My thoughts in potential limitations (i.e. what ADM(Mat) & DND won't say) follow: She'll still play a serious deterrent role. Without knowing exact limits of the now-weakened tank, enemies don't know how deep she can go. How deep she NEEDs to go to avoid detection depends on WHERE she's operating due to seabed terrain & thermoclines, which vary from location. Then there's the mission: not all submarine missions require, or indeed benefit from, staying very deep. Covert surveillance of surface vessels, such as they did off North Korea in 2018, require shallow depth anyway. Same for electronic intelligence collection. While a shallow (relatively speaking) submarine is easier to find than a deeper one, the amount of resources that an adversary will spend to look for it will not be reduced just because they now know there are unspecified limits to how deep it can go. If the opponent is coming into an area where a sub is suspected, it doesn't really matter how deep they think it can go: they're not going to say "oh it's way easier now" and go with one hand tied behind their backs. They're going to bring all the ASW forces they can to bear. That, or they'll seek to avoid the area where the sub is suspected of being, and doing things that might trigger that sub to attack - that's where the deterrent effect comes in. So yes, a weakened ballast tank will reduce Corner Brook's capabilities, and the Corner Brook's captains will have reduced options in some tactical situations. But as long as the opponent doesn't know what those reductions are, they're going to treat Corner Brook as though it's just as fully capable and threatening as any of her sisters. For the RCN, the main concern now is going to be how many more dives the repaired tank can take before it, and the sub overall, needs to be replaced. Remaining service life, rather than tactical capability, will be the main high-level consequence of this.

Shipbuilding projects take many years from initiation until hulls enter the water (and, really, last many years thereafter, until the last hull of a project is disposed of and sent to the breaker). Canada needs to be looking now at what are the concepts for replacing its Kingston-class multi-role coastal/regional patrol ships and its Victoria-class submarines.

The use of blockships to close a port has long been a naval tactic. It remains viable. Under conditions (e.g., surprise in a pre-conflict situation), it could be a relatively easy operation. The security of ports, and the resiliency of states to respond to port blockage whether accidental or deliberate, needs to be a matter of multi-departmental, not just military, planning and exercising.

Canada's Joint Task Force Atlantic included a scenario of a vessel blocking a harbour in Exercise FRONTIER SENTINEL 2012, one of a series of annual Canadian-US home defence exercises. The lessons learned and relationships built in that exercise are the sort needed to respond to situations such as a blocked port or seaway. Contingency planning and exercising are good ways for authorities and planners to envision possibilities of and responses to blockship scenarios.

The 'Compact Laser Weapon System,' capable of destroying smaller drones at closer range and of disrupting sensors of bigger drones at longer range. Lasers are becoming more capable and more a routine part of military forces. When will we see them in use by Canadian Armed Forces, deployed in army air defence units, as part of airfield defence, and aboard ships?

To write the obvious, there will be improvements and increased use of lasers. A Moscow Times article written by the editorial staff of AFP. Russian authorities are continuing their crackdown but it appears they are losing the public relations battle overall. They apparently arrested well-known CNN contributor Matthew Chance at the same time they arrested Navalny's physician, Dr Anastasia Vasilyeva, head of the Medical Doctor's Trade Union. Apparently, it is going around that Russian prison authorities have let TB run rampant in the prison putting all at risk. It is not playing well anywhere including in Russia.

In recent polls, one-in-two Russians believe that the government was right to arrest and jail Alexei Navalny. One might suspect that the other half are young folks who are more likely to oppose the actions of the regime, fail to show up for conscription and do show up for increasingly active anti-Putin regime demonstrations. Putin supporters are more likely to be pensioners or government workers. Given that the press is highly controlled, it is not a good sign longer term for the regime.

Putin also signed new legislation that would allow him to run for two more terms of six years. He is 69 years of age now. His current term ends in 2024 and thus two more terms means he could remain in power until 2036 at the age of 84. What an interesting fate for a country that deserves better from its leaders. One can only imagine what levels of authoritarianism may be possible if he succeeds, as we can see by his reaction to Navalny's efforts to point out corruption. The question is, with his popularity waning, will he make it?

U.S. salvage firm hired to assess shipwreck leaking oil off Vancouver Island



Whilst the article is US, there is something to take away for Canadians. There is a symbiosis between the shipbuilding industry and government fleets (whether they are navy, coast guard or otherwise). A strong shipbuilding program builds strong fleets. Having strong fleets (with all that can be done with them for national defence, security and safety) requires governments to ensure a strong shipbuilding industry. Canada's National Shipbuilding Strategy (NSS) recognizes this and puts an emphasis, one could argue the main emphasis, on economic (shipbuilding industry) development. There is a question though, that is, what is the NSS aiming for? Not to say there is a real end-state - in many respects the NSS is inherently an ongoing/continuing program. But there should be at least some target balance between what Canada has for government fleets and what Canadian shipbuilding can support. Of course, that gets into a lot of analysis of foreign, defence, security and other policies, trying to determine requirements and affordability. Politics!

