

The US obviously has a much greater requirement than Canada does in shipping our forces overseas to where they

may need to be to deter or counter aggression. But Canada does need to move stuff, and strategic airlift cannot match sealift. Canada has learned from the GTS KATIE incident, where army equipment was held up in a commercial dispute, what can happen when sealift is not under government control. For a while, the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) had a full-time charter of a small container ship (I sailed in one, WLOCEWEK, a Soviet-era Polish container vessel apparently ready to be reconfigured as a landing ship). It can be a question, even with as little shipping as the CAF may need for likely operations, whether Canada would be able to access the shipping it could need in a major confrontation. Is there the infrastructure ashore to support a major deployment, and how would that be organized? Is there sufficient ship conversion and repair capability, and if a situation lasted, sufficient







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shipbuilding? A study of current Canadian-flagged shipping and Canadian shipbuilding would be interesting to peruse.

Whether an organization (military or non-military, the utility is the same) includes a JFICC (by whatever title), it makes sense to ensure unity of information action.



This article is about 'open source intelligence' (OSINT) and

public messaging, two topics not often enough considered together. Intelligence has long been derived from reading the open or public media. Despite concerns about mixing truth (cynically one could say 'to the extent one gets truth in the public media') and falsehood, those who practice media operations and those who are in the business of affecting the thinking of competitors and adversaries and for whom truth is the best weapon, really do need to be coordinating if not collaborating. That includes exchanging procedures, studying competitors and potential adversaries, and even studying one's own people, for the last are the targets of the former. And to protect one's own, one has to know them and their environment.

The use by China of its fishing fleets, especially those that are maritime militia, for inter-state action make the vessels

appropriate targets for intelligence tracking and analysis. This is not something that Canada can ignore, as Chinese vessels are intruding into the waters of our allies and friends, and are certainly encountered when our government vessels, including warships, and merchant ships carry out their legitimate sailings abroad. The Fisheries and Oceans Canada National Fishery Intelligence Service have an importance well beyond that of monitoring activity by local fisherman in Canadian waters.

Another containership fire resulting in a Hazardous & Noxious Substances (HNS) situation. Aside from harbour

tugs and offshore support vessels with fire monitors, there is no defined at-sea HNS response capability in Canada. Interesting question to pose to Canadian Coast Guard where 16 multi-purpose vessels are to be built.

Within Europe, a Marine HNS Response Manual project was recently implemented through an interregional effort, including the participation of the Regional Marine Pollution Emergency Response Centre for the Mediterranean Sea (REMPEC), the Bonn Agreement for the Greater North Sea and its approaches and the Helsinki Commission (HELCOM) for the Baltic Sea. The project benefits from the technical support and expertise of expert partner institutions such as Cedre, ISPRA and ITOPF.

Germany is currently building replacement multi-purpose vessels with comprehensive HNS response capability. Germany covers response to HNS in its National Contingency Plan. Germany's capability for responding to HNS spills is limited to the recovery of mainly packaged goods. However, interventions in highly explosive and toxic atmospheres are possible because of the very sophisticated gas protection and analyzing systems on board its 4 multipurpose vessels (2 stationed in the North Sea and 2 in the Baltic). These vessels are all equipped with detection, recovery and storage devices for hazardous substances and accommodation and equipment facilities for additional strike units of 30 people each. They can also do sampling of air and water and in situ atmospheric monitoring. Germany

has specialized response teams for HNS spills. The fire brigade are also available for HNS response. Regular exercises and training programs have been established for vessels and personnel. Germany has several experts from scientific agencies and industry who come together on a case by case basis to advise the CCME. Germany has been involved in the response to a number of HNS incidents, including IEVOLI SUN (2000, Styrene, methyl ethyl ketone, isopropyl alcohol and ANDINET (2003, Arsenic pentoxide). Imagine the incident occurring off Sri Lanka were to happen in Vancouver or Montreal, major population centers hemmed in by mountains or, a river respectively.

Security Affairs Committee Synopsis

Belarus

President Lukashenko has outdone himself by creating a new form of air piracy: 'state air piracy.' On Sunday, 23 May 2021, President Lukashenko personally ordered a Belarussian fighter to 'escort' a Ryanair flight to Lithuania back to land at Minsk. The reason given to the pilot was that there was a bomb on board and that he had to land a Minsk under threat. It became apparent quickly that there was no bomb and that the real target was Mr Roman Protasevich, a well-known activist who was involved with last year's demonstrations against the Lukashenko regime. Mr Protasevich was arrested with his girlfriend Sofiya Sapega (She is a Russian citizen. Russia said she will be released shortly.) who was accompanying him back to Lithuania and his job with the Belarussian exile media outlet 'Nexta.' Mr Protasevich had been declared a terrorist by the Lukashenko regime.

