

The move to treat cyber crimes as terrorism is interesting. What makes cyber crime viable is the criminals' ability not to attract enough attention so law enforcement (or any other type of enforcement) tracks them down. The change in US policy, starting with the appointment of a senior person in the US Justice Department, pretty much ends the happy days times hackers have had so far.

Hackers believe they are smarter than other people. They also believe they are invisible behind their false names and firewalls. These fallacies are promoted by a lot of media created by Hollywood. This article about a different and interesting foreign drydock, used for shipbuilding and shipbreaking, leads to some thoughts about Canadian yards and their drydocks. The



Canadian National Shipbuilding Strategy (NSS) has a strong 'build up the shipbuilding industry' ("create jobs") aspect to it. Arguably, the economic aspect is the priority of the strategy, ahead of ensuring the marine services actually have all the resources to undertake their missions (after all, funding will ultimately limit procurement of all the equipment that departments assess they need and want). As a big-dollar government strategy, the measures of progress and success of the NSS should be of interest to Canadians. It's easy enough to count the number and timeliness of ships built or refitted (the infographic at https://www.tpsgc-pwgsc.gc.ca/app-acq/amd-dp/mer-sea/sncn-nss/rapport-report-2020-6-eng.html leans that way). The number of jobs in yards and dollars spent are other easy measures. But what about the shipbuilding industry as a whole? That is, what has been achieved between the start of the strategy and now? For that, one has to know what we started with. Obviously of concern enough for government to develop the strategy in the first place. But, other than maybe buried deep within government and academic staff studies, is there information about the capability of the shipyards that can be and should be public? Drydocks, their numbers, locations, capacities, and the like, are an indicator of the strength of the industry. What information about drydocks is public? Is Canada better off now than when the NSS started?

"A compelling solution is to establish an unmanned sea control squadron (VUS) squadron. These squadrons would

provide Sea Combat Commanders with a dedicated medium-range ASW (anti-submarine warfare) aircraft that would allow commanders to detect, classify, track, target, and engage submarines outside their WEZ (weapons engagement zone)."

Canada does not have aircraft carriers from which to fly medium-range anti-submarine drones. But it does have a large deck in the form of the leased replenishment oiler *Asterix*, will have large decks when the Protecteur-class replenishment oilers are built, and could have large decks by leasing civil vessels for multi-role employment. With the right kind of drones (vertical take off and landing?) and probably a lot of engineering (hmm, shouldn't drones be looked on as multi-role 'trucks' anyways?), a tremendous capability could be added to Royal Canadian Navy task groups.

It'll be interesting, too, when Canada announces the names of the 15 Canadian Surface Combatant project ships and of the four Naval Large Tug vessels. There will be messaging in the selection of names.

The article also shows that the CCP will use everything at its disposal to further its own ambitions and views and taint other countries' faults and errors. In Canada's case, the country does have answering to do for the residential school system. It can only be described as horrific, but at least it is being examined and there is consensus amongst the citizens of Canada that something must be done. There is no question about that at all.

Ajax is a family of armoured fighting vehicles being developed by General Dynamics UK for the British Army.

There has been some discussion of late of growth margins (weight, volume, power, cooling) in the Canadian Surface Combatant and other Type 26-derived ships – Australian Hunter-class appears to have a small margin, not the 10% one would expect with a frigate. So it was interesting to appreciate that vehicles would have growth margins, too.

Security Affairs Committee Synopsis

Iran

Iran has again been beset by a series of fires and bombings including a steel mill after losing a warship, *Kharg*, last week off the Iranian coast. Whilst there are many who wish to pin reponsibility on the US or the Israelis, there is another option and that is incompetence. It is hard to keep conspiracy theories quiet though; I am still reminded of the old saying many of analyst instructors used to say: "Never put down to conspiracy when it could be just plain old incompetence." Iran has lost three vessels in the relatively recent past. One was a relatively new destroyer of the Caspian squadron which ran into a breakwater, second a naval vessel was accidently hit by a missile during a live fire (the ship was saved

but was a constructive write-off) and now *Kharg*. One also has to remember last year the IRGC barge made to look like a Nimitz-class carrier sank as it entered the harbour as a result of damage during a showcase attack. It took days to remove. So is it possible that with the airbase explosion that ammunition safety wasn't followed or at a drone plant or even a steel mill?

