

(Fixing Strategic Communications at National Defence Demands a Whole-of-Government Effort)

The author argues the greatest contemporary threat faced by liberal democracies is how quickly citizen faith, trust and confidence in government and public institutions is eroding. Arresting this trend and restoring trust, credibility and reputation is the ultimate challenge for elected officials and communications practitioners. And, that the Strong, Secure, Engaged (SSE) defence policy refresh – the catalyst being the February 2022 Russian invasion of Ukraine – offers a real opportunity now with our eyes wider open, to better reflect the new realities of modern conflict and address known shortcomings since the document's issue in June 2017. O Canada

It is clear Canada will do something toward rebuilding the military, although it seems we are doing too little too late especially in the North. The rebuilding of NORAD is a good start as well is the purchase of new fighter aircraft and the updating of the North Warning System (NWS). The real issue is whether this government will also address the increasing challenge of ballistic missiles and hyper-velocity missiles as well as continued efforts against air breathing weapons systems such as manned bombers and cruise missiles. This would require a major change in foreign policy including getting rid of the idea that missile defence is bad. It already exists, we merely have to acknowledge that fact officially. Change would provide us a seat at the table, better to be able to discuss issues, rather than be excluded as we have in the past.

The other issue is Our Foreign Minister's comments following the very beneficial agreement between Denmark and Canada over Hans Island in between Ellesmere Island and Greenland. The signing ceremony provided a platform in which she said "we cannot fall into the trap of militarization of the Arctic." She said the other seven members of the Arctic Council are in agreement and provide a "united front" on Arctic matters and that all seven are members or soon will be members of NATO and that they (NATO members) have a better way. I am quite sure Neville Chamberlain also had such hopes but those hopes were dashed upon the rocks of reality. Russia, the US and others have already militarized the Arctic. Russia has opened fourteen military bases along the North East Passage (NEP) and is planning the creation of a new Arctic Fleet. The US has re-established the 11th Airborne Division in Alaska, and Norway is reinforcing its north with the most modern fighter and surveillance aircraft available as well as increasing army forces there. To deny this militarization speaks to a lack of understanding of the situation - whilst the agreement between Canada and Denmark is applaudable, one should deplore the lack of situational awareness.

There is increasing concern amongst the Canadian business community that Canada is missing out on being part of the Indo-Pacific Economic Framework being organized by the US. Although Canada is part of the Comprehensive and Progressive Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP) which is a major trade program, the new "Framework" would include the US and several countries not included in that program. The US is thought to be avoiding the term free trade as being not acceptable to the American public. Canada's exclusion or lack of interest is considered a problem by our own business community. Action of some sort is necessary by the Canadian government or at least they should give an explanation why there is no Canadian interest.

The Emergencies Measure Act was used to clear Ottawa streets. Public Safety Minister Marco Mendicino said that "the government acted on the advice of non-partisan professional law enforcement" before the government took action. The Prime Minister didn't help when he suggested that it was necessary to stop the actions taken at the border crossings preventing cross border trade. Keep in mind these other blockades were already being eliminated by local authorities before the act was declared and that the only demonstration left was in Ottawa. The Emergencies Measures Act was never contemplated for use against a relatively peaceful demonstration. It clearly attacks civil liberties and is capable of great misuse by an unscrupulous government. Make no mistake, the demonstration was a problem and their cause somewhat questionable (if one could find one cause) for local law enforcement. It did not require the Emergencies Measures Act to be invoked. It is not a good look for a government.

Russia - Ukraine

The Putin regime has re-located Alexei Navalny from his current prison east of Moscow to a known penal prison at Melekhovo, 155 kms east of Moscow, according to an article in the New York Post. According to the Moscow Time's article which quotes Navalny's lawyer, Olga Mikhailova stated that Navalny has been transferred to a penal colony with a much harsher regime after the judge increased his sentence and remanded him to a maximum security prison. The Putin regime is noted for its actions against major opposition leaders such as Navalny and Vladimir Kara-Murza who is also expected to receive a lengthy sentence after a show trial. The regime is not likely to treat either man well. The regime is not likely to care about current world opinion at this point.

