

Drone Killings, International War Law and the U.S. Military

Security Affairs Committee Synopsis

The Russian Scene

Alexei Navalny is in poor shape and his health is deteriorating. Pleas, including from his wife, for medical assistance have fallen on deaf ears in the prison system. Demonstrations are continuing despite the crackdown on his supporters and there is growing concern that this will not stop, either in Belarus or in Russia itself. Putin is no longer seen as the saviour of Russia but as a major problem, increasingly so for oligarchs who previously gained through their relations with him. If one follows Russians on various platforms it is clear the regime has have not been able to silence a growing chorus of anti-Putin material.

Lukashenko in Belarus is also seen as 'a dead man walking' as he has virtually zero support except from security forces. Both he and Putin are now seen as yesterday's men, perhaps both countries will be looking for younger more dynamic leaders.

The Far East: China

China has been taken off guard to a certain degree by the multi-lateral reaction to the trials of the two Canadians when up to 24 countries sent representatives to try to enter the court rooms. Pictures were sent around the world of Chinese police stopping the diplomats from entering a trial, largely considered a kangaroo court (except that would give kangaroo courts a bad name) with a conviction rate of around 99% made possible by lengthy pre-trial incarceration coupled with torture and abuse. It was not the publicity China wants. Sanctions have followed from multiple countries on the ongoing genocidal actions within East Turkestan, also known as Xinxiang Province, which has been occupied by the Communists in 1950. The Communist Chinese Party (CCP) have stated that this is an internal affair but the bottom line is they attacked and invaded the country and have, by some accounts, occupied it illegally since. It is therefore not an internal matter but one of an illegal occupation.

China is also using its Maritime Militia to occupy a Philippine shoal within the Philippines' Economic Zone, with more than 220 Maritime Militia vessels being present. Use of their fishing fleet and 'nonmilitary' agencies is a method of the Chinese 'Three Wars Concept' of using force up to and sometimes entering into coercive tactics and low-level kinetic action to achieve their political aims. It can be assumed that this type of action will continue unless more forceful counter action can be taken. The resulting mess, however, may be difficult to control, to say the least. One has to wonder how far Xi will go to achieve a victory over his neighbours. The actions of the CCP appear to be bordering on active conflict.

Taiwan

Pressure on Taiwan continues with the largest ever formation of Chinese combat aircraft entering Taiwan's Aircraft Detection and Identification Zone (ADIZ) this week with more than 20 aircraft involved. US and Taiwanese negotiations on cooperation are continuing.

North Korea

North Korea launched ballistic missiles this week in violation of multiple UN resolutions on this matter. It is thought the North Koreans are using these 'tests' to draw the attention of the Biden administration. The rhetoric was truly a fine example of North Korean "diplomatic language" that is almost childishly laughable if it were not for their nuclear weapons and the fate of millions due to an increasingly erratic North Korean government.

Canada's Weak Foreign Policy

Lastly, listening to our Foreign Minister, the Honourable Marc Garneau, in relation to Canada's actions with allies on China and more specifically against the CCP, his comments of China being a bully were also naïve to a large extent. It shows how Canada's efforts in the world have been based on shallow definitions and over simplistic views of the world. Successive governments of all stripes have failed to specify what Canada's vital ground is, what are our key issues that we maintain, how we organize to ensure these areas are protected and what methods are we willing to use. It falls to the point that we lack a modern foreign policy. Canadian citizens realize the need for clarity so that they clearly understand why Canada must do certain actions. This has never been clearly articulated and it shows in Canada's 'schoolyard rhetoric' on national radio. As a retired soldier with family in the military who may be forced to see one's family sent off on half-baked, inconsequential missions without an over-riding national foreign policy that is mature, is difficult to say the least. An all-party understanding of Canada's interests and the subsequent support is vital for the long-term health of the country.
