



Another example that the intended name for a ship can be changed between government announcement (which is just that, a political message) and the ship's naming ceremony. Hence the utility of the use of 'future *Shipname*' and, until the ship has been accepted, 'future HMCS *Shipname*.' Canada has had recent experience of ship names being changed (the two Joint Support Ship project replenishment oilers).

The Royal Canadian Navy and US Navy do differ in aspects of keel laying and other significant events/ceremonies in a ship's life. Generally, though, the article is a good read about the tradition.

Transport Canada operates the National Aerial Surveillance Program (NASP). At a recent speaker event, RUSI(NS) was



briefed on the program's capability (see: "Surveillance of Sea Surface Activities in Atlantic Canada" https://rusi-ns.ca/national_aerial_surveillance_program/). The surveillance flight referenced in the news release was performed by one of the NASP flights in collaboration with Fisheries and Oceans Canada. NASP aircraft fly in the Arctic region and monitor ships crossing into Canada's Exclusive Economic Zone. The NASP Surveillance Officers observe, analyze, record, and report marine pollution on behalf of Transport Canada. They also provide timely, accurate, and useful information from aerial surveillance operations to other key government departments and agencies that need it to enforce domestic and international laws and/or to fulfill their marine mandates.

Editor: What with the increasing amount of illegal, unreported and unregulated (IUU) fishing, China's and Russia's militarization of their fishing fleets, and their use of those fleets for grand strategic purposes, the NASP could become more of a national security matter.



Security Affairs Committee Synopsis

O Canada

A Canadian Armed Forces Aurora aircraft was engaged in observing and reporting anti-sanctions smuggling operations by North Korea and others as part of Op NEON. Chinese fighters conducted an

interception that was deemed reckless, and forced the Canadian aircraft to alter course to avoid an unsafe situation. Canada protested to Beijing but the Communist Chinese Party (CCP) spokesperson blamed Canada for conducting surveillance against China rather than apologizing, accusing the Canadian crew of unprofessional conduct instead.. The Australians had a similar situation with similar results. China is suspected of conducting operations that break economic sanctions against their client state of North Korea. China today stated that Canada and Australia are using disinformation - an international form of gaslighting. Canada and Australia are relatively easy targets. The CCP gets to put pressure on the US by engaging US allied aircraft rather than a direct confrontation with the US. One can expect this behavior to continue as China and the US continue to confront one another economically. It should be noted that the Canadian Aurora is based on the US P3 Orion aircraft. Ours were purchased in 1981 and they have received several upgrades and rebuilds to allow these 'ancient' aircraft to continue to operate. It is to their credit that Nova Scotia's IMP Aerospace and the Canadian Armed Forces ground crews keep these aircraft flying. There is little doubt they wouldn't last a second in a near-peer war. The crews are well trained but they need new tools in the very near future. (Editor: note the Canadian Multi-Mission Aircraft project to replace the Aurora http://dgpaapp.forces.gc.ca/en/defence-capabilities-blueprint/project-details.asp?id=975.

The 85 CH146 Griffon fleet, based on a civilian helicopter produced by Bell Canada, will be upgraded to allow it to fly into the mid-2030s. The contract was awarded to Bell Textron Canada of Mirabel Quebec on 30 May 2022. Keep in mind that the civilian pattern of the CH146 has been flying since 1992. It is way past its best before date but that is in keeping with the governments' propensity and very real de facto policy to fly museum pieces in the best possible shape. The Griffon made a name for itself in Afghanistan as the reason the Chinooks had to slow down so the Griffons could keep up. It is another sign that the Air Force does not maintain what should be Army and Navy fleets requirements. The Australians have Chinook, Blackhawks and Kiowas and have just purchased a new fleet of Apache attack helicopters. In the recent Mali operation with the UN, Canada was forced to use El Salvadoran attack helicopters as escorts. Continued use of the Griffon is a travesty - Canadian air crews deserve better than that. In regard to the Navy, not another country in the world flies the 'military' version of the CH148 Cyclone. Those 27 aircraft are all there is and the maintenance bills will be horrendous over time. It is interesting that the Sea King is still considered a better aircraft despite its age. The Cyclone is still not fully operational for a variety of reasons.

