovereign (defence) industrial capability? Are there government and academic studies of it? Is there a government program in support of ensuring it is sufficiently robust?

The major Canadian shipyards and related marine industries associations are well engaged in the area what with the yards' need to ensure secure suppliers and chain of supply. Interesting to read the article's point that the Australian government's failure to support the auto industry had a downstream adverse impact on shipbuilding. Yes, manufacturing is much more related than is generally appreciated (think about otherwise innocuous industries that converted to wartime manufacturing in the world wars).







Security Affairs Committee

The SAC meets every two weeks by Zoom. In the SAC call-to-meeting, at times the chair comments on the geo-strategic situation. This week's comments follow:

These past two weeks have shown that authoritarian regimes are on the rise. One still hears that China is not being called out for its violent comments in relation to Taiwan. One senses that at least in Canada there is a willingness almost to have the Peoples' Republic of China take Taiwan despite the fact that it is a liberal democracy with 27 million people. Canada's approach (or lack thereof) has the feel of 1938 and the German demands on Czechoslovakia. British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain negotiated the dismemberment of the Czechoslovakian Republic and came home to Britain waving a piece of paper and stating that "I believe this will bring peace in our time." It was not worth the paper it was printed on then as it is with authoritarian regimes now. It should be made clear to the PRC that Taiwan can only be made part of the PRC if the citizens of Taiwan vote to do so and that any other action will be met by force. This is in spite of the One China Policy. It might be mentioned that the One China Policy meant there was one China...it does not mean it is agreed to that it would be the PRC. It simply said there was one China. China continues to hold more than 100 Canadians prisoners including some folks kidnapped and held without consular support since 2006. The two 'Michaels' have been held since December 2018 but receive more support because of the higher profile. Canada's inaction speaks loudly.

I have been listening and reading Canadian news sources to see what Canadians are getting as news. Most unfortunately seems more along the line of "infotainment" as opposed to looking at major issues such as perhaps the ongoing low level conflict between three nuclear armed powers or the fact that Iran has now amassed sufficient enriched uranium for weapons research despite the problem that that it wasn't supposed to do that while the treaty with in effect. They lied and the US unfortunately was correct and that they were developing the necessary material for nuclear weapons all along. Canadians are blissfully unaware...there is only COVID as a serious issue according to the Canadian media. That would be wrong - our media sources are not providing the necessary information to the public. Speaking of Canadian media, there are reports that 80% of the Chinese language press in Canada is funded at least by grants by the Chinese Communist Party. If even remotely true, is it time for a review into this issue?

Events of the last two weeks:

Belarus is following the tried and true method of traditional dictators, arrest of key leadership of the opposition. Most of the leadership of the Coord Council has been exiled from the country except for Nobel winning author Svetlana Alexievich. Unfortunately for the Lukashenko regime, the internet makes it virtually impossible to eliminate the overall effectiveness of the opposition. Huge demonstrations continue. The Russian regime of Vladimir Putin has shown that it will support Lukashenko over the opposition. There was even reports of Russia's 'little green men' in the streets of Minsk. Before one gets too excited, the 'little green men' issue is not comparable to Crimea. In Crimea, the population was mainly Russian and there were large numbers of Russian service personnel in location plus a friendly country not expecting to be stabbed in the back by an alleged ally. In this case, the population is not supportive of the current regime and a strong move by Russia could in fact turn yet another friendly country into a staunch enemy. It will be a balancing act for Putin.

Russia not surprisingly has its own issues with unrest. Alexei Navalny was poisoned apparently with Novichok, a nerve agent developed for the Russian military according to German medical authorities. The Putin regime did its usual denial all the while smiling. Putin's popularity continues to sag and demonstrations are continuing throughout the country. Regional council elections are to be held on 13 September 2020. Navalny's opposition is forbidden to participate but they have had some success by having folks vote for anyone but the ruling United Russia Party which supported Putin in his rise. In the meantime, we can only watch and wait.

Iran has sufficient enriched uranium for ongoing weapons research. This means the treaty was being violated for some time in military nuclear facilities. This did not happen overnight or even since the US dropped out of the treaty. Wonderful, imagine an Iranian regime with the bomb. No cause for concern there.- not!

Speaking of other folks that shouldn't have the bomb, North Korea has been subjected to severe weather causing major damage to agricultural efforts. North Korea has always had an issue with providing enough food for its population. This will not help. North Korea also closed its borders to China recently due to conflicts between fishing fleets which resulted in the deaths of several fishermen. One should expect large scale starvation, but North Korea has shown that it is willing to lose large numbers of citizens rather than lose face by having to ask for assistance. Kim Jong Un has been seen in public again but there are continuing speculation on his long term health. It is still being reported that his younger sister has become number 2 in the regime and the next in line for the leadership. She has not been seen of late, keeping a low profile. This will bear watching closely.

