



Top NATO official calls on business leaders to prepare for 'wartime scenario'

"A top NATO military official on Monday urged businesses to be prepared for a wartime scenario and adjust their production and distribution lines accordingly..."

This doesn't just apply to Europe, it applies to Canada, too.

He cautioned that Global Instability could leave Businesses vulnerable to Foreign Government actions, such as Blackmail or Sabotage, especially in the event of war. Rob Bauer stated, "Businesses need to be prepared for a Wartime Scenario and adjust their production and distribution lines accordingly. Because while it may be the Military that wins Battles, it's the Economies that win Wars."

In ratcheting up nuclear threat, Putin bets U.S. will soon waver on Ukraine

It is Russia's hope that the US will waver, but Europe is rearming as quickly as possible. They already contribute more than the US now, more than 60%.

Two pro-Russian Western leaders, Orban and Fico, are in electoral difficulty and may not survive the next election. Moldova re-elected their pro-Western government, and Georgia's pro-Russian government is beset by demonstrations. The separatist government of Abkhazia has resigned and demonstrations against Russia continue. China has reiterated against nuclear weapons threats and use and is not happy. Iran has been badly hit by the last two Israeli attacks, basically destroying their air defence system.

The loss of US support will be unfortunate but not the end. Ukraine is building new factories and will be producing large quantities of modern equipment from missiles to drones to tanks, and rebuilding their infrastructure. Europeans have generally accepted the placing of their troops inside Ukraine for training







and maintenance. Ukraine's outlook is better, but not ideal. Russia's economy is failing. The sanctions are working. China has refused to provide substantive support, Iran and North Korea (DPRK) can only provide rather primitive equipment and ammunition and DPRK lately has produced troops although at what cost? Not one of the countries supporting Russia is in a healthy economic condition. Will they support Russia at their own expense? They are quite transactional and not particularly loyal.

In the longer term, Europe understands the Ukraine issue is not strictly Ukraine's problem; it is a European problem, needing a European solution. The superior economy, large combined militaries, rearmament and larger manpower resources will make the difference in the longer term.

Even in the US, support for Ukraine is bipartisan. A major change in that view will be difficult even for Trump.

Further: Feedback from the RCN notes that the matter was already quite widely known, having been previously reported on by media outlets in Canada and the U.S. At this point, it could be said the Navy is being transparent with internal audiences by including this in the Navy newsletter.

Protecting shipping was the main role of the Royal Canadian Navy in the Second World War. Certainly doctrine remains from that experience and the decades after, maybe now aged and needing revision. Members of the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) were trained in 'naval control of shipping' until

some years ago - how many of them and how much of the training material remains is questionable. And there are lessons and insights in the history studies. But it is likely that naval staff have not met with merchant mariners to discuss convoy operations, nor trained, wargamed or exercised modern convoy operations in recent years.

In the event of a conflict with China over Taiwan in which multiple states are drawn in as allies or partners (Canada, after all, is a Pacific state), Canadian forces, especially the RCN, are likely to be employed in the protection of shipping, though likely in the eastern Pacific. Not the same 'contested seas' (chokepoints) as the Red Sea, but lessons from such modern situations must be studied.

Canada's Indo-Pacific Strategy (which is really a policy) needs to pay a lot of attention to 'strengthening alliances and relationships' (a challenge when at times Canada is not even seen as a Pacific state). Canada's foreign policy, when/if articulated properly as a government product (document rather than speech), needs to pay a lot of attention to 'strengthening alliances and relationships.'

"This US-led effort must out-compete the PRC for any future global leadership role and win the narrative that will define the global order."


Interesting that strategic communications/information operations is seen as significant in global grand strategy. Not surprising. Another word is diplomacy.

of the advantages of continuity over time between military leaders and between governments. Military services are big and diverse organizations, with many cultures, and challenges in getting the word out to everyone. Takes time and effort. A service should not be subject to 'too many conning orders.'

