

For a possible major action, the extent of the other state's logistics (fuel, ammunition) and medical services preparations are telling.

Some Canadians and others may disagree with the author's taxonomy (generally, service support ships that provide fuel and other necessities to naval ships are replenishment oilers;



ships that move fuel in bulk from port to port are tankers), but the article well highlights the utility and complexity of logistics ships. There are, however, many types of logistics ships, and a navy, as part of decisions about roles and employment (blue water, regional, power projection, sea control), is structured accordingly.

Commercial standards have and can be used to convert and build logistics ships. Motor Vessel ASTERIX, converted from a civil container ship into a replenishment oiler and leased to the Royal Canadian Navy, is a good modern example. The Protecteur-class replenishment oilers being acquired under the Canadian Joint Support Ship project are being built to more stringent naval standards.

Whilst there aren't any Canadian warships due for disposal and breaking, other federal marine department vessels continue to go to, apparently always, Canadian breakers. And the Canadian Coast Guard wrecked, abandoned and hazardous vessels program

The use of fast inshore patrol vessels to conduct policing is a better use of resources than high end frigates and even (smaller than frigates) mine warfare vessels. This "no spare capacity" highlights that the Royal Navy (similar to Royal Canadian Navy?) was not structured to carry out constabulary missions such as countering irregular migration. Their navy, and Canada's, is balanced differently. Offshore (midshore?) patrol vessels for such tasks should be built for and operated by other federal (civil) departments.

O Canada

Can you 3D print that?

I would be remiss not to mention that it is also the start of Black history month. One tends to forget how much the Black community actually has an important place in Canadian and military history from the building of the Citadel by the Maroons to the 2 Construction Battalion in the First World War to the start of integration into the Army in the Second World War and now to their everyday service as members of the Canadian Armed Forces. Yet still they have to jump through hoops that a white person doesn't have to do in order to just do their job. It is truly a wonder and a marvel that the Black community still wants to do the job despite the barriers. I consider it a privilege to have known some of the best and brightest within the Black military community who are true leaders in our country today. The world of defence and security has gotten somewhat better, but we still have a way to go in recognizing their contribution. More importantly, how important it is to simply have the possibility of being able to do their jobs safely and without barriers and be amongst friends and comrades without any reservations and with mutual respect as human beings.

I will start this week's note on a personal view. We have talked about the problems of procurement of new military equipment, but not really about the lack of actual action to sort out the issues and how it effects the member of the Canadian Armed Forces when procurement is delayed. As most members know, I did three tours of Afghanistan. I was armed with a C7 rifle, and a 9 mm Browning hi-power pistol dated 1944, built by Inglis Washing Machine Company of London, Ontario. I was lucky in that most of the time outside of the wire, I was well escorted and well armed personally. It was my final tour that became more than a little unnerving. I was working as a mentor to a senior Afghan police officer in an unnamed HQ unit within the Green Zone; I also acted as escort for US civilian contractors who worked in the same location. This day started well, the personal protective posture allowed for just a side arm, and we could go without body armour within the Green Zone. The day started to go

downhill because of a series of incidents nearby necessitating our return to our own camp. We were required to be ready for a possible attack by several means including suicide bombers with shooter escorts or even a vehicle borne improvised explosive devices (VBIED). So out we went armed with a Browning 9 mm hi-power pistol built in 1944 as our only means of defence. My only thought was what happens if someone does show up? The old Brownings were notorious for stoppages because of age and wear and although I was proficient and not too bad a shot, a stoppage would have meant death, either mine or the civilian contractors. It was an uneasy feeling to say the least. I wondered how many other Canadian soldiers ended up feeling the same way in similar circumstances. Just to finish this off, a couple days later, the local street kids stopped what was believed to be a fourteen- or fifteen-year-old child on a bicycle believing him to be an interloper on their sales territory. He wasn't, he was a suicide bomber, he was just across the street from our normal place of business. The six street children were killed along with the suicide bomber. I owed one of those children a dollar; he had shoved a wooden bracelet in my hands - as I never carried money, I promised to pay him the next time I saw him. I still have that stupid little trinket. The threat was real; a reliable pistol might have been the difference between life or death.

Working weapons for a soldier is not a nice to have, it is vital, just the same as a fighter pilot needs a good aircraft that they can trust and is the best aircraft available, or a ship's company who need ships that are relatively new, up to date and able to meet the main enemy, the sea or if necessary, fight a real near peer enemy with confidence. Right now, we do not have any of that, while the government works on social engineering and its other challenges. The CAF is capable of doing its job when it gets reliable tools and conducting the social engineering; right now, the CAF needs to concentrate on the job of defending the country and its interests.