Pope Francis has blamed NATO to a certain extent, explaining that Russia was "perhaps somehow provoked" and that NATO was barking at the gates of Russia, all of which boggles the mind. No country joins NATO unless it truly wants to - the Putin regime has caused even long term neutral countries to consider joining the alliance. Russia has become predatory and has been noted for its almost total lack consideration of the laws of war. Russia has been constantly involved in war and destabilization efforts in Chechnya, Georgia, Syria, Libya and Ukraine. The Pope should know better and condemn whole heartedly the actions of the criminal Putin regime. Russian war crimes keep coming to light; there are somewhere around 1400 being considered in the Kyiv area alone and are being documented by the International Criminal Court.

The war itself has reached a new pinnacle as Russia continues its attack in the east around Severdonetsk. Most of the city is now in Russian hands. The fighting has been street by street and the city subjected to murderous bombardments. Most of the population has now fled but some remain in the ruins. Russian troops continue to move around in an attempt to seal off Ukrainian forces. Ukrainian forces are found mainly around the industrial section of the city. It is widely expected that the city will fall shortly. What is unknown is whether Ukrainian forces will be able to withdraw intact to new positions.

Ukrainian forces, however, are making headway in the south towards the city of Kherson, with some sources suggesting in unconfirmed reports that Ukrainian forces are only ten kms away from the city. The Russian occupation forces are widely despised and may use increasing force to maintain control of the city. Kherson was the only major centre to be taken early in the war. The population was restive, forcing occupation forces to take increasingly harsh measures. A Ukrainian victory here would have a major impact particularly if Russian forces are split in two and unable to receive support from the Crimea. Russian citizens in Crimea have left as a precaution.

The Donetsk Peoples' Republic has lost over half its troops including several regiments that have simply refused to fight due to a lack of equipment. This is also unconfirmed but several YouTube videos do appear to show the units refusing to fight. Relations between the armies of the two self-declared republics and Russian forces have been less than happy with the locals stating that Russian leadership is not providing the necessary training, equipment or ammunition, and is using them as cannon fodder. Russia does have the necessary manpower to force the issue if they mobilize but casualties especially within the infantry have been high. Russia has used artillery and rocket fire to soften the way ahead, usually at the expense of infrastructure and civilians. Russian actions seem to be antagonizing its 'supporters' as well as the Ukrainian population. Still, Russia continues to advance.

Russia's Black Sea fleet has been less than spectacular as new longer range surface-to-surface missiles are being used by Ukraine. The ability of this fleet to impact land fighting continues to diminish. Russia does continue to conduct a de facto blockade of the Ukrainian ports despite its losses. Russia suggested that the increasing likelihood of a world food shortage is strictly caused by Ukrainian mines.

Russia has disingenuously offered to allow ships carrying Ukrainian food supplies to travel freely if Ukraine would only clear their mines in front of their ports. Unfortunately Russian declarations have often proven false and Ukraine has great cause not to take the Putin regime's assurances at face value. A NATO escort for the ships might be the answer from Ukraine's point of view.

This war has turned into a brutal war of attrition with both sides taking massive losses in men, vehicles and equipment. Allies of Ukraine have estimated that around 80k have been killed, captured or have been wounded. Russian casualties are expected to be in the neighbourhood of 10 k plus. Actual numbers are difficult to gather, and although Ukraine does give its own estimate of casualties Russia seldom does. Russia has hidden its losses to the point of even retrieving the bodies of fallen troops.

Attritional warfare is seldom taught in staff colleges, they preferring to teach maneuver warfare. Attrition means other issues such as mobilization, abbreviated training cycles, large scale replacement of equipment, logistics chains from factory to the unit in a combat zone, medical facilities in theatre and at home, long term veterans' support, the information campaign both for home consumption and to allies as well as information operations against the enemy. Canada in particular has taken an almost bizarre approach, choosing the ostrich technique of ignoring a growing menace. At this rate Canada will fail its allies and our own citizens.

In regard to Russia and the Putin regime, it is increasingly apparent that anything less than removal of the current Russian regime will not end the problem. There will be new problems, but the continued existence of the Putin regime will just prolong the agony of Russia's neighbours. As pointed out earlier, Russia has attacked many of its neighbours and continues to occupy parts of their countries. Appeasing Putin is the last thing that should be considered.