Almost all western airlines are now avoiding Belarusian airspace and Belarussian airlines are now banned in many countries. There is every evidence that further bans and sanctions will be coming shortly from the EU and others. The Lukashenko regime which has very little credibility in most of the

world, has taken short term gain for massive pain in the long run. The only country that has shown any support is Russia. Belarus will become an increasing burden on Russia's already weakened economy. Further sanctions, however, will be of limited value as the Belarussian economy is stagnant, moribund and already under sanctions. Something more substantial must be done to discourage future acts of this nature. The real question is whether the western nations will act effectively or by their lack of action actually encourage future use of this method by other state actors. Russia has said that it unfortunate that airlines are avoiding Belarusian airspace, saying it will be more uncomfortable for passengers as flights will take so much longer...one has to wonder who writes their stuff as it goes in the category of truth is stranger than fiction.

Even Canada has joined the chorus against Belarus, calling the actions of the Belarus leadership outrageous and illegal. Canada also stated that there are sanctions coming shortly in consultation with our allies. Canada already has significant sanctions on Belarus individuals. Belarus announced that it was closing its embassy in Canada by 1 September 2021. Wow, too bad Canada doesn't take action against China for its genocidal efforts against Uyghurs, Mongolians, Tibetans, Muslims minorities around the country, Falun Gong, Buddhist and Christian Protestants and many, many others, but that is OK because of all the great business we will do with China. Time to get real.

Late this week, Alexandre Lukashenko lashed out at the international community, complaining about the international reaction to his air piracy. He even said the plane could have been used by terrorists to crash into a Belarus nuclear power plant, and continued as well with the idea of a bomb on board. Imagine being totally fearful of your own people, seeing a boogeyman at every turn, being afraid to even leave one's own house without security forces in vast quantity. Living in your own bubble knowing that you are hated and despised by your own people. One also has to wonder how long it is before one starts wondering about your own security services? There are articles that say the movement to remove him is dead...is it or is it laying in wait for better weather and conditions? Belarus' story is far from over one might suspect.

Russia

Alexei Navalny is being charged with further criminal activities; this time the charge is insulting a judge. Mr Navalny joked that his 'crime syndicate' is growing given the number and nature of the charges. This is the third set of charges he is facing. The first is misuse of funds from his organization the Anti-Corruption Foundation, the second is the creation of an organization that "infringes on the identity and rights of citizens" by pointing out gross corruption of government officials including Vladimir Putin. The third was insulting a Second World War veteran who spoke highly of Putin, and now includes insulting a judge...the same judge who has presided over a kangaroo court, Judge Vera Akimova. What is interesting is that each time the regime makes up these various charges, the more they seem to draw attention to their own failings. Navalny is not popular but the constant drum beat of actions against him draw further attention to him and his crusade against the Putin regime and its overall corruption. This is not a good practice in the long run. The Putin regime is widely disliked within the younger generation. Last year's demonstrations also showed how widespread the growing movement against the regime is, it is literally country wide. Thus far the regime and security forces have managed to keep things in check but cracks are showing.

Russia continues to fight the coronavirus with over 5 million people affected to date. Some have placed the figure as much higher due to under reporting. There is also wide-spread distrust of the Sputnik vaccine which is causing reluctance by people to get the shot. Russia's overall fatalities are also not effectively reported; some have suggested by about three times the official figure.

The article by Mark Galeotti "Hacking Controversy Highlights Kremlin's self-Destructive Approach" (https://www.themoscowtimes.com/2021/05/19/hacking-controversy-highlights-kremlins-selfdestructive-approach-a73943) is an interesting and thought-provoking piece. The controversy over the Solarwinds hack and subsequent exploitation by criminal gangs has caused a great deal of harm in the west. Mr Galeotti wants us to believe that the initial hack was done by the security services as espionage not to do damage but the handing off to criminal gangs within Russia has done harm and caused a considerable economic loss which is still the responsibility of the Kremlin despite Mr Galeotti's argument. Russia can be trusted to be totally untrustworthy, anything they do should be examined with increased scrutiny for malicious intent. Mr Galeotti is right, they are rightly assumed to be a mafia state as Mr Navalny has pointed out. The Kremlin has also gone after folks who have criticized it, such as Ben Browder and others who have pointed out the Putin regime's extreme corruption. There is very little room for real cooperation or trust while the Putin regime exists.