6 June 2022 has just passed. It was 78 years ago this week that Allied forces landed in Normandy in the greatest seaborne invasion in history, putting 160k men on the ground in a single day including 14k Canadians of the 3rd Division along with tanks of the 2nd Armoured Brigade. The Navy was there in large numbers with 110 ships involved in roles including escort, mine clearing, landing craft, surface action groups, anti-submarine and rescue. The RCAF had 39 squadrons involved supporting overall operations. It should be noted that seldom if ever did our three services acted as one in support of each other, but they did support the actions of other nations.

China

China's third aircraft carrier will soon be launched, probably later this fall. It is a conventionally powered aircraft carrier with electromagnetic catapults and arrester wires. It will be the first carrier with this capability, but its size and capability will be more in line with pre-nuclear American carriers with some exceptions in regard to the catapults, air defence radars, the use of drones and new aircraft designs. The carrier will end up being over 300m in length and is approximately 40m wide. Displacement is estimated to be somewhere around 80 to 85k tons. The name found in the Indian Press is *Jiangsu* although none of this is officially confirmed and may vary once the ship is fully completed. There is some thought she could be floated out of her current dock this week for fitting out. Her estimated commissioning date will be sometime in 2024 which will be very quick for a first in class

ship. The arrival of this ship will make China the largest carrier operator after the US, however, the three carriers are all very different with vastly different capabilities. Building is one issue, getting it to an operational state capable of operations is quite another.

Carrier aircraft are improving but lag behind US models especially in engine design and production. There also have been questions about the reliability of the aircraft when subject to high speed take offs using the catapult. There is a reason US aircraft are robust in comparison to their air force counter-part aircraft. China currently has fighter aircraft and helicopters capable of operating from the carrier. There is also the XJ 600 Xi, an air early warning aircraft that is still in development but already flying. The fighter aircraft being used first is likely the J15 but it is expected that the actual fighter for operations will be the 5th generation FC31. Still, China has shown remarkable speed in carrier and aircraft development. This carrier will likely be used to further carrier development and to test carrier-based aircraft and drones, in other words, another training carrier capable of other uses as needed. The next model is likely to be nuclear powered and similar in size to larger US carriers. The PLA Navy is using the *Liaoning* and the *Shandong* to test concepts, aircraft, drones and carrier battle group tactics including some concepts for the potential invasion of Taiwan.

China's economy is like a slow motion movie of a train wreck as Xi's persistence in keeping the Zero Covid policy has injured the country economically and also its credibility as a reliable partner to foreign manufacturers. There are literally thousands of ships anchored of the Chinese coast, caught in the predicament of being unable to land or pick up contracted goods. If one were deliberately trying to destroy the world's supply chain, China has succeeded, but one has to believe at this point by accident. Shanghai has once again closed down due to new Covid cases just after it started to get back to a new normal. Currently over 80 Chinese cities are locked down or having extensive enforcement of the Zero Covid policy without an official lockdown. This policy have led to a large number of permanent plant closure and some firms including Chinese firms have chosen to re-locate to countries with less stringent Covid policies. Unemployment is increasing at a relatively high level for China

Belarus

Belarus is still playing both sides of the table. Belarussian forces have not actually participated in the Ukraine Russia War. Belarus allowed its soil to be used by Russian forces to attack key areas around Kyiv at the start of the war including the disastrous attacks near Hostomel Airfield near Kyiv which led to large personnel losses to Russian airborne and special forces. Belarus has announced that it will be increasing the size of the armed forces to 80k personnel and outfitting new units with older equipment. These new troops would become part of the newly created Southern Command which also includes Belarussian special forces elements. Some Russian units are still in Belarus but these are mainly artillery and rocket forces. This appears to be a way of providing assistance to Russia without actually doing anything that would leave the Lukashenko regime in danger. It does however cause Ukraine to keep forces around Kyiv that might be better utilized defending forward in the Donbass or towards the south near Kherson.

Some Belarus soldiers are fighting at regimental strength, however, these several thousand troops belong to the 'Kastus Kolinovsky Regiment,' the Belarussian volunteer force fighting for Ukraine. These young folks will be returning home at some point, and it may not go well for the regime that was two-faced. Many people in Belarus would be more than happy to rid the country of the man reputed to be the 'last dictator in Europe.' Time will tell.