China

China continues its Zero Covid policy despite understanding the increased infection rate of the omicron variant of the Covid virus. It has been pointed out that the testing regime is a huge industry in its own right, employing well over a million testers. The cost of testing is also incredible as well, costing the equivalent billions of US dollars. It has become a self-licking ice-cream cone in that if it is too successful the 'industry' collapses but continuation of testing during the age of omicron allows for the industry to continue with the support of the central government. More importantly, officials seeking higher office can compete for influence through a more stringent regime of testing at present. Several dozen cities including Shanghai and Beijing are in lock down or the next best thing. C ontinuation of zero Covid policies are increasingly unpopular throughout China. No change is expected until Xi achieves becoming the first president in recent times to gain a third term.

The Covid policy also had another effect. People stopped buying things including houses and cars. While locked down people did not move, they tended to 'hunker down' and save their money, thus the internal economy suffered. Covid and lockdowns also effected the international trade first by cutting orders but also causing other nations to look at alternatives to China. Foreign capital fled the country and there was little new investment. The Chinese government in turn created a massive stimulus package focusing on the usual go to action, infrastructure development. The problem is that this will only be a short term solution and is judged by many economists inside and outside China to be unsustainable. The market system is being ravaged by constant lock down and start up. In Canada we saw some of the disruptive nature of lockdowns but imagine it being more harshly enforced including confinement to one's apartment coupled with a much longer period of time where one can't even go out in the garden or equivalent. As we saw with many small business owners, there were long periods with no business, no cash flows, etc. - many went under with their entire family savings.

Property management has also suffered due to excessive development of high cost properties. Quite simply home or apartment ownership became unaffordable, leaving huge inventories of high priced infrastructure. Local governments forced companies to maintain prices as to allow lower prices would impact many current homeowners and essentially destroy their family wealth as they now hold an expensive mortgage on a house that no longer covers the cost. Many folks simply walk away. It is possible that we will see this type of event in Canada as the interest rates climb and people are unable to afford the increase in costs as well as accept the loss in the home's value. The bottom line is that the Chinese economy is on the rocks mainly due to the incompetence of the Communist Chinese Party.

The Indian press gave an interesting overview of China's newest aircraft carrier. The ship, now tentatively identified as being named JIANGSU, is due to be floated out sometime this late fall. The ship is the third carrier and again is likely to be a one-of ship, as the fourth carrier will likely be nuclear. JIANGSU is conventionally powered and will be approximately 30m long and about 40m wide and running in the range of 80 to 85 ktons. Aircraft complement will be around 70 aircraft including the J-15, the FC-31, the Xi 'an, and XJ-600 AEW aircraft as well as locally manufactured helicopters. Future carriers are expected to be nuclear powered and could number up to four.

Big news was a result of activity at the Shangri-La Conference held in Singapore this past week as reported in the Washington Examiner. The US Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin and Chinese Defence Minister, Wei Fenghe, met face to face. Both sides declared the meeting as "professional and focused" but long term differences remain over the 'One China Policy.' The US Defence Secretary stated: "Our policy is unchanged and unwavering." "We remain firmly committed to our long-standing one-China policy ... We categorically oppose any unilateral changes to the status quo from either side. We do not support Taiwan independence." He went on to say, "Now, as a part of our one-China policy, we will continue to fulfill our commitments under the Taiwan Relations Act. That includes assisting Taiwan in maintaining a sufficient self-defense capability" "And it means maintaining our own capacity to resist any use of force or other forms of coercion that would jeopardize the security or the social or economic system of the people of Taiwan." It was a forceful statement, however, the Chinese had their own view.

Minister Wei Fenghe commented that "Taiwan was an internal affair of China." He also went on to say "Let me make this clear, if anyone dares to secede Taiwan from China, we will not hesitate to fight. We will fight at all costs, and we will fight to the very end. This is the only choice for China." It does not seem that there is likely to be any agreement soon on this issue. One surprising agreement did occur that the two nations would maintain communications to avoid any future confrontation. There is little doubt that most Taiwanese consider themselves Taiwanese ad not Chinese. Taiwan is a liberal democracy that fought hard to achieve this goal. They are unlikely to acquiesce to joining a murderous authoritarian regime. The CCP must be made aware that any reunification would entail sacrifice including from the Chinese. Maybe the real answer is that the CCP disbands at that China is unified under a new democratic system that too would lead to a unified China.

In this regard, Canada too should make it clear to all parties that reunification of Taiwan to China by force would result in a negative reaction by Canada. Any reunification must be by mutual consent of the Taiwanese people.