Israel-Palestine

The truce is holding as of the writing of this article after eleven days of fighting between Hamas militants and Israel. Hamas fired over 4000 rockets and missiles, showing greater sophistication than in previous efforts. Israel's Iron Dome Missile Defence System proved quite capable but the expenditure of missiles was very high to the point that perhaps Israel would have run out. Twelve Israelis died and approximately 250 Palestinians were killed and thousands more displaced. There was a lot of damage and the imagery of large buildings tumbling to the ground after air strikes was memorable to say the least. Who won? Is there ever a winner in conflict...the answer is yes, Hamas has won the battle for peoples' minds, especially in the West where we are seeing a surprising back lash against Israel.

Hamas is a terrorist organization. Its own charter requires the destruction of Israel and it will conduct itself in a way that inflicts massive damage to its own people. How? Hamas has taken large quantities of material such as concrete to build large tunnel systems directly under homes and buildings. It has also built underground factories for the building of rockets and missiles either of old Soviet-style rockets or more recently Iranian developed systems. As seen on released video of air strikes rocket launchers were often set up in civilian yards or court yards in between buildings. Even if the rocket launcher was destroyed, the effect on the local population was significant. The scenes of crying mothers and relatives on film were seen in the west notably at 6 pm suppertime. So Hamas did win the information war whether we like it or not. Too many folks do not believe that anyone would purposely set up their own people for this effect and therefore, to the delight of Hamas, Israel looks like the 'bad guy.' When all is said and done, the efforts of Hamas need to be studied and countermeasures found on their long-term development of their information warfare program. Hamas is a recognized terror organization and they are utterly ruthless but somehow they have become the 'good guy.' Go figure.

Iran

Iran will no longer provide the International Atomic Energy Agency access through remote cameras to Iranian nuclear facilities. This is in part an effort by hardliners to gain support from hardline factions to their Presidential candidate. This is partially in response to the United States trying to reinvigorate the treaty that limited Iran's efforts in purifying nuclear fuels, now reported by the Iranians to be significantly more than allowed under the old treaty.

This week also saw a major explosion in a factory producing drones in Iran - significant damage was done to the facility. It is the latest in a whole series of bomb attacks throughout Iran which also saw the Nantaz nuclear works sabotaged and a major air base suffer damage. No one has claimed responsibility at this point although Israel is suspected. It seems that the regime is unable to effectively stop these efforts at this point which is weakening the 'moderates' in Iran in the forthcoming elections. This would likely mean that hard-liners take control of the government which does not seem to be of benefit to anyone and would likely mean the end of any hope to restart negotiations on the nuclear agreement forged by Six Nations plus Iran.

China

This week saw China threaten Sweden as the Swedes determine whether to allow Huawei or not into the country's communications and telephone system. China responded in the typical ways of the Communist Chinese Party (CCP) and of course threatened Sweden. At least Sweden is making a decision which is far cry from Canada's laggardly efforts.

China is continuing its crackdown on dissidents in Hong Kong, making sure that only patriots are capable of being elected to the Legislative Assembly. No real surprise but the real change is the move against big landowners in Hong Kong who have been responsible for high land prices in the city. These powerful and rich landowners have been supporters of the CCP's overall actions within the former colony as 'stability' also helped them. As with other Communist takeovers, the party will use the gullible to assist the takeover until they are no longer needed. It is a story that bears repeating to those who are looking for their riches in China. It is only temporary/ One will have no real loyalty from the CCP and anything one can build or invest in mainland China is subject to the whims of the CCP. This effort should be considered along with the crackdown on mainland Chinese oligarchs that have had the temerity to complain about the administration of the CCP. Long conversations in a small room are likely the future for these folks.

China also has continued its slow methodical approach to the theft of Nepalese and Bhutanese territory, setting up 'villages' and border points within the territory of those two countries. Mount Everest is one site that is affected by the Chinese incursion.

South Korea has also complained about illegal Chinese fishing fleets fishing in South Korea's exclusive economic zone. North Korea has also had difficulties with the same but has apparently fired warning shots through the hulls and fishermen. It seems that is a little over the top but it is a way having getting folks to understand the seriousness of their offence. Japan also has commented that the ongoing incursions into Japanese waters are still taking place.

On a more pleasant note, the CCP is apparently concerned that the winter Olympics may be boycotted as more pressure is being placed on the CCP's ongoing genocidal actions against the Uyghurs. The IOC's comments that they are not political cannot be believed and. to my knowledge, genocide is not political it is a moral and ethical issue, something that the IOC understands very little. The CCP can and will use this event not as a sporting event but as a showcase for their 'system.' What is political will be the actions of governments that support these games. There is a moral duty to stop providing these gross human rights abusers with a venue and a platform.