The new Iranian elections are coming up on 18 June 2021 and the Guardian Council has pretty much eliminated anyone who is moderate or reformist so Iranian voters will have the choice of hardliner or another hardliner. Although one candidate did say he would be willing to meet President Biden, the former head of the Iranian Central Bank, Abdolnasser Hemmatti has made an almost diplomatic statement regarding the nuclear deal and the return to talks with the US. He is not likely to win, though, and is well back in the pack of seven candidates for president. Still, it is of note. The real losers are the people of Iran, who are expected to largely ignore the election. As mentioned in last week's synopsis, opposition groups are advocating the election be boycotted. It should be interesting.

Russia

The Putin regime is continuing its crackdown on independent media both internal and foreign. Some, like Vtimes, a virtual entity, will cease publishing now that they have been declared a "foreign agent." This term has been used a legal stick to beat media outlets and reporters and it has been devastating overall to the quality of reporting in Russia. Pretty bad when Pravda and Tass or RT are your sources. Even small social media efforts are now receiving scrutiny and, if necessary, threats if they are outspoken about the Putin regime.

In order to further disquiet local opposition in the future and to bring Russian authoritarianism to a higher standard, President Putin has signed a bill founding the National Genetic Information Database which will be greatly assisted by a known Putin supporter, Mikhail Kovalchuk. The main effort once this is founded is to create a "genetic passport" by 2025. Mr Kovachuk's efforts will be greatly assisted by those well-known humanitarians, the FSB; reassuring to everyone no doubt.

Russia has sanctioned nine Canadians for their unfriendly behavior towards Russia including LGen Mike Rouleau and CF Int Com's outgoing commander, RAdm Bishop. As wel, the head of the RCMP, Commissioner Brenda Lucki. Well done, sirs and madame, wear it with honour.

Russia has also stated that it intends to leave the International Space Station by 2025 and will continue to work on its own program in cooperation with the Chinese.

On another note, on Tuesday, 8 June 2021 Alexei Navalny was awarded the "courage award" by the Geneva Summit for Human Rights and Democracy. It was accepted by his daughter, Daria, who also mentioned that her father was accepting it on behalf of all Russia's opposition leaders, especially those who are less well known but still keep up the efforts against the corruption of the regime. Mr Navalny is apparently out of hospital and is back enjoying the comforts of his normal jail cell in a penal colony. It was announced by numerus media outlets that all of Alexei Navalny's organizations and those organizations with connections to his Anti-Corruption Foundation have been declared as "extremist" organizations and are therefore outlawed. It will set the opposition back but at the same time it will also make ordinary Russians think about their own government. The Navalny organization has pointed out gross examples of corruption by government officials and their oligarch supporters, causing considerable embarrassment. What polls have shown is that most Russians have accepted that their government is fundamentally corrupt, but that they have two opinions, one for the public face and one an internal view. While the government has bought time, has it increased its level of survivability?

Jens Stoltenberg, NATO Secretary-General met with President Biden to discuss issues for the 14 June 2021 NATO Security Summit. This emphasized commitments to push Russia when necessary but to cooperate on major issues such as climate change and cyber threats.

Hungary

Hungary is undergoing considerable unrest over the policies of Prime Minister Victor Orban. Hungary has lately been vetoing many European Union (EU) decisions on key issues such as the recent Israel-Hamas conflict. The Orban government has also been supporting a more pro-Beijing point of view within the EU. This is difficult given issues regarding Chinese actions. Many people are demonstrating against the new Fudan University Campus to be built in Budepest. The city mayor who is quite anti-Orban government has renamed streets to ones such as 'Free Hong Kong' and similar meant to aggravate the Chinese Communist Party. As time has gone on the populist government of Mr Orban has steadily lost popularity. Still, he is quite capable of stirring up issues and thus remains possibly to remain the man in charge. Time will tell.

Belarus

Since the air piracy of Alexander Lukashenko, which was both unexpected due to its rashness, new video footage has been played on the government television station, showing Roman Protosevich confessing his guilt and now supporting the dictator. His face is according to reports showing bruises. His girlfriend, also arrested at the same time, has been treated in a similar manner. The fallout from Lukashenko's actions have been swift but limited and caused the Belarusian national airline to cease operations as they literally cannot land anywhere in Europe. Still, what Lukashenko has done requires a bit more and sanctions just will not do the job in this case. If one authoritarian regimes takes such action to stop an opposition leader at the potential expense of innocent lives of other passengers, what is to stop other authoritarians from doing the same? Perhaps declaring Lukashenko a wanted criminal along with key members of his government and supporters either charged or heavily sanctioned might be an answer. Lending any legitimacy to this regime would be a mistake.

