



It's Not Misinformation. It's Amplified Propaganda.

From a neutral (depending on your perception of faith) start, "propaganda gradually acquired a secular meaning



- information with an agenda, deliberately created to shape the audience's perception of reality. The term also took on an antidemocratic connotation: Propaganda's intent was to circumvent a citizen's reason, to propel (them) via deceit or chicanery toward belief in a particular cause."

The Government of Canada definition of propaganda is: "Information, especially of a biased or misleading nature, used to promote a political cause or point of view." Propaganda is not inherently bad. It is who uses it and how it is used (both depending on your point of view and objectives) that can make it 'bad.' It becomes a label to make a point against, a label of, another party. (Terminium https://www.btb.termiumplus.gc.ca/tpv2alpha/alpha-eng.html?lang=eng)

Propaganda has been included in a number of recent articles about Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) influence activities (IA) domestically (Terminium; influence activities: "integration of designated information-related capabilities in order to synchronize themes, messages, and actions with operations to inform Canadian and global audiences, influence foreign audiences, and affect adversary and enemy decision making.") Whether the word was chosen by the reporters or headline editors, they are professional and know the word can be emotionally loaded. Use of the word is really only valid (just news being reported) if the reports to which the reporters refer actually use propaganda as an objective of CAF IA.

Propaganda is routinely practiced by all sectors of society, using traditional and modern media. From the article: "To adapt to the new propaganda, the public must first learn to recognize it."

O Canada

The Canada Pension Plan has apparently invested more heavily in mainland Chinese enterprises despite the current meltdown of the Chinese economy and the changes to China's legislation regarding foreign investment, etc. No investment is safe in China at the present time under President Xi. It seems that there are still those who are still thinking that China will evolve and that these changes will not affect the long term world economy and China's role within that context. Investment at the present time seems foolish and there are increasing indications that China's situation will deteriorate further due to

structural changes and the withdrawal of foreign companies to safer locations including India and Vietnam.

Canada also has sold nearly 4m tons of coal to China without questions. It seems more than hypocritical to lambast our own oil and gas industries while providing an even more polluting form of fossil fuels to an adversary to burn and pollute.

There has been no decision on Huawei by the Canadian government; something that should have been a "no brainer." It is increasingly clear that the liberal democracies are realizing that China under its present government is not a safe partner. The "Two Michaels" are home but more than 100 Canadians still languish is Chinese jails. Huawei executives have been found guilty of espionage in European countries. Certainly Canada is no exception to Chinese espionage as was found in the demise of Nortel and near demise of Blackberry.

The National Post had an article by Terry Glavin 13 October 2021 stating that Ambassador Dominic Barton has to go because of his almost obsequious support of the CCP regime instead of looking out for Canadian interests. Ambassador Barton also seemed to be implicated in less than up front actions as a businessman for McKinsey. He was hardly a suitable choice to replace John McCallum. It is likely that he was able to accomplish little and apparently was more interested in how China was squandering its "soft power" in using hostage diplomacy rather than the fate of the "Two Michaels" or any other Canadian. Mr Glavin's article is worth the read and if even half true should result in Mr Barton's removal. It is not expected to have any effect and we will likely continue to have an highly unsuitable ambassador in China.

The Halifax Chronicle-Herald published a story 13 October that states that the Canadian Chinese population was bombarded by a large number of stories in the Canadian Chinese language press that were outright disinformation. As we have seen, a large percentage of the Canadian Chinese language press receives funding by various ways by the Chinese Communist Party's (CCP) United Front. The stories provided extensive misinformation about various issues. The main takeaway from the first group asking for Mr O'Toole's resignation was because of the Conservative party's strong anti-CCP policy within the party platform. The problem is that there was no scrutiny by security forces as to what is apparently a successful CCP influence activity program. As Canadians we should be extremely concerned by CCP influence at any time, let alone during an election. No meaningful moves have been made to eliminate the possibility of foreign influence such as has been done in Australia and New Zealand.

China

China continues to send aircraft to the Taiwanese Air Defence Identification Zone (ADIZ) in fairly large numbers. Taiwan has maintained a calm approach, alerting its missile defence forces but not necessarily scrambling aircraft, thus preventing a possible incident. President Xi once again reiterated that Taiwan will be re-united with China peacefully but again has not ruled out a military option. President Tsai responded that Taiwan would not be bullied and that the only people who can determine Taiwan's fate are the Taiwanese people. Taiwan would remain true to its democratic ideals and not be forced into an authoritarian regime. President Xi had toned down his rhetoric to exclude the mention of force. At the same time, operating in the region is a multi-national fleet consisting of ships from the US, UK, Japan, New Zealand, Canada, the Netherlands, plus others from time to time, and which includes aircraft carriers USS *Carl Vinson*, USS *Ronald Reagan*, HMS *Queen Elizabeth* and JMSDFS *Ise*. Would this cause concern to CCP leadership? Probably. There have been several other large-scale exercises including many local countries, all of which plainly are aimed at China and its actions. It is hard to say whether this will cause any long term changes in China's behavior.

China continues to have major economic issues caused by a series of circumstances. The first is fairly radical changes to the financial regulatory system which provides the party with more control over private firms. Second, action against data transfer out of China to foreign countries will be more strongly regulated. Third, a major crackdown of major entrepreneurs in education, data transfer, sales, property management, entertainment and the financial industries. Nature has been less than kind and extensive damage has been done throughout the country due to unusually heavy rains coupled with a deteriorating water control system. Most importantly, corruption within the party and infighting between various factions within the CCP itself have led to less than stellar performance in the economy.

China is still undergoing major power shortages which have affected 22 out of China's 23 provinces, five autonomous areas, two special administration areas and five large municipalities for a total of 34 different but administratively similar entities. Reports state that this has led to a shutdown of many industries causing wide-spread layoffs throughout the country and subsequently resulting in wide-spread demonstrations by those affected.

Small time investors who invested in property development firms have also caused major disruptions to the CCP's desired stability as many of these smaller investors have been wiped out by recent defaults in China's over heated property markets. It is expected that several large developers will fail in the coming weeks.

Lastly on China, the Indian press has reported that there has been a possible attempt on Xi's life by an insider who had been affected by new financial regulations. There is only one source - is it possible? The answer is yes as the CCP is not monolithic and tends to have various factions all vying for key leadership positions, so the idea that someone may try to kill Xi is always a possibility. But in this case, it is suspected it may be more smoke than anything. Still there are now many folks who are not happy with the present state of affairs caused by Xi's "reforms."

Russia

Russia continues to fumble the Covid virus pandemic with daily cases now trending towards 30k per day with nearly 1000 people dying each day. Around 40% of Russians are fully vaccinated with Russia's own disinformation campaign coming back to bite them as many do not trust the Russian government. President Putin has also stated that he will not impose a national level loc down thus compounding the issue. Russia's actual numbers are suggested to be vastly under-reported. It does not bode well.

The Russian president also blamed the actions of the EU for the current gas shortage in Europe. It is suspected that he is delaying or slowing gas shipments as a way of pressuring the EU to open Nord Stream II. Increased prices work in Russia's favour as oil and gas sales fuel Russia's economy to a large extent.

Mr Putin also gave an address to new members of the Duma from the most recent cynical sham election. One has to admire the brass of the man to try to spin this as anyways legitimate.

Recent studies show that about 300k Russians have left the country permanently every year since 2016. Most are young with a university education. A further 10m Russians live overseas but return from time to time. The report also suggests that one in five Russians would like to leave the country for other countries. Russians are therefore voting in other ways, with their feet to greener pastures.
