Defence Policy Review

The Department of National Defence and Canadian Armed Forces have opened public consultations to all Canadians on the defence policy review. The review (a.k.a. Defence Policy Update – DPU) has been a topic of discussion in the RUSI(NS) Security Affairs Committee (SAC) for many months. It appears that comments from individuals rather than organizations is the approach being taken for the review, though there is an opportunity to list the organization of choice in a submission. Members of RUSI(NS) and other readers of *Dispatches* are encouraged to make a submission. See the text box at the beginning of the Other section to the 10 March edition of *Dispatches*. Note the closing date of 30 April 2023.







This report was circulated to the RUSI(NS) Security Affairs Committee and resulted in the following comments:

member 1: Interestingly, in the report, there is only one mention of Arctic patrol ships and no mention of submarines (except for Russian) or Canadian Coast Guard vessels which are key to the surveillance aspect. Canada lacks any organic capability to surveil undersea cables. Note recent suspicious activities off Svalbard and the Norwegian coast, and severing of the Nordstream II pipeline. With repect to the recent Royal Navy announcement for an undersea surveillance and intervention vessel acquisition, the Norwegian Coast Guard

already has the capability in two chartered vessels. Both the Royal Australian Navy and Roayl New Zealand Navy have already acquired very similar capabilities.


member 2: Actually, Canada does have capacity to survey cables under water (albeit not permanently under ice at this time). A former Royal Canadian Navy officer i spresident of Kraken Robotics, based in St Johns and Dartmouth, which offers high fidelity surveillance capacity. See: https://krakenrobotics.com/.


member 1: Kraken has the survey equipment and expertise but you still need a capable, dynamic positioning platform to deliver it plus the intervention capability built-in in terms of medium to heavy work class remotely operated vehicles and/or diving support.




Maps and Charts

(RPA) to prove a concept that would see them used as launch platforms for smaller, more expendable drones. The SkyGuardians would employ the smaller drones at a safe distance from enemy air defenses, sending them into riskier, less permissible environments."

The Royal Canadian Air Force will procure the MQ-9 for its Remotely Piloted Aircraft System project (see: "Uncrewed Aerial Vehicles – Canadian and US Programs" https://rusi-ns.ca/rpas/). Might the

aircraft at some point be capable of being able to launch other, smaller drones? The capability wouldn't necessarily be for penetrating air defence environments but could allow for great surveillance sensor coverage.

US releases footage of Russian jet crashing into drone https://www.bbc.com/news/av/world-us-canada-64974825

Now this is the way to conduct public messaging – pro-actively!



(From Defense One 16 March 2023) On Thursday the U.S. released footage of the Thursday morning Russian jet intercept of a U.S. military drone over the Black Sea on Tuesday:

The video feed dropped in two places — after the Russians dumped fuel on the drone and after the other jet clipped the drone's propeller, effectively destroying its ability to stay aloft safely. The video was edited for duration, but the events are presented in sequential order, the U.S. military said. Here's the timeline of events portrayed in the video, as relayed by the U.S. military's Germany-based European Command:

00:00: [Start of video] A Russian Su-27 approaches to the rear of the U.S. Air Force MQ-9.

00:05: A Russian Su-27 begins to release fuel as it passes.

00:09 A Russian Su-27 passes over the U.S. Air Force MQ-9 while releasing fuel. As the Su-27 passes over the top of the MQ-9, it also disrupts the video transmission.

00:11: The propeller of the U.S. Air Force MQ-9 can be seen and remains undamaged.

00:22: A Russian Su-27 begins a second approach toward the MQ-9.

00:26: A Russian Su-27 begins to release fuel on the approach toward the MQ-9. An Su-27 proceeds to pass even closer.

00:29: A Russian Su-27 collides into the MQ-9 and the MQ-9's camera feed is lost for about 60 seconds.

00:39: The MQ-9's camera feed has returned to working order. At this time the propeller can be seen again and one of the props can be seen damaged.

00:42: [End of video]

Some thoughts about the incident:

- 1. Would a Canadian RPAS (Remotely Piloted Aircraft System MQ-9) have a capability to 'bleat its black box info' (i.e., signal its last flight data via [satellite?]) as it went down?
- 2. What Canadian capabilities are there to recover a downed RPAS? Are they really any different than recovering a downed crewed aircraft (other than not having to address mortuary affairs matters)?
- 3. What can be done (in the design?) by one state (Canada) to limit the amount of intelligence obtained by another state, having recovered a downed RPAS of the first?
- 4. What are the legal implications of a state downing, deliberately or accidentally, another state's RPAS?
- 5. Striking a drone's propeller with one's own aircraft is an odd way to down a RPAS (or any other aircraft). Dumping fuel on it, too, seems a bit extemporaneous.


Edmonton United Services Institute Annual Symposium and Mess Dinner

- Q. Is Canada's reenergized presence in the Arctic to enforce sovereignty?
- A. Yes, one of the primary goals of operating up North to is to see and be seen. This applies to shipping (both commercial and pleasure), Northern Communities, Allies, and non-Allies. The Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) is operating in the Arctic Archipelago exuding and enforcing our Canadian Sovereignty.
- Q. Are they significantly increasing the deployment of Canada's assets in the Arctic?
- A. As more assets become available, we will be deploying and exercising more to continue to learn how to best operate in the Arctic. We will be liaising with our Northern Communities to help determine how best to operate up North so as to not endanger the environment, but also listening to the communities as they are our eyes and ears when we are not operating up North.
- Q. As the commander of a Canadian Navy ship, are you seeing an increase in Canadian Naval activity in the Arctic?
- A. Increase in Canadian Naval activity now not necessarily. The navigable season in the Arctic is still somewhat limited, however with the building of the new Arctic Offshore Patrol Vessels (AOPVs), in the future, more ships will sail to the North at the same time and as the sea ice melts, the navigable season will become longer which it is just a matter of time before we are patrolling Northern waters more frequently.