Does everyone understand the strategic doctrine, and can use it? How does a service educate (inculcate) its members, and how are a country's politicians, media and general public informed about the strategic doctrine?

Strategy is contextual, varying with time and place, and with the factors of strategy (aim, means, ways). Strategic doctrine varies much slower.

The article author's forthcoming book "Cold Iron: The Demise of Navy Strategy Development and Force Planning" could be interesting reading.

Comment from a colleague: It's an interesting article and comparatively close to the trials that the Royal Canadian Navy has faced for years. Jointness is not an end in itself. Perhaps I have read too many books on strategy, from Clausewitz, Mahan, Corbett, etc., to Paret's "Modern Makers of Strategy" and its thoughts. What always seems to be missed is that the government has told the military force to do something and, at least in the RCN's case, there is a consistent failure to provide a well-thought out plan on how to execute that policy. Indeed, in the RCN's case there has never been a strategy. Jointness, whilst important, is simply part of the ways to an end state - how the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) is going to get to where the government wants it to get to. In reality, the CAF, being a unified force, is for all intents and purposes joint! The failure is that since there are three environments there is a failure to ensure collaborative efforts to ensure that all can act as one force. More now than ever in this era of Great Power competition a military strategy is important. For the RCN, a maritime strategy is even more important now given the state of the navy. How are they going to contribute to an effective fighting force? Can they even be part of a coalition in anything other than providing defence to behind-the-frontlines logistic lines? There has to be some serious thought given to this and how they could possibly build a strategy given the current state of the RCN. Importantly, exposure of issues need to be laid bare to the government, from personnel to material.

Comment: Australian defence has made hard choices. The UK is, too. What about Canada? Actions show intent. The initial fiscal pruning efforts at the CAF/DND, starting in FY 24/25, saw mostly 'ice cube shaving' rather than targeted and/or prioritized cuts. It is easier to make everyone pay than take definitive, and consequential, decisions on funding one area, organization, or capability but not another. Concurrent with pressure to demonstrate spending closer to 2% GDP (hence

big procurement announcements), the first cuts were from the standard pots of 'discretionary' spending: travel budgets and contracting. Pennies in scale to the overall defence budget yet with outsized impacts. As an example, consider Professional Military Education (PME). Travel cuts mean PME is a 'nice to have' when in-person attendance is required in part or in full or travel is built in for experiential learning. Staffing capacity shortfalls saw the use of contractors to shore up gaps for PME execution. Members can't attend, schools can't run courses. Why does this matter? The CAF is trying to modernize and evolve its culture at a time of significant personnel shortages. Members are being pulled up to the next rank with minimum experience to sustain the critical middle echelons. What is one way to compensate for lack of experience? More learning opportunities. When faced with personnel shortages, and operational and strategic challenges, the CAF needs to invest more, not less, in its people. And that means beyond equipment and occupational training. It means time and money on their individual development, instilling the knowledge and institutional stewardship into these cohorts that is needed to move the CAF forward. Doing fewer things better would help in realizing this type of investment. Narrow scope to deepen expertise and professionalism. There is a cost, and risk, in doing so but more of the same and expecting different results also has a cost. To make choices like these, Canada needs a national security strategy that clearly articulates desired outcomes, not shopping lists masquerading as defence policy. See the @RUSI_NS X entry for 25 Nov re: the NSIA and its mandate letter, including a National Security Strategy in 2025. Wonder if that survives a new government. See a counterpoint to this argument at #fleet design. (Also, speaking of choices, see #Canada-US relations.)

Comment: A US perspective but the same conditions exist in Canada: the medical standards at intake are higher than those to stay. There is a cry heard often today against decreasing standards (not just medical, but across the board) as it somehow lessens the quality of CAF members. It rarely is that simple. First, why is the standard what it is? What assumptions lead to that standard? What are the risks and opportunities to changing the standards – not an emotional 'it has always been this

way' but a holistic, bias-aware assessment? A General Officer from CMP, stated in the last year that the standards aren't being lowered but the different lived experiences of people at entry are being considered. The end state remains the same but the pathway to get there may be individualized. Does this take more resources and greater system change – yes. Change is not a zero-cost nor a zero-risk game and these cannot be the assumed constraints when seeking options.



