of the old Health Canada National Emergency Stockpile System 'hospital-in-a-box' have been deployed, or are even deployable (all 200 may have been disposed of some years ago) is a question.

Hopefully the lessons (and equipment) of such mobile health units are being collected and analyzed in order that health authorities are better ready for the next emergency when such units are needed. Of course, a if not the critical component is staff - how will Canada ensure it has the right number and types of medical personnel? A National Medical Reserve? A Canadian Forces Medical Reserve of greater size than just required for military operations and plans?



Trial Haida Gwaii Voluntary Protection Zone for shipping reporting changes

This just came up to our attention thanks to our colleagues in the Company of Master Mariners of Canada. A voluntary protection zone, though Transport Canada Ship Safety Bulletin 26/2020 states "commercial vessels that are of 500 gross tonnage or more must travel at least 50 nautical miles



away from the shores of the west coast of Haida Gwaii." 'Must' is not voluntary in mil speak. And 50 miles is outside territorial waters and the contiguous zone. Is Canada setting a bad precedent that China and other authoritarian regimes will utilize to reduce the 'freedom of the ocean common' and the passage of trade thereon?

Further, the rationale for the zone (which is linked from the Safety Bulletin to a website by the Council of Haida Nation and Transport Canada) seems to be environmental. One wonders what consideration was given to a marine protection zone.

"Each Mark 41 cell is compatible with Standard air-defense missiles, Tomahawk land-attack cruise missiles, Evolved Sea Sparrow point-defense missiles and ASROC anti-submarine rockets."

The Canadian Surface Combatant project ships will carry the Mark 41 missile vertical launch system with 32 cells. Not the number of cells to put the CSC ships in league with destroyers and cruisers, but that capability will make them potent multi-role frigates, well capable of independent operations (which currently appears to be the Canadian naval strategy). There are other measures differentiating corvettes, frigates, destroyers and cruisers, but increasingly number of missile cells is becoming the measure of significance.

in the country's shipyards to 'accelerate the upgrading of fishing equipment.' The scholars recommended that the state support the construction of elite, or 'backbone' (骨干), fleets in the South China Sea. Vessels in the fleet would have 'advanced equipment, high mobility, and good safety characteristics.'"

Hmm, fishing as a strategic industry. Well, fishing certainly has been the cause of inter-state confrontation and even conflict, in the past and now. All part of differing takes on the 'freedom of the ocean common.' Interesting, too, for a government to subsidize the building of highly capable ('backbone' has something to the word) fishing vessels. Of course, China makes use, good use, of such vessels and the maritime militia who crew them as part of their whole-of-government (really, whole-of-society) and hybrid warfare approach to inter-state relations.

Canada could do well to study this. Is Fisheries and Oceans Canada ready to experience and manage (contend with?) such situations, especially if it is IUU (illegal, unreported and unregulated) fishing? Other agencies, the Royal Canadian Navy and Canadian Coast Guard, need to have this as part of their thinking and planning.

"While the United States should not be involved in directly



policing the waters of sovereign states, it can help with detection and monitoring of suspicious and illicit vessels and pass intelligence to regional authorities or international law enforcement agencies. The United States can also do more to provide training for international law enforcement agencies in maritime policing, vessel boarding, search and seizure procedures, and by focusing joint exercises on combating IUU (illegal, unreported and unregulated) fishing."

"IUU fishing is also a vehicle for transnational organized crime and is connected to issues such as slavery and forced labor, human trafficking, smuggling, money laundering and tax evasion."

Canada would do well, too, if it looked at intelligence sharing, training, and free-rider law enforcement agreements as means for enhancing inter-state relations and for contributing to the good order of the ocean common. This needs to be a multi-agency effort, involving the navy, coast guard, fisheries and other government departments and industries.

The Royal Canadian Navy has capable submarine search and rescue organizations on Canada's east and west coasts, and




routinely exercises it (e.g., "Rescue of HMCS Ojibwa a SMASHEX success" https://www.lookoutnewspaper.com/rescue-hmcs-ojibwa-smashex-success/). There are arrangements with other states to collaborate in submarine search and rescue (SUBSAR) through the International Submarine Escape and Rescue Liaison Office (ISMERLO). To what extent that Canadian and foreign resources could conduct a SUBSAR in the Arctic is unknown. The article makes a good point about an approach that takes advantage of technology and adds some SUBSAR capability to more ships, naval and civil. The Harry DeWolf-class Arctic and Offshore Patrol Vessels and similar ships could make excellent SUBSAR vessels-of-opportunity (VOOP).

It is not certain at this time of writing whether the Indonesian submarine was lost due to maintenance issues, aging material, environmental conditions ('internal wave') or something else. It is certain that Canada's Victoria-class submarines are aging. Likely the boats are costing more now to maintain. It is time to be planning, and for public discussion, about their replacement, whether that be with crewed boats, underwater drones or some combination. The National Shipbuilding Strategy needs a refresh.

A submarine force is a strategic asset to a state. Maintaining





If a state lets a submarine capability wither, it would be long and hard to reconstitute. Canada needs to be looking at replacing its Victoria-class submarines now. It could be years before they are replaced, years that will go by quickly. We need to keep up our numbers in boats and especially in people.

technical or tactical reason for this other than whoever wrote the RFP thinks the Sig's features are must haves. It appears that it is not a fair procurement process from the get go.