UPDATE ON UKRAINE
10 March 2023

- On 9 March 2023, Russia conducted a wave of at least 80 long-range strikes against
 Ukrainian critical infrastructure. Russia deployed cruise missiles, air defence missiles in
 a surface-surface role, Iranian one way attack uncrewed aerial vehicles, and an
 unusually large number of hypersonic air-launched ballistic missiles during the attack.
- This was the first major wave of long-range strikes since 16 February 2023 and likely one of the largest since December 2022. Ukrainian officials reported at least 11 civilians killed.
- The interval between waves of strikes is probably growing because Russia now needs
 to stockpile a critical mass of newly produced missiles directly from industry before it
 can resource a strike big enough to credibly overwhelm Ukrainian air defences.





INTELLIGENCE UPDATE

- Over the last four days, Wagner Group forces have taken control of most of eastern part of the Donbas town of Bakhmut. In the town centre, the Bakhmutka River now marks the front line
- Ukrainian forces hold the west of the town and have demolished key bridges over the river, which runs through north-south through a strip of open ground 200m-800m wide, between built up areas. With Ukrainian units able to fire from fortified buildings to the west, this area has become a killing zone, likely making it highly challenging for Wagner forces attempting to continue their frontal assault westwards.
- However, the Ukrainian force and their supply lines to the west remain vulnerable to the continued Russian attempts to outflank the defenders from the north and south.



UPDATE ON UKRAINE 12 March 2023

- As Russia continues to suffer extremely heavy casualties, the impact varies dramatically across Russia's
 regions. In proportion to the size of their population, the richest cities of Moscow and St Petersburg
 have been left relatively unscathed. This is especially true for the families of the country's elite.
- On 21 February 2023, Russian senior officials were photographed making up the front two rows of the audience of President Putin's state of the nation speech. None of these are known to have children serving in the military.
- In many of the Eastern regions, deaths are likely running, as a percentage of population, at a rate of 30-40 times higher than in Moscow. In many places, ethnic minorities take the biggest hit; in Astrakhan some 75% of casualties come from the minority Kazakh and Tartar populations. As the Russian MoD seeks to address its continued deficit of combat personnel, insulating the better-off and more influential elements of Russian society will highly likely remain a major consideration.




INTELLIGENCE UPDATE

- In recent weeks, Wagner Group owner Yevgeny Prigozhin has likely lost access to recruiting in Russian prisons due to his ongoing disputes with the Russian MoD leadership. Prigozhin is highly likely pivoting recruitment efforts towards free Russian citizens.
- Since the start of March 2023, Wagner has set up outreach teams based in sports
 centres in at least 40 locations across Russia. In recent days, masked Wagner
 recruiters also gave career talks in Moscow high schools, distributing
 questionnaires entitled 'application of a young warrior' to collect the contact
 details of interested pupils.
- About half of the prisoners Wagner has already deployed in Ukraine have likely become casualties and the new initiatives are unlikely to make up for the loss of the convict recruit pipeline. If the ban endures, Prigozhin will likely be forced to reduce the scale or intensity of Wagner operations in Ukraine.



UPDATE ON UKRAINE 14 March 2023

- In recent weeks, Russian artillery ammunition shortages have likely worsened to the extent
 that extremely punitive shell-rationing is in force on many parts of the front. This has almost
 certainly been a key reason why no Russian formation has recently been able to generate
 operationally significant offensive action.
- Russia has almost certainly already resorted to issuing old munitions stock which were
 previously categorised as unfit for use.
- A presidential decree of 03 March 2023 laid down measures for the Ministry of Trade and Industry to bypass the authority of the managers of defence industries who fail to meet their production goals. Russia is increasingly applying the principles of a command economy to its military industrial complex because it recognises that its defence manufacturing capacity is a key vulnerability in the increasingly attritional 'special military operation.'





UPDATE ON UKRAINE 15 March 2023

- Since the start of Russia's invasion of Ukraine, Russian public officials and workers have been subject to increasingly severe foreign travel restrictions. Some officials have likely had to forfeit their passports to the Federal Security Service. Employees closer to the centre of power face more severe restrictions; Kremlin officials are banned from all international leisure travel.
- This is a widening of existing measures which date from the Soviet era. Travel restrictions were tightened after the Russian annexation of Crimea in 2014.
- The measures are likely designed to prevent the flight or defection of increasingly disaffected officials. There is a realistic possibility that as the securitisation of the Russian state continues, travel restrictions will be tightened for an increasing number of public sector employees.



- Over the last week, Russian attempts to assault the Donetsk Oblast town of Vuhledar have almost certainly slowed. This follows repeated, extremely costly failed attacks over the previous three months.
- One factor in Russia's heavy losses in this sector has been Ukraine's successful adoption
 of Remote Anti-Armour Mine systems (RAAM). RAAM is a specialist artillery shell which
 scatters anti-armour mines up to 17km away from the firing unit. In some instances,
 Ukraine has launched the mines over and behind advancing Russian units, causing
 disarray when Russian vehicles attempt to withdraw.
- Russia's only notable recent tactical success has been in the Bakhmut sector, which is
 dominated by Wagner Group mercenary forces, currently engaged in a public feud with
 the Russian Ministry of Defence. There is a realistic possibility that Russia's MoD has been
 insistent in its drive for success in Vuhledar, partially because it wants its own success to
 compete with Wagner's achievements.
