

The second of the five objectives that the United States is to pursue in the Indo-Pacific per its strategy (https://www.whitehouse.gov/wp-content/uploads/2022/02/U.S.-Indo-Pacific-Strategy.pdf) is: build connections within and beyond the region. Yet, whilst the word 'partner' in various forms can be found 76 times in the document, Canada (and other eastern Pacific states such as Chile and Peru) is not mentioned at all. The US strategy should be called an Indo-'Western Pacific' Strategy.

The Policy Group of the Department of National Defence (DND) does produce a Global Engagement Strategy and it is understood that there were a series of regional strategies at the operational level that showed how operational and tactical activities of the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) and DND fit into and supported objectives in each region. Developing such strategies is a useful process that helps everyone to align their efforts. Such strategies would be classified but a serious observer could divine what they are about by taking note of where the CAF deploys and what they do.



Security Affairs Committee Synopsis

O Canada

Can we say, "Freedom Convoys," a Canadian initiative spread around the world and giving hope to the truly paranoid, disenfranchised, and anyone with a grudge in a large semi-organized road rally that stopped in all sorts of places they shouldn't. Most of these in Canada have been relatively peaceful in nature if noisy. Most cities prevented large trucks from entering the downtown core but somehow the City of Ottawa showed a passive approach to the impending "invasion" and allowed large vehicles virtually next to Parliament. Anyone who served in Kandahar knows that large trucks in key areas of any city can make a huge mess even if they do not explode. Those in Kandahar did, especially around elections. The lack of preparation and thought reflects a lack of security mindset in services whether national or provincial or municipal. It leads back to a topic we have discussed and written about within RUSI(NS) and that is a lack of a National Security Policy. One could go on for days about the security lapses but the real issue is the understanding of security issues and threats from a national point of view. There needs to be a clear method to get information to cities and provinces so they can act appropriately. There needs to be setup a mechanism(s) to allow for rapid liaison between all levels of the security apparatus so that there are systems in place to ensure RCMP or provincial police can mesh quickly and seamlessly with local law enforcement. It is also becoming painfully clear that the structure, size and capability of all levels of police must examined. Do we need to create provincial police forces in all provinces and get the federal police doing federal challenges? Canada's current system is that they will rob one jurisdiction to fill another but leaves localities without their police protection.

The military has been used in past for major events such as the Cape Breton Miners' Strike in the 1920s, the FLQ crisis in Quebec in 1970 and of course Oka in the early 1990s. No soldier I have ever worked with wanted anything to do with the quagmire that is Assistance to Law Enforcement Agencies (ALEA) nor did the police necessarily like the idea either. The military is a very blunt instrument meant to deliver violence if necessary. It is by no means a police force. This being said, the use of the military in an insurrection might be considered and therefore contingency plans of some sort should be considered and how does one legally do this and under what circumstances? No one likes the idea but one shouldn't be developing a policy of this nature while under duress or stress as we apparently are doing now.

The Emergency Act is a product of the 1980s and replaced the First World War's Emergency Measures Act. This is its first use but unfortunately it seems to be a very large sledgehammer for what is in fact a

small walnut. It appears to be more a federal political matter in nature as opposed to a necessity. Time will tell but most of the convoys and blockages were simply negotiated away by police using negotiating tactics. Most importantly, despite weapons being found in the Coutts border crossing, no one has been killed and police have used virtually anything they could not to create a situation that would require brute force. If one takes a look at media from around the world, one can see that our security efforts have been soundly mocked. One could get depressed about it fairly quickly, but keep in mind that many countries that this situation would have been bloody indeed. Fortunately, local politicians, professional police and the demonstrators themselves found a way out of the situation without heads being cracked or shots being fired. So, aside from Ottawa most situations have been well handled in many ways even if more than a little annoying. I prefer my Canadians alive as a rule as opposed to being dead in a hail of bullets or by head bashing with billy clubs, so let's take this as at least a partial win.

One other issue that has come from this event is the recognition of foreign influence and money. One thing that should be retained after this event becomes a matter of historical interest, is the examination of foreign influence and its continued effect on Canada's politics. If reporting is correct, China's undue influence in the last election, which included lies and disinformation through the Chinese language press within Canada which may have affected the outcome in a number of seats, should also be examined. Certainly, the picture of our current supporters within the Chinese community is troubling especially as we are still waiting for an answer on Huawei. It may be innocent but it does not look good, especially if those supporters have links to the United Front. This does not take away from the effects of US influence particularly of the US right wing elements on issues in Canada. Scrutiny of all foreign financing must been clear particularly if it will affect the security and wellbeing of our country whether from a friendly country or an adversary such as China.