Afghanistan

The Afghan withdrawal and the moral and ethical decision to withdraw pose a problem not only personally but also to the West as a whole. I have always found it surprising that many felt that nation re-construction/building could take so little time. There was fairly common knowledge amongst the diplomatic corps that this was a multi-generational task. This would not create a Canada in Afghanistan but a functioning Afghan democracy based on Afghan traditions and culture. Yet less than a full generation we are expecting a "victory," what were people thinking? More importantly, what will be the personal cost to those who supported us? Women? And to the former workers on NATO bases. With this withdrawal, we have told the world made up of countries like Afghanistan that they are not worth it. The West will simply write off 27 million folks. Can anyone trust the West to

follow through with action when the going gets tough? How do similar countries now look at Western assurances in future; does anyone trust us? Look at what happened to the Kurds. Have we become the enemy? Afghanistan will fall back into a civil war, many lives will be lost, lives of people who trusted us. For what it is worth, I believe that Canada had it right by guiding folks to take on jobs more complex than "trigger pullers." Our young diplomats, development, justice, civil police and corrections folks amongst others were the real 'big guns' but they were only there for three years in insufficient numbers to make a difference - but they did make a difference. It is a pity we as Canada were not made of sterner stuff. As I have said then and I say now, twenty-seven million folks are worth it.

China

New Zealand Prime Minister PM Jacinda Arden has publicly criticized China in a recent interview. She and her Foreign Minister were harshly criticized for the lack of support from New Zealand for the views of the other members of the Five Eyes community. She basically stated that as China rises, there is growing aggression towards the world and a greater crackdown internally in areas such as Tibet, Xinxiang, Inner Mongolia, Hong Kong and efforts against Taiwan. These changes have been increasingly evident under Chairman Xi. It was also interesting that Xi is now being called the 'Great Helmsman,' the final piece as Xi has now taken on the title last used by Chairman Mao. What can we expect next from the Great Helmsman? I suspect a major miscalculation.

Speaking of a miscalculation, China's much vaunted carrier rocket for the first piece of the new independent Chinese Space Station is now hurtling out of control and will enter the atmosphere in an uncontrolled fashion and is heading for a crash somewhere on Earth. The rocket is approximately 22 tons and will have leftover fuel and other toxic materials which are not expected to completely burn up in the atmosphere. The expected debris field has yet to be determined but could cover hundreds of square kilometers and leave solid pieces and perhaps serious contamination. Strangely, the Chinese media have only talked about the success without telling the other side of the story, one of a complete debacle.

The Philippine Coast Guard is being blocked by Chinese Coast Guard in Philippine waters as described by the International Courts. President Duterte has spent most of his term trying to gain influence and support of China only to be continually rebuffed. This time, however, the Chinese may pay a greater price as the Philippines were going to cancel agreements with the US on defence. This act appears to be on hold. US warships were instrumental in removing the Chinese Maritime Militia from concentrating in Philippine waters.

China has always wanted to have a way of breaking through the First Island Chain and has tried to make headway in many of the smaller island nations in the Pacific. This week, Kiribati signed a deal to rebuild their airfield with China. Kiribati is a small island state of approximately 120 k people on 32 islands. Its capital is Tarawa of USMC fame in the Second World War. It recognized China after China offered routine flights through a Chinese airline and brand-new ferries for inter-island travel. The rebuilt airport is the latest Chinese effort and is typical of debt diplomacy. It is an interesting choice, it might be useful at some point, but it is more likely part of the Communist Chinese Party's efforts to further isolate Taiwan.

China's actions are more aggressive abroad and more repressive at home and will be discussed at this week's G7 meeting of foreign ministers hosted by Britain. Marc Garneau to attend in person. This will be the first in- person meeting since Covid 19 pandemic. It is hoped a more determined outlook will be developed to meet autocratic regimes such as Russia, Iran and China.

Russia

There is a much larger crackdown on independent Russian media by Russia declaring most independent outlets as foreign agents and imposing fines on people who forward an article without declaring the article's source, i.e., a foreign agent. Meduza, an actual Russian paper has been declared a foreign agent despite being completely Russian. Thus even espousing outside views is now seen as 'foreign.' Another method of this crackdown is pro-Putin regime oligarchs suing media outlets, stating they have been maligned is some form. Most media outlets have shallow pockets and even a minor lawsuit can cause collapse them. Lawsuits also can be directed at individual reporters in order to shut them up.

Russian forces in the Central African Republic (CAR), along with the local troops, have been accused of various crimes in regard to their operations by the CAR government. There is little actual information available as yet but accusations by Russian forces in regard to war crimes and allegations of abuse and corruption should materialize. It should be mentioned that most 'Russian troops' in the CAR are likely to be from private military companies (PMC). Russia has used PMC to provide plausible deniability for their actions. This allows a fair amount of latitude in their operations and their actions are seldom brought to light in public and the Russian media, if any, will be friendly, so there is very little oversight.

Belarus

Lukashenko has been indicted on charges in Germany brought by ten Belarussians who had been arrested and tortured by Belarussian security forces. Germany has previously prosecuted members of the Syrian Security Forces as well for their actions. The UN set up an investigation team in March as well to investigate Belarus Security Force actions. It is likely that Lukashenko will also be affected by these investigations. Putin will not appreciate the actions.