After 80 years it is apparent that Japan and Australia have become strategic friends. The attached article reveals that Japan will begin the training of F35 crews in the northern part of Australia. There has been Japanese army training in the north in recent years, so the expansion is logical. The Chinese will not be amused! Special Note: China is alarmed at a growing level of cooperation between even former enemies such as Australia and Japan but also South Korea and Japan, the US and Vietnam. China counts on being able to deal one on one with vastly weaker countries and therefore have their way. The situation has changed greatly within the past five years. Smaller nations are well aware that they can have back up if required. The Trump administration will take advantage of this new series of facts to create conditions for a favourable US position economically.

Special note: The Australians are much more in touch than their Canadian counterparts. The proposed peace agreement between Ukraine and Russia will merely freeze the situation but allow Russia to rearm; it is another case for "peace in our time." Neville Chamberlain was fully aware of the reality of the situation but knew Britain was in no condition for a fight in 1938. It was an awful decision but one that was necessary from his point of view. The war is not over and will likely reignite in the not-too-distant future, A peace deal is not in Ukraine or Europe's best interest.

Special Note: SCALP and Storm Shadow have been authorized for use inside Russia. Ukraine has made excellent use of these weapons almost immediately. ATACMS has also been authorized against specific targets.

United States

Although the Biden administration is still in place, it is clear the Trump administration is making itself felt around the globe. Canada and Mexico have already been targeted by the new administration for a 25% tariff against all goods crossing the border. In both cases, this will affect the auto industry negatively. It appears that the Trump administration does not have friends, merely other countries that can be useful on a case-by-case basis. It will be an interesting time.

Israel-Iran War

Israel was attacked and is continuing to be attacked by at least seven different entities. Last week the International Criminal Court charged both Benyamin Netanyahu and his former defence Minister Gallant with war crimes. Despite the issue of the various illegal combatant forces using their local populations as human shields. Essentially, the crime is defending the Israeli population from vile attacks. With this logic, one can likely expect President Zelenskiy to be charged soon as well while the attackers go free. Our Prime Minister embarrassed all Canadians by his support of this very one-sided approach. The ICC is not credible.

Moldova

Moldova is fresh off the re-election of a pro-Western President, Maia Sandu. Despite the election win for the presidency, the referendum on the EU was almost too close. Transnistria still is a concern as a separatist entity as is Gagauzia, a pro-Russian part of the country. Russian disinformation campaigns and acts of corruption allegedly by Ilan Shor, head of the Shor Party. He is a convicted felon found guilty of defrauding the central bank of nearly \$1 B USD. Russia has made no secret that Moldova is a target for future efforts to recreate the Russian empire.

Moldova is therefore a key area of interest. Russia's interest or lack thereof will be a strong indicator of future events.

Ukraine has stopped all Russian gas flowing through Ukraine. This stops Transnistria from also getting its subsidized gas. Moldova has been a big user of Russian gas as well but has sought alternative sources from Europe. Russia has offered to use alternate routes including the possibility of using a new Turkish line running through Bulgaria and Romania. The current contract is due to expire at the end of December 2024.

Moldova has signed a security agreement with Britain this week according to Reuters. Britain will provide over 2 M British Pounds for cyber-security and more than 5 M to assist Moldova in keeping over 50 k Ukrainian refugees. France and Romania as well as the EU also have security agreements which help Moldova resist Russian aggression.