Russia

If President Putin wanted the full attention of NATO and the EU, he has certainly achieved it. Thursday morning it is reported by multiple media outlets that more than 7000 extra Russian troops have been added to the numbers surrounding Ukraine and that there has been no appreciable withdrawal of Russian troops from the forward areas and some media have suggested that tanks and self-propelled guns have moved forward to "attack" positions. This being said, there is a very real difference between having the ability to attack and actually attacking especially since just being there and exercising on one's own territory is achieving virtually all Putin's goals. Already the tainted Minsk 2 Accords are mentioned as a way ahead despite Ukraine never agreeing to this. Can Putin get the Western powers to coerce Ukraine into accepting the unacceptable? Keep in mind that Putin has also threatened nuclear war. Putin deserves sanctions now as a method of showing him at least some teeth, yet he is being rewarded with talks and possible concessions. Putin will only stop pushing once he is no longer in power and we should be aware of that point.

Russia continues to fail Covid as nearly 15m cases have been officially recorded and just under 350k deaths officially recorded. Most Russians have chosen not to receive vaccines as uptake is still low. Russia's excess deaths above normal rates are now well above a million, a fact noticed by most Russians.

Alexi Navalny is on trial again, this time in prison. His organization which covered corruption amongst the supporters and members of the Putin regime has been essentially eliminated. The trial is expected to be over quickly and Mr Navalny will likely receive a further lengthy sentence in one of the most brutal prisons in Russia. The Putin regime has used the current situation to crack down on organizations that have been a thorn in the backside of the regime. Even well-respected organizations have been deemed foreign agents or worse and many have been forced to close their operations.

The bottom line here is that Russia under Putin is not trustworthy and the West should impose sanctions in a graduated way now as a "shot across the bow" of a corrupt authoritarian regime. Talk yes, agree, no or as Churchill said, "it is better to jaw, jaw than war, war." At the same time, the regime should not be rewarded with concessions by the West or poor Ukraine until concrete actions are taken by the regime.

China

China has managed to run the Olympic games during a time of Covid. Its glaring deficiencies are readily apparent in its Zero Covid campaign now blown apart with a major outbreak in Hong Kong where daily case counts now exceed official counts for the entire pandemic. The real truth is the CCP has never been able to actually lock down or eliminate the virus and like Russia. Its actual excess death count is astronomical with one source placing it over 14m. It is also suspected that China's vaccines are only about 50% effective and may have led to other countries' outbreaks because of its ineffectiveness. China's own population may be very ripe for a major outbreak especially with new variants. Time will tell.

In real terms, the fact that China carried off the Olympics at all is significant. It means if you are bloody minded enough, one can push through anything...but should you? I think the real answer from a responsible nation would have been to postpone or cancel the games especially as some of the restrictions led to athletes being unable to compete, and other athletes competing after isolation but poor meals and a loss of preparation time. This was not a good look for anyone. The CCP is one factor but the actions of the International Olympic Committee are probably worse as they were adamant that the games go on despite Covid and of course the cultural genocidal actions of the host country. One has to wonder about what really constitutes the Olympic spirit?

The CCP also continues to add troops to the Ladakh area including new robotic "dogs" as shown in the Chinese media. The robotic dogs are meant to carry heavier equipment in rough terrain and take it off the backs of soldiers. There is some concern that these may be more problem than benefit but it is similar to a US designed all terrain "pack animal" being considered for operations.

Pakistan

Pakistan is having more difficulty with the Taliban. The same organization that the Pakistan Inter-Service Intelligence Agency (ISI) fostered during the Afghan war. These same Taliban are now training Baluchistan insurgents fighting for their independence from Pakistan. These insurgents have targeted Chinese construction and mining operations in the area which has caused considerable anger from Beijing. It seems what goes around comes around and it seems fitting that Pakistan is hoisted on its own petard. Pakistan is already shaky economically and is in dire need of support from China. This will not go well and any solution will take a good deal of time. This will not go away quickly and causes concern over the safety and security of Pakistan's nuclear arsenal.

Coups in Africa

Lastly, Sub-Saharan Africa is located on the "Belt of Fire" which follows the whole circumference of the world. This area has been noted as an area that has seen constant or nearly constant insurgencies and difficulties. The *Economist* of February 5th to 11th has a short article on the role of the drug trade on the coups. The coup against the Ghaddafi regime also accelerated the issues across Africa as a large number of weapons of all types fell into the hands of various factions and tribes, not to mention Islamist insurgents. Western Africa especially has been rocked with three attempted coups, one in


Mali, one in Burkina Faso and, most recently, an attempted coup in Guinea-Bissau. All of these have had some initial stirrings within the drug trade and weak or relatively newly hatched governments are easy targets. They are also difficult to deal with and are likely to cause instability for some time. Wednesday, France announced the withdrawal of French forces from Mali because of the actions of the coup leaders suggesting that the goals were divergent from France's goals.

One of the other issues is the rise of Russian private military companies (PMC) being requested by various coup leaders. The Russians are requested because they tend not to put up with a free and open press or opposition. Thus many countries now have mercenaries with few if any scruples doing their bidding for a price. Russia is not the only country providing PMCs but it seems like the PMC source of choice because of a lack of scruples. This will not go away as long as these companies are tolerated, PMCs are a disease and not a solution. Africa will remain unstable without a very different view of PMCs and foreign influence. By the way, Sudan has the dubious honour of having had 16 coups and therefore is the "winner" in the coup category.