Australia

Australia announced the acquisition of the Improved Tomahawk cruise missile for installation aboard the three Hobart-class air defence destroyers. The range will be around 2000 kms. There is no indication that the Hunter-class frigates (a Type 26 variant) will also be so equipped. The variant will cost approximately 1.5m USD per missile. It will give Australia significant strike capabilities. This will complement Australia's overall land and air based long range strike capabilities in the Indo-Pacific area.

Russia

The seeming impasse between the West and Russia over Ukraine continues. The UN Security Council was convened and as per normal in such situations became a place where countries talked past one another and little or nothing was accomplished. President Macron of France and the new German Chancellor have also tried to revive the Normandy Format which developed the Minsk II Accord between Ukraine, the two separate areas of Donetsk and Luhansk and the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe – the format has thirteen clauses, none of which were accomplished or achieved as of today.

There have been a multitude of stories generated by many media outlets stating essentially the sky is falling or something along those lines. It was interesting that some talked of ghost divisions and that these were being mobilized, etc. Most didn't really understand the nature of the modernization process of 2008 after the Georgia-Russia War in which Russia did not do well. Russia eliminated over 200 divisions as part of a re-organization in favour of 83 brigade groups within the ground forces, which also eliminated the names of over 20m reservists (at least on paper) in favour of a smaller and more manageable number of somewhere around 2m reservists on paper. Russia has continued, however, to walk back some of these reforms in favour of using the division structure. They generally found the

brigade group structure to be insufficient to meet requirements. Armies were sorted out as well into twelve active armies and a leaner command structure for military districts based on geography. Ground Forces is but one organization.

Russia also maintains airborne troops as a separate force with four divisions. These were originally turned to two-regiment structures but has since seen the addition of a third regiment. The divisions are divided into two types: airborne and air assault and there are also other organizations that can be added for a particular task. The strength is about 35 to 45k.

Much has been stated this week about the professionalization of the Russian armed forces as opposed to the original conscript army. The use of professionals is mainly found in the following: the aerospace forces, strategic rocket forces, the navy, and the airborne all have fairly high participation rates of professionals. The ground forces still heavily rely on conscripts which are not the same troops of Soviet times. They only serve one year and are inducted at two separate times each year. In the case of 'contractees' they have been unable to achieve their overall goal of approximately 450k but rather have around 400k. Conscripts have fallen short by nearly 100k per year as well. Although Russian forces have improved and follow older methods which worked well for a conscript army they still have many of the same flaws as before. As said in our last note, only a fool would underestimate their capability.

Still, war, it would be problematic for everyone especially the President Putin. One has to wonder why Europe is once again looking at a potential war that is unnecessary but somehow not unexpected as well. Putin has called the Russian and Ukrainian one people, united by history, blood and heritage. Putin also believes in the 18th century concept of spheres of influence, something that should have died some time ago. Mr Putin has pushed the point that NATO promised not to expand to the East, something that no NATO negotiator remembers nor was it ever written, nor did Russia bring it up until recently despite having representatives at the table in the original NATO expansions. NATO has responded to the Kremlin's demands - all have been rejected as non-starters - but both the US and NATO have offered more substantive talks on alternatives such as the renewing of disarmament treaties, confidence building measures, further nuclear disarmament talks, which all may include some aspects of Russia's demands. Mr Putin responded that Russia's demands were ignored, however, a Spanish newspaper released a copy of NATO's letters which in fact show that Russia's demands were noted and answered and what NATO and the US were willing to offer under the circumstances. What is very clear is NATO will not remove troops from Eastern Europe and that as a sovereign country Ukraine can chose whatever path it wishes including joining NATO if all the normal conditions for NATO membership is met.

Poland, the United Kingdom and Ukraine have announced Wednesday they will enter into a pact. The details of this pact are still not known publicly as yet, but certain guarantees are apparently being given Ukraine.

Russia continues to fumble with Covid, reaching nearly 12m official cases with nearly 350k dead. This is an ongoing problem for the Russian regime as the very people mainly affected are ones who are most likely to support Putin. The younger generation does not share the view that Putin is an effective leader, nor do they like the stagnating Russian economy, nor the foreign interventions which are costing the lives of young Russians and considerable financial resources. Further sanctions from the West would be very bad overall for the nation. This will further impact the people but also more importantly Putin's main supporters, the oligarchs. At some point, a line will be crossed which will bode ill for the regime

Where does Russia go from here? Although many suggest that only Putin knows how things will go, this is not quite true. His main advisors on this issue appear to be hard liners including Nikolai

Patrushev, the main national security advisor; Sergei Naryshkin, Chief of the Russia's Foreign Intelligence Service; and Sergei Shoigu, Minister of Defence. While this does not mean an invasion, it does mean that Russia is unlikely to back down on its demands on the issue of Ukraine and NATO 'expansion.' Time will tell but at this point Russia seems to be wishing to create the perception of an impasse.