China

In practical terms, China the country is used as a heading, but in real terms, it is the Communist Chinese Party (CCP) that is the cause of most of the difficulties. Untold millions have died at their hands and even today, cultural genocide is being refined to perfection to eliminate alleged 'terrorist' behavior. The CCP denies all of this as Western propaganda despite the real testimony of victims who managed to escape the horrors of CCP indoctrination camps. The CCP has done everything that the Third Reich has done to eliminate opposition, both real or imagined, and has been efficient about it. Colonization has also taken place with Han Chinese colonists. In many areas there are no capacity for actual independent media and reporters to investigate. When one thinks of the founding of the UN post Second World War, there was a vow to not let the holocaust happen again. Here we are in the 21st century and the CCP and of course others such as Iran and North Korea are being allowed to escape legal action against their leadership for committing genocide and mass murder. Whether the victims are Tibetans, Uyghurs, Mongolians and other minority groups, the CCP seems to think that whole cultures can be relegated to "happy dancing videos" so recently provided on the internet. Christians, Muslims, Buddhists, Falun Gong practitioners and others have also been persecuted by this regime. It is appalling and the world has failed...again.

There is a story in Wednesday's South China Morning Post, now owned by a pro-CCP publisher, which ran a story on the Tibetan province of Qinghai which was mainly populated by Tibetans and is the birth province of the Dalai Lama. It has been colonised by the Han Chinese who now make up

75% of the population. (It should be clearly noted that the Peoples' Liberation Army of the CCP attacked, invaded and occupied Tibet in June 1950. It remains occupied by invading forces to this day.) The article speaks favourably about how the CCP has managed to 'convert' Tibetans to patriotic Chinese citizens. The role of the local party secretary was highly praised by President Xi who suggested that the province is now considered a blueprint for Xinjiang Province. (Xinjiang Province is the country of East Turkistan, which was attacked, invaded and occupied by the PLA of the CCP in June 1950. It is occupied to this day.) Most of the effort seemed to be focused on the introduction of Han Chinese and the virtual elimination of Tibetan culture in real terms. President Xi has continued these cultural genocidal actions despite being well aware of the definition of genocide, which means that the CCP is and continues to be a historical criminal organization by definition.

The Globe and Mail has published a number of relatively positive views of China. While it is noted that all sides of any position should be examined, one has to wonder about the ethical and moral decision to praise the CCP's China, especially knowing that the CCP has committed mass murder in the vicinity of tens of millions, and continues activities that will relegate minorities to 'happy cultural dance videos' now prominent on various social media platforms. Considering the CCP has committed more murders than the Nazis, is it not time to hold them to account?

O Canada

This week saw the Prime Minister leave for the G7 and NATO Security Summit in Cornwall. UK. and Brussels respectively. The main discussion will be climate change, Covid response and China, according to the media. The last topic will be interesting to watch as the current government has been somewhat less than forthright about the CCP's China. There is talk that President Biden is looking to develop a G7 +3 group to counter China's ongoing aggression in all its forms. This group will include three other democracies, South Korea, India and Australia. While it is expected that Canada will be supportive of the moves in regard to climate change issues and Covid response, it will be especially informative to see how our government positions itself on the issue of the CCP's China. Our positions so far has been as strong as a wet spaghetti noodle. It was painful to watch Minister Garneau suggest that our quiet diplomacy was doing well...by all normal metrics, it is not because of a strangely persistent thought that the CCP's China will provide a panacea of economic benefits. The excuse is that they are constrained by the 'Two Michaels' who are held as hostages by the CCP to pressure Canada in regard to Meng Wanzhou's incarceration by house arrest as opposed to imprisonment and torture and kangaroo courts in China's penal system.

Canada also saw another mass killing by vehicle in London Ontario, where a family of five was brutally hit by a vehicle; four were killed and one, a boy of nine, was injured and orphaned. Political leaders from all levels of government have all beaten their breasts in public, but where is the considered action? This is not the first time. One has to also wonder where is our education on immigration and refugees. These people have chosen Canada to be there home. It isn't as if we can maintain our population with our low birth rates. Without immigration, our country will fail. It also means accommodation on all sides to get along and prosper and grow as a country. As a country we should celebrate this aspect and not treat it as a threat. The accused is being charged with four counts of first degree murder, the highest possible charges available and one that carries the maximum penalties available in Canada.

Canada is not perfect, but we are a lot less imperfect than most any other countries. We are all privileged to be here in relative freedom, peace and prosperity, it is something to celebrate but at the same time not rest on our laurels but recognize our imperfections whether residential schools, water issues on reserves or anti-immigrant actions and most importantly then act.