Belarus

Belarus opposition leader Sviatlana Tsikhanouskaya was in Canada this week to attend the Halifax International Security Conference and has since traveled to several places in Canada giving interviews and talks about conditions in Belarus. She also gave an interview with the CBC's Nil Koksal on "As it Happens." There is a follow up article by Sheena Goodyear at

Her main message is that the Western democracies cannot negotiate with dictators as the dictators have no intention of honouring the agreement but will use the opportunity to rebuild for further actions. Historically, this was a common approach.

In Belarus, recently, there has been a new crackdown with more than 1600 people being arrested for relatively minor infractions against the regime. The regime seems to be preparing the ground for the next "election." The last election took place in 2020, which was largely considered fraudulent and corrupt. It did result in massive demonstrations which for a short period appeared to be working until Russia provided back up to Belarus security forces. 2025 will see another election; its results are already considered complete long before the charade of democracy. Many Western countries do not accept the 2020 results including Canada.

Georgia

The government party, Georgian Dream has found itself facing huge demonstrations throughout the country. They have been accused of rigging the last election by the opposition. Georgian Dream is considered pro-Russian and does not have the support of the general public. The President, Salome Zourbichvili, does not support the government and the demonstrations are continuing. The party is funded by an oligarch, Bedzina Ivanishvili, who made his money in Russia. He is generally thought to be the main figure behind the pro-Russian stance of the Georgian Dream party. It is thought that he favoured a more balanced approach

with Moscow at the same time pursuing opportunities to join both the EU and NATO. From the general public's point of view, he is a Russian. It is expected that demonstrations will continue, the majority do not wish to return to Georgia being a vassal state of Russia.

Abkhazia's separatist government fell after they attempted to place pro-Russian legislation in place which the locals view as an attempt to create conditions for Russian full control of the breakaway republic. The fall of the government is a problem for Russia as it is where the new base for the Black Sea Fleet is located. Having a hostile population surrounding their new base is a major complication. Russia will have to do something to sort the matter out. A second front in Georgia and Abkhazia is not wanted. Still, they cannot allow an insurrection as it may be a catalyst for further separatist outbreaks across Russia.

The Ukraine-Russia War

The war continues as a slow slog through towns and villages and increasingly impassable fields as the weather changes to a winter pattern. Casualties are high on both sides. The biggest change is that both sides are moving to the skies with ever increasing numbers of ballistic and cruise missiles and drones to inflict damage deep into each other's rear areas. Ukraine has just received permission to use longer range missiles inside Russia and were quick to take advantage of the new capability.

The target set for the two countries varies with Russia aiming at deep infrastructure and power production facilities. Ukraine has been preparing for having the ability to strike well inside Russia with more than 200 identified targets within range. These include ammunition depots, air fields, transportation hubs, oil storage facilities, oil refineries, troop training facilities, naval targets, factories producing material for Russia's war effort etc. This is likely the main form of combat for the foreseeable future as the ground becomes largely impassable.

Russia is in trouble. It has been unable to produce sufficient troops to replace its casualties. It has made a deal with the North Korean regime of Kim Jong-Un for equipment, troops and ammunition. Still Russia is suffering horrific troop losses, with one estimate of Russian forces losing seven times their Ukrainian counterparts. Russia is also unable to replace the large number of armoured vehicles and has virtually emptied all thirteen major depots around the country and the problem of production of new vehicles is slow due to the lack of access to the necessary chips and other equipment needed for modern combat vehicles.

Ukraine certainly has a manpower problem; its casualties are high as well. They have been able to survive and, in some cases, push back at the local level. The incursion into Kursk has been successful in drawing off Russian forces and now North Korean troops. North Korea is a bit of a wild card as estimates of their participation run from 11 k to as high as 100 k although not all at once. This new source of troops has not been decisive at this point. The real question is whether Russia will introduce new mobilization orders. This is a move that will not go over well with the population especially as the citizens of Russia are now seeing

Ukrainian attacks well inside Russia. They are increasingly aware that the war is not going well. Is the elite aware of the potential for the threat of regime change?