The US will be sending 2000 more troops to Europe, more specifically to Poland. These troops will be from the 82nd Airborne Division and a tactical headquarters organization from XVIIIth Corps. A further 1000 troops from the 2nd Cavalry Regiment will be moved to Romania according to the Canadian Press Wednesday. These new deployments are on top of US deployment of fighter aircraft to Estonia carried out earlier this week. Boris Johnson also had a telephone conversation with Vladimir Putin; not surprisingly nothing was accomplished. Earlier this week, Putin did have a more successful meeting with President Orban of Hungary in which Hungary and Russia would cooperate on issues including better gas prices and increased quantities of gas, assistance with the refit of a nuclear power plant, and a joint venture to improve port facilities in Hungary plus other items as may come up. Putin was very happy with the friendly relations with Hungary. Overall, President Putin has now gotten to where he wants to be; the focus of attention as opposed to the West's new preoccupation with China. What will he get? Probably nothing except further sanctions. Putin has now changed his story to one that suggests that the US is trying to cause a conflict by using Ukraine as a pawn. Ukrainian government officials including the President have called for a toning down of the rhetoric and reporters from a number of media outlets in Europe and the US have shown the Ukrainian people taking things in stride. The people being interviewed reminded the viewers that Ukraine has been under Russian attack for eight years including occupation of the Crimea and Donbass. They seemed to have a firm grip on their reality.

China

While the situation between Russia and NATO occupies the world stage, China prepares for the 2022 Winter Olympics in Beijing to open 4 February 2022. The Indian media are simply calling this the 'Genocide Games' and they would not be far off as the Communist Chinese Party has conducted and is continuing to conduct culturally genocidal actions against Tibet, occupied East Turkistan (also known as Xinjiang province) and other cultural minorities. There is also the crackdown on democracy, religious groups, pro-democratic forces as well as rival factions within the CCP. In the late 1940s, the world said never again to genocide, but here we are again with the International Olympic Committee willfully ignoring the issue of genocide. This is not political as Mr Bach is fond of saying that the Olympic Committee is not looking at political issues...and apparently moral and ethical matters either. One has only had to watch a fellow Canadian, Dick Pound, state that he was satisfied that the Chinese top tennis player Peng Shuai was in no danger as he had an opportunity to talk with her -it was painful to watch him squirm his way through a not very believable explanation.

It would be remiss not to mention China's requirement for athletes to load up with a Chinese app which to say the least is a vast invasion of privacy virtually anywhere else in the world and enables the Chinese authorities to monitor details far beyond actual requirements. A Canadian company already determined that the app has weak areas which could be easily used by hackers in future. The Canadian team has been asked to keep all their personal phones at home because of the threat. In another case of CCP overreach, China is imposing its own anti-Covid regulations on foreign diplomats, stating why would anyone leave the safest country in the world after US diplomats tried to arrange evacuation of families of their staff. The CCP has not taken the issue well, considering it a way to embarrass China. Still why would anyone want to leave their diplomatic staff to the mercy of the CCP? There have been several outbreaks of the virus in Beijing causing a massive series of tests, and several foreign Olympians have now tested as infected. This can and will cause issues throughout the competition.

Chinese property management companies continue to 'meltdown' and miss repayment dates. Many are likely to require some sort of bailout. While not death threat to the Chinese economy, it is a major problem for many Chinese who used investment in real estate as a method to provide for future wealth. The problem with restructuring of Evergrande is that it will require a large number of completed and incomplete projects to be torn down. Many Chinese middle-class citizens will lose their financial health or even go bankrupt. So far the CCP has not offered substantial support, but it using the situation to rein in large property management firms. As a result of these developments there is as well the move of foreign companies to other countries to avoid changes to Chinese legislation regarding financial issues. The move of companies and changes to regulations coupled with the economic turmoil of late have caused the rise in unemployment within China. Exact numbers are not available but it is higher than normal. What is interesting is that now even Western media have picked up on the fact that the CCP 'cooks' the books in regard to the economy and are now echoing earlier comments from the Asian press.


