It is hoped that several projects including one for Nova Scotia will rapidly come to fruition. Prior to this, Canada has been using foreign nations to launch our satellites, all of which are a critical part of our overall national infrastructure. The current government has placed security and our relationship with allies in what can only be described as naïve - the sale of a military communications company to Chinese interests is an example.

Building our own satellites and launch platforms is a step in the right direction. Using foreign systems is always a major security risk. Canada has been naïve enough to use Chinese launch systems at times. Canada needs to move forward with its own capabilities and maintain firm control over our own technology. Even using US systems is problematic given US views on the Canadian Arctic as just one example. Key Canadian assets were incorporated into an American-based firm. One hopes this is a sign of things to come if this open source article is true.

Russia's fleet to receive ten new icebreakers by 2030





The Department of National Defence and Canadian Armed Forces update - October 30

Colleagues and Partners in Defence,

October is Women's History Month. For more than 100 years, women have played an important role in Canada's defence – both here at home, and overseas.

On October 31st, Canada will join the rest of the world to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of UN Security Council Resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security. UNSCR 1325 calls upon nations to increase women's meaningful participation in the peace and security process. Under General Vance's leadership, the Women, Peace, and Security Chiefs of Defence Network has grown to 54 member states who are committed to applying gender perspectives into their armed forces and peacekeeping operations. Over the past 20 years, Canada has made important progress on this front, including launching the Elsie Initiative for Women in Peace Operations (https://www.international.gc.ca/world-monde/issues_development-enjeux_development/gender_equality-egalite_des_genres/elsie_initiative-initiative_elsie.aspx?lang=eng), which aims to increase uniformed

<u>egalite_des_genres/elsie_initiative-initiative_elsie.aspx?lang=eng</u>), which aims to increase uniformed women's meaningful participation in UN operations.

We also need to ensure that all those who serve Canada can do so in an environment that is safe, and free from harassment and sexual misconduct. On October 28th, the Canadian Armed Forces released The Path to Dignity and Respect, a new culture change strategy designed to prevent and address sexual misconduct in the CAF. The Path provides a detailed approach to aligning the behaviours and attitudes of CAF members with the core values expected of all persons within the profession of arms in Canada. This strategy expands Operation HONOUR into a comprehensive, long-term effort, and will help ensure a safe and healthy culture within the CAF that promotes the success of all members.

Around the world, women in the Canadian Armed Forces are demonstrating their leadership on operations. Women like Lieutenant-Colonel Sarah Heer, who, on October 5th, became Joint Task Force Ukraine's first woman commanding officer. She is leading over 200 Canadian Armed Forces members working to provide military training and capacity building to the Ukrainian Government as part of

Operation UNIFIER (https://www.canada.ca/en/department-national-defence/services/operations/military-operations/current-operations/operation-unifier.html). LCol Heer stands as an example to women and girls across Canada and around the world of the impact women can make on the global stage.

Recognizing role-models like LCol Heer is important, but our goal is to get to a place where having women lead on operations is normalized, rather than an exception or a "first" to be celebrated. In order to be an effective force and an inclusive organization, women need to be meaningfully engaged and employed across all levels, and in all trades. That's why Canada and Norway funded the creation of a new methodology that looks at the barriers for women in police and military organizations. It has been tested in four pilot countries, and the CAF will soon begin to assess its own barriers to women's participation.

Here at home, the effects of the global pandemic are taking a significant toll on Canadian women, many of whom have to work from home due to strict public health measures—and it is often women are have the burden of striking the balance between bringing home an income, and taking care of their families.

These challenges have been referred to as a "she-cession." National Defence and the Canadian Armed Forces are committed to being an employer of choice for women across the country. We know that women are crucial to our effectiveness. We have come a long way, but we know we still have work to do to address gender bias and discrimination in the defence and security field. That is why we apply a Gender-Based Analysis Plus (GBA+) lens to everything we do, from our COVID-19 directive that ensures our employees are able to work safely in our new environment, to our procurement projects. For example, the new Arctic and Offshore Patrol Ships all have single or double occupancy crew cabins and individual washroom facilities. This allows for greater comfort, and easier accommodation of a mixed-gender crew. Moreover, all CAF equipment is designed to be operated by a broad range of physical characteristics to accommodate varying body types and strengths. These procurement projects are crucial to creating safe and inclusive spaces for the women in our ranks, as well as important economic opportunities for Canadians and their businesses.

This year marks several milestones including the 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War – a time when the military was expanding the roles available to women. Some worked as mechanics, others as photographers, and some worked as parachute riggers. The Second World War created career opportunities for women like Private Marion Miller from Six Nations of the Grand River, who pursued her goal of becoming an Army driver. Private Miller joins a long list of Indigenous women who have served Canada with pride and with honour.