Security Affairs Committee Notes 2 April 2021

I have to start with Canada. The New Democratic Party have chosen to allow a motion to disband the Canadian Armed Forces to be debated at their next national convention. We always jokingly said they were the 'No Defence Party' and they seem determined to achieve this title once again despite the efforts of people like Peter Stoffer. Their argument is the usual one. Look at what we could do if we didn't spend money on new fighter aircraft or modern equipment, see what we could do. In a perfectly utopian world even I might support this view. No soldier sailor or aviator who has been in conflict or even near to one on UN duty wants to fight and potentially pay the ultimate price. In my career I have seen far too many funerals of service personnel who died far too early because of lack of preparedness, poor equipment and poor political decisions. I would hope that they would never happen again...but the reality is the world is heading in a poor direction with the rise of authoritarian regimes. The world seems to go through periods or cycles of these regimes sometimes requiring good people to act in ways that we would hope would not be necessary. There have been other movements such as the 'Oxford Movement' of the 1930s, there were attempts to placate authoritarian regimes such as the 'Munich Accord,' all to no avail. So many of the young members of the Oxford movement saw the light and realized that authoritarian regimes had to be faced. Many laid down their lives to meet the foe, many unprepared as we are now to deal with increasingly difficult regimes who will not stop their aggression. The price of naivety is very high. All of the projects that they mention and want are being dealt with in some fashion, but successive governments also realize that there has to be a price paid for the security of the country's sovereignty and our ability to act decisively when necessary. The Armed Forces is that insurance policy for our sovereignty. If we don't protect ourselves than someone else will to do it for us whether we like it or not and that is also the end of our country as we know it. Our freedom and independence are not free, they have come from the expenditure of blood, money and resources to achieve it. Once lost, they are difficult to regain - just ask the Tibetans or the people of occupied East Turkistan and now the people of Hong Kong. This is something that the NDP have not considered in their calculation. The Halifax Chronicle Herald also provided a large space on the editorial page for similar views.

Now for other reasons why the move mentioned above are really incredibly naïve. Alexei Navalny has started a hunger strike this past week to protest the lack of access to medical support for his condition. Mr Navalny was not completely well from his poisoning, which was known to the judges. Navalny's ally Lyubov Sobol, a well-known member of the anti-corruption foundation that has embarrassed the Putin regime on numerus occasions, has been arrested and is now on trial in Moscow. She also famously tracked down one of Mr Navalny's poisoners at his home and confronted him on video, since lifted to the internet. This was considered criminal infringement and thus the trial. One can readily guess the probable outcome. She was removed from court today for filming inside the court and not stopping when ordered; she will likely face other charges similar to contempt of court as well.

Russia is continuing its massive buildup of troops along Ukraine's border. There are also unverified reports of Belarussian troops moving to the Belarus-Ukraine border which is risky as Lukashenko's regime is not secure and movement of security forces to the border coincides with a renewed effort to restart the demonstrations. Most open source analysts seem to think this is posturing prior to renewed peace talks. The US, on the other hand, has said it will support Ukraine, something that wasn't totally

clear. So why the ramp up in tensions in the first place? The Russians maintain it is Ukraine's own anti-Russian actions against Russian language news media outlets that have caused this tension. Ukraine, however, has maintained that Russia has continued its support for the separatists that are also supported by 'volunteers' on leave from the Russian Army. More than 20 Ukrainian soldiers have been killed, including four more this week, as well as more than 80 soldiers wounded in action. Russia has constantly worked towards creating instability in its neighbour but Ukraine seems to be even less inclined to cooperate with Russia because of its actions.

China is continuing to rein in Hong Kong with the virtual elimination of the democratic movement's ability to operate. It is suspected that the Communist Chinese Party (CCP) authorities will start to eliminate the Hong Kong court system, in past noted for its impartiality, and it will likely impose the more traditional CCP directed court system with its 99% conviction rate. The One Country, Two Systems is well and truly dead. The CCP's deceit in regard to the Sino-British Agreement on Hong Kong will be well noted by Taiwan and the world.

The CCP's Maritime Militia is continuing to sow problems in the South China Sea for both Viet Nam and the Philippines. The Chinese use their fishing boats as battering rams against a country's coast guard equivalent to remove them from areas claimed by China and the country. In the Philippines case nearly 220 vessels were used to intimidate Philippine forces. The US considers the Maritime Militia as military vessels.

Canadian Peacekeeping Veterans' Association 75th Anniversary Project (PK75)

The Canadian Peacekeeping Veterans' Association (CPVA) intends to publish an anthology in 2023 to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of Peacekeeping by Canadians (https://www.cpva.ca/pk75). Since 1948 approximately 125,000 thousand Canadians (military, police, civilians) have served in UN Peacekeeping missions around the world. Another 5,000 plus have served in other missions such as MFO, NATO, or AU PK constructs. 130 Canadians have died in PK missions.

Scheduled to be completed in early 2023, the anthology will be distributed freely with the intent to educate young people as well as to enhance public awareness of Canada's longstanding contribution to peacekeeping. As such, schools and universities will be key target audiences and recipients of the anthology, as will institutions, media outlets, government departments, military and police organizations, relevant humanitarian organizations, public figures of influence, and industries with a connection to peacekeeping.

The CPVA online magazine *Blue Beret* is showcasing PK anecdotes after minor editing for grammar and provocative political statements. Other than that one caveat, veterans are free to recount their experiences - as lived - as the intent of this anthology is to depict peacekeeping to Canadians as it really is rather than what successive generations have been led to believe, e.g. the UN blue beret is a wellrespected shield.

I would appreciate you sharing this information with your varied networks seeking volunteers to contribute a personal peace keeping anecdote to enrich the anthology.

Photos of the veteran – either contemporary or at the time of the mission are welcomed to illustrate their anecdotes. Everything should be sent by e-mail to Greg Mitchell (<u>CPVA.Anthology@gmail.com</u>), preferably all together attached to one message.

While the other articles are predominantly from retired CAF members, there is also one RCMP and one civilian article thus far. More submissions are welcome as the CPVA wishes to depict all ranks, the varied contributing organizations, and of course, the personal stories of our PK veterans.