Some leaders in the West are hoping for a ceasefire which will leave Russia largely in possession of Ukrainian territory. This would be a "peace in our time moment." It will reward the Russian regime for its intransigence. As mentioned in the Belarus note, dictators cannot be negotiated with, they are by nature, deceptive. They have their own agenda, and it is not one that will benefit democracies. There should be no ceasefire, and sanctions should be increased and further restrictions placed on Russia and its supporters. There should be no doubt of the desired outcome and survival of the Putin regime should not be guaranteed.

Russia's economy continues to deteriorate with inflation and a limit to how much more the interest rate can be raised. The central bank of Russia has a very tiny space to do any further adjustments. Today, the Ruble hit its lowest point to date, 109 Rubles to the US dollar, a far cry from the 62 Rubles to the dollar at the start of the war. Three refineries have had to close as they are no longer economically viable. Russia's refinery capacity continues to fail due to poor maintenance, sanctions and damage from Ukrainian missiles and drones. It will only get worse as the war continues.

China

China's economy is continuing to deteriorate. This does not mean it is about to collapse, but it is affecting foreign investment and employment throughout the country. The country has seen the collapse of the property development sector which has had a "knock on effect" on local government's which have lost their main source of income from the sale of land.

The economy has also been rocked by Communist Chinese Party policies that 'attacked" the private sector. They did so, to ensure the private sector did not become a second pole of influence in competition with the Party. Jack Ma became a target after he directly criticized the CCP financial regulatory organization. Retaliation was swift as Jack Ma disappeared for several months. Other actions followed, such as new regulations on the private education sector, the tech sector, auto and solar sectors. These were areas that new university graduates generally used to start their careers. Unemployment skyrocketed in this demographic.

China's predicament is that by attacking these areas and placing more controls effectively on national security regulations, it has also badly damaged its own economy in the view of investors. The CCP has stated these regulations are to provide stability to the market and provide protection to investors and foreign companies. This view is not shared by that group, and they are removing their money as foreign investment now flows out of the country and foreign companies close their factories.

Two issues are now coming forward. Mass killings by disgruntled citizens including using a vehicle as a weapon killing 35 and injuring nearly a hundred folks as well as several knife attacks. These have entered the net and have grown a wide audience even if authorities have cracked down on such postings. The authorities

have done their best to contain the issue and are often successful in containing the event to a specific province while removing the information. This apparently has been somewhat less than successful, and the words of these events are circulating.

The second is the decoupling of the West from China. Although China has tried to make their system better for foreign firms, it is clear that sanction fears are growing. The incoming Trump administration has every intention of imposing further tariffs on China and firms using China as a base of operations for production. Fears of these tariffs are also seeing companies leave China to set up new production facilities in countries that are less of a problem including Vietnam and India as examples.

Chinese authorities have one of the most effective censoring systems anywhere in the world, yet even now there are gaps to their ability to control this information. It is not a perfect system despite its pervasiveness.

China is in a difficult place at present. There are an increasing number of media reports that Xi Jinping has had his ability to control the working of the party questioned. No one since Mao has had the same levers of power given to him. Questions about the necessity of this total power in the party are now being questioned. The CCP is not monolithic and there are factions based mainly on "clan" that control various parts of the country including sectors such as agriculture, the AI, solar, geographic or financial sectors or a combination. Is Xi in trouble? Certainly, his anti-corruption campaign has eliminated rivals but now that Xi appointments are now being arrested for their transgressions as well also makes him vulnerable to the same corruption charges potentially.

So, what now? Most authoritarians in trouble can find an outside "enemy" such as say Taiwan to occupy the interest of the masses. This requires timing and a generally favourable view of the leader's motives. Will it work for Xi? It may be too late and Xi's opportunity to find an outside enemy may have passed and rival factions may be gaining a more favourable footing. It is hard to verify this situation, but recent events seem to show that Xi has less ability to affect the situation, including the military and security forces. China has issues that are still under the facade of normal life but there are undercurrents. How serious these under currents are, is another question.