Ukraine Russia War

One of the biggest issues about this entire war is the question 'Why?' In mid-February, many 'experts' wrote that Putin was just posturing - the expectation of actual conflict was considered unlikely because

of the potential negative outcomes not only for Russia but also for the world. Some 'experts' said the war would be over within four days, that Ukraine would crumble and the new Russian border would be mainly on the borders of former Warsaw Pact countries. The world was surprised when the President of Ukraine, someone who had been steadily losing popularity prior to the war, showed more spine by famously answering an offer of asylum in the West with the very defiant response that "he didn't need a ride, he needed ammunition." Here we are today, more than 100 days since the start of the war, and the Russians have been pushed back from Kyiv and Kharkiv and now are concentrated on the Donbass at the expense of other fronts. The war has turned into a bloody stalemate to a large extent and shows no sign of stopping. It is a war of attrition, something that some of us was told was something to be avoided in staff college. May be we should revisit that thought and consider what Canada has to do if we are forced to engage in such a war.

As with most wars of attrition, battles have moved back and forth regularly with Severodonetsk being lost to the Russians one day only to find the Ukrainians counter-attacking effectively and retaking most of the city despite increasing odds against the Ukrainian armed forces in the area. Russian losses have been heavy in virtually all areas. This has led to increased air, rocket, missile and artillery attacks essentially to destroy anything remotely Ukrainian whether military or not. It is also steadily bleeding Ukraine of manpower and equipment at a very high rate. One Ukrainian estimate put daily fatalities as 100 soldiers per day not counting captured, wounded or missing. Russian explosives have also taken a severe toll on Ukrainian infrastructure throughout the country including areas and buildings that are covered by international conventions. This war is not easy and it will not be over quickly. Ukraine will counterattack with NATO-supplied equipment but even though they get systems there is always a tangle of excuses not to provide materials that would make Russia take notice. Whether one likes the idea or not, Ukraine will have to be allowed to hit Russian targets inside Russia that are specifically used to support Russian efforts, such as transportation infrastructure as found in Belgorod, Kursk and other locations supporting the war. Destruction of Russian logistics will be essential if Ukraine is to succeed in removing the current threat.

The other issue is, even if Ukraine is successful in removing Russian forces from Ukraine proper, the current regime will not rest and will continue to cause problems and challenges for Ukraine. As some have pointed out early in the war, the Putin regime does not want to have a successful democratic state based on Western philosophy sitting on its doorstep. It is an existential threat from President Putin's point of view. There is a Russian scholar who discusses what she believes is Putin's idea of a win. It is fascinating to read. The scholar, Tatiana Stanovaya, has recently written an article in Foreign Policy called "What the West (Still) Gets Wrong About Putin" which is fascinating. She is the CEO and founder of the political analysis firm called R.Politik. She is also a non-resident scholar of the Carnegie Endowment Fund. The article in Foreign Policy requires a subscription unfortunately but a quick Google search on her name will bring up several discussions on her views. These are quite enlightening and seem to make sense. Apparently, Putin's view of winning is not one we might recognize. Here are some links:

Here is an example of the comments: "However, Stanovaya said that Russia's main goal in Ukraine isn't about seizing territory but is aimed at preventing Ukraine from co-operating with the NATO military alliance and making the country accept Russian influence in the form of 'Russification.'"

"To follow through on these goals, Russia needs to sustain its military presence on Ukrainian territory and keep attacking Ukrainian infrastructure. There is no need for major territorial gains nor taking Kyiv," Stanovaya wrote. It is her view that Putin thinks he is 'winning' based on this set of goals.

Russia is continuing to blame Ukraine for the inability of food to sail from Odesa, blaming Ukrainian mines as opposed to their de facto although undeclared blockade of that and other ports. Russia has also stolen vast quantities of Ukrainian grains which has been shipped to locations in the Middle East. Russia's ambassador to the United Nations found himself called out for these action by Charles Michel, President of the European Council, during a meeting of the Security Council. Mr Michel stated the blame for this situation was strictly the fault of Russia. The ambassador chose to leave the Security Council meeting rather than listen to the comments, calling them lies.

Child Soldiers

This is an indication of how children can be 'recruited' into a conflict even by a relatively benign leadership. Desperation can cause even good folks to do things that would have been unthinkable several weeks ago. This is a link to a story of a fifteen year old boy flying drones. It is worth the read. Is this the child soldier of the future?