This year also marks the International Year of the Nurse and Midwife. We remember women like Georgina Fane Pope – the first Matron of the Canadian Army Medical Corps (CAMC) and the first Canadian military nurse to receive the Royal Red Cross Class 1 medal. She served in the South African War (1899-1902) and the First World War, where she suffered from shell-shock and was forced to return home and retire from the CAMC. Pope is renowned for establishing nursing as an integrated role for women in the military.

Even though we've just observed Women's History Month and we celebrated the successes of women in defence and security, we must also acknowledge that we still have a long way to go, and that we are at risk of regressing on the progress made. As Jacqueline O'Neill, Canada's Ambassador for women, peace and security, said during an appearance in front of the House of Commons Standing Committee on National Defence, a growing number of attacks against defenders of the human rights of women and LGBTQ2S+ persons are happening in this new COVID-19 environment, and it is putting progress in

peril. According to Mrs. O'Neill, the pandemic and particularly authoritarian responses to it represent existential threats for many women peace-builders and local organizations. In certain places, it remains a challenge for them to be heard in peacebuilding and conflict resolution discussions. This is an important issue that needs to be solved and prevented. Women play a big part in conflict prevention, peace negotiation, peacekeeping and reconstructing postwar societies. They are not just an addition to peace and security operations; they're an integral part of it - we must promote their participation and prevent them from losing their voices and participation during the pandemic.

We know that we must continue the work we are doing to ensure that DND and the CAF are welcoming spaces that encourage women to thrive in all aspects of their careers, and to ensure they grow into the leaders our organizations need.

As you are aware, the Communist Chinese Party (CCP) has just released its 14th Five Year Plan which will set conditions and expectations in development of China in the next period which includes extensions to 2035. One of the pieces not specifically mentioned in the article is the CCP's move to further increase security efforts against Taiwan and Hong Kong. One is sure of one thing, the CCP has not and will not tolerate is an independent and successful Taiwan as a separate entity without a fight.

The CCP is especially incensed that the Trump administration has now approved three major deals including for jet fighters, land-based cruise missiles and most recently, drones to help even the playing field in the Taiwan straits. The new equipment will enable to inflict tremendous damage if the PLAN

tries to cross the Taiwan straits. Keep in mind that Taiwan has also created indigenously produced land-based missile systems to counter bombard nearby launching sites

Belarus demonstrations are continuing despite the efforts of President Lukashenko. So far security forces have not shown any signs of breaking with the self-proclaimed president. This will have to happen in some form if the opposition is to have any success.

Azerbaijan and Armenia continue to fight despite international efforts for a ceasefire. Both presidents have stated that they will continue to fight. Casualties on both sides have been fairly high. "You Tube" is full of fairly graphic imagery of artillery/mortar strikes as well as a copious amount of drone footage. Russia has remained relatively hands off so far and Turkey is not doing anything too obvious so as to cause a reaction beyond the current combatants. The wild card is Iran which has sent large all arms forces into the area along the Iran Azerbaijan border. Iran is alleged to have shot down several Azerbaijani drones. Strangely, Russia is also alleged to have shot down drones using electronic counter measures. None of this can be independently verified, so the war drags on.

There is an apparent truce between warring parties in Libya that appears to be holding for that long-suffering country. It is an excellent example of what happens when one does not finish the job. Turkey and Russia are on the opposite sides of this conflict.

Syria continues to be a cesspool including new Russian bombings of Turkish held areas against alleged terrorists. In case one is counting that is three areas where Russia and Turkey are fighting through proxies. Keep in mind Russia also has areas of concern in Kyrgyzstan, Luhansk and Donetsk in Ukraine, South Ossetia, Abkhazia and Transnistria just to name a few plus its own internal unrest. Putin himself remains in a bubble not seeing anyone who has not been quarantined for 14 days...strangely different from another world leader.

There is a wonderful Economist article on how dazzling Russia's military build up is...it is amazing what a good disinformation campaign can do. Russia has displayed an amazing ability to play an awful hand of cards beautifully. Their military continues to deteriorate and most of their equipment except for some show pieces are mainly Soviet era including some of their most advanced submarines which are being built using incomplete hulls. They still suffer from an inability to create modern jet engines for the SU 57 nor are they able to mass produce the TU 160 or its much announced but never seen new bomber. Conscripts still make a large portion of the armed forces and they are poorly trained and motivated. It does not appear that the Russian armed forces are dazzling but are rather tarnished.