On 7 September India took positions above Pangong Lake in the Ladahk region along the Line of Actual Control. This puts Indian troops in a superior position ovr Chinese positions. China has protested needless to say but they were seen to be armed with spears and clubs in an apparent attempt to repeat the actions of the Galwan Valley which resulted in 20 Indian fatalities and an unspecified number of Chinese casualties. So the situation continues to evolve in this area. Warning shots apparently were fired by both sides. Here is the surprise and it is worthy of note and concern. The Indian unit involved was the Special Frontier Force (SFF) which is all Tibetan exiles who have little love of China. Needless to say China does not take this well. A young SFF officer was recently killed in a mine strike. India made a considerable display of his funeral which included high ranking members of the ruling Indian party, the BJP. India has had this unit since 1962 but generally has been quiet about it especially its composition. Will China view this as a budding 'Free Tibetan Army'? Things are likely to further deteriorate in this area and despite the altitude of over 3000 metres, the military build up continues.

China has been beset with multiple problems. There is an ongoing leadership issue, especially since a member of Xi's own family has been caught in a corruption investigation. No real details as yet, but someone feels safe enough to attack the family directly. The fallout from flooding continues and the regime has not been effective in providing support to the millions of displaced people. On top of this is the widespread destruction of crops and agricultural areas. This may have longer term effects due to contamination of agricultural land. China also lost an SU-35 fighter which was initially thought to have been shot down by Taiwan; more than likely it was a technical fault. China didn't react so it is unlikely that an actual confrontation took place. China is seeing considerable unrest in Inner Mongolia, a province of China. The population is ethnically Mongolian. New school curriculum emphasizes Mandarin at the expense of Mongolian. It is another example of China's ongoing cultural genocide operations like Xinxiang province (occupied East Turkestan, invaded and occupied by the PRC in 1950), Tibet and now Inner Mongolia. Unrest is expected to continue. Lastly, both of China's aircraft carriers are conducting separate exercises off the Chinese coast. This is the first time this has occurred and is an indication of how far China has come in carrier operations.

A new Canadian throne speech is about to occur; it is expected that the Liberal Government will set a new path for the country making it more 'green.' Most parties are expected to listen and are not expected to reject the throne speech. The real issue will be the upcoming budget which will give the details of such a program. The deficit is expected to be around \$100 billion according to media speculation. This would be on top of \$353 billion of COVID funding. None of this spending has had the necessary oversight and the auditor general has not received the necessary funding to conduct the necessary audits. What is a concern is whether this money has been spent appropriately. Should Canada go into a major deficit and increase the debt before there is a firm grip on the finances of the country and its long term effects if lending rates go up even marginally? It is expected that DND will take a significant hit even as the world stumbles towards potential conflict.

Clearing the Way: Combat Engineers in Kandahar

Based on the book by Col Mark Gasparotto (ret'd), "Clearing the Way" is considered a classic study in the engineer experience of asymmetric warfare in Afghanistan. Considered by Canadian Engineers and ISAF nations to be one of the most realistic documentaries of the Afghan war. The film covers from Aug 06 to Feb 07, in particular, the Battle of Op MEDUSA, Sep 2-17., 2006. 98% of photos and footage in the field were shot by the soldiers themselves. The footage of the Battle of Op MEDUSA in this film is historic. It is the first battle footage ever shot by Canadian soldiers of Canadian soldiers in combat. A copy of the book and DVD were gifted in June 2018, to Queen Elizabeth II during an audience at Buckingham Palace with the Commandant of Engineers, BGen Steve Irwin (ret'd).

In October 2017, "Clearing the Way" won the Audience Choice Award after its world premiere at the Forest City Film Festival, London, Ontario. In August 2018 it was the opening film of the Regina

International Film Festival. In November 2018, CTW made its American debut to a full house of US veterans at the Branson MO Military Film Festival, Branson MO. Since then, copies of "Clearing the Way" have become part of the libraries of not only Canadian Forces engineer schools but the Australian and New Zealand engineer schools as well.

Please be advised there is strong language and violence. If home viewing, would not recommend anyone under the age of 14 be present. Finally, the film is 96 minutes. If people want to take a break, we suggest to do so at the 58 min mark. There is a natural break between the events of the Sep 3assault on the White School and the morning of Sep 4 friendly fire incident.
