



The *Admiral Markarov* is the third ship in the Admiral Grigorovich-class frigate class. This class was supposed to be six strong and apparently stationed in the Black Sea Fleet. The frigates were supposed to use Ukrainian built turbines...that is until someone thought it was a good idea to attack a friend and neighbour. As a result, the *Admiral Markarov* may be somewhat different than her sister ships, the *Admiral Grigorovich* and the *Admiral Essen* in regard to propulsion plant. The first two ships received the proven Ukrainian turbines; the *Admiral Markarov* may have something different such as Chinese built turbines although this is not confirmed.

Ukraine and Russia do have some relations. One of these is for Ukraine to build turbines for export warships, in the case Grigorovich-class frigates the Indian Navy. Ukraine will not build turbines for Russian ships.

An interesting turn of events as one watches for the *Markarov's* maintenance while on operations in the Med.

Naval and air drills will be held in Mediterranean on permanent basis, says defense chief

The Defence Chief is Sergei Shoigu, the Russian Minister of Defence who announced this programme of drills on 2 November 2018. Russia has shown tremendous determination to continue a long term naval presence with sufficient firepower to support Bashir Al Assad's forces (along with more effective allied forces such as the Iranians and their underlings, Hezbollah).

The bottom line is that Russia isn't certain of an ultimate Syrian regime success. Both Turkey and the US (and the Kurds) have caused concern as to their longer term goals in Syria. How far can Russia go to support the Assad regime? Would it be willing to incur Turkish casualties or US casualties? The jury is out on that issue and how far would they go to protect the regime if the actions of the regime are contrary to Russian Government goals such as attacking Turkish positions in the North of Syria. Russia has spent a lot of lives on this war, admittedly mostly "civilian" contractors vice military personnel, and considerable economic resources at a time when Russia can ill afford the expenses. The war is also losing support of the general public in recent polls by the Levada Institute.

The other wild card is the US elections. What if Trump decides to take a lesson from Putin and decides to take action in Syria to make himself look more effective?

Time as always will tell, but the word "permanent" may be ill-advised at this point.

Sixth Arctic and offshore patrol ship about readiness, not fairness, experts say

The article correctly notes that the Arctic and Offshore Patrol Vessels (AOPV) being built under the Arctic and Offshore Patrol Ship (sic, singular) project can be employed anywhere in the world. Canada, with three long coasts and two widely separated naval bases, faces an obvious geographical challenge operating ships in its own waters, especially the North and Arctic. Numbers of ships help address that challenge - having six large patrol vessels reduces the demand on frigates, more expensive to operate. It cannot be presumed that three AOPV will be based at each of the Royal Canadian Navy's (RCN) two main bases, one each on the east and west coasts, nor do they need to be.

Though the article calls the AOPV icebreakers the RCN has been careful not to highlight that capability. The Canadian Coast Guard has the icebreaking mandate.

It will be interesting to see what the shipbuilder does to address the remaining 'shipbuilding gap.' That responsibility is primarily the builder's. The aim of the Canadian National Shipbuilding Strategy is to re-invigorate the industry. The government set the conditions for that renewal but it is not up to government to keep providing federal ship contracts to keep the years full. So hopefully rumours of foreign sales by Irving will come true.

Russia finds alternative to sunken floating dock for naval ships




The docks the Russians "found" will not work for the *Kunetzov*. The docks are too small - they can fit battle cruisers and the rest of the fleet but not the aircraft carrier. The PD 50 dock was the largest available to Russia, but it is old and likely poorly maintained to begin with as it too was part of the old Soviet infrastructure. The current regime is unlikely to expend the funds to purchase a new dock, if they can find one, or build a new dock. What will this mean to the long-term use of *Kunetzov*? It suspected that *Kunetzov* is unlikely to be in use anytime in the near term and possibly for good.

Russia, contrary to popular belief, is becoming five regional navies. Even Russia's vaunted submarine fleet is generally Soviet-era vessels that have been modernised. The new Borei-class ballistic missile submarines (four so far) have had considerable teething problems including its main weapons system, the Bulava missile. The first of the Yassin-class submarines has only just launched. Russia still maintains the old Oscar II, several Victor III, the Akula-class of which there is reportedly only five in

operation (one being leased to India) and of course the six Delta IV. The actual newest submarines are the improved Kilo-class, based on a 1970s design but highly updated. Can they put them to sea? Likely, but maintenance again will be a deciding factor. Russia's navy is rapidly becoming the Potemkin Village - looks great but longer term and in reality mere shell.

#### 100th anniversary of the armistice

Extract from speech by Colonel K.E. Osmond, Commander, 5th Canadian Division Support Group, at the Annual Veterans' Dinner 2018, Oromocto Legion, 4 November 2018. *Prepared by staff including a RUSI(NS) member*.

As you know, this year marks the 100th anniversary of the armistice that ended one of the bloodiest conflicts in history.

Veterans who fought in battles, spent time away from loved ones while abroad, and manned the home front, have the right to feel pride in the magnitude of what they were able to accomplish, much like Canadians feel pride in them, and are thankful to them.

It can be argued, that the proud and diverse Canada we know today, emerged from the First World War.

You see, the Canadian Corps was unique.

Unlike most of the British Corps who cycled through various divisions, we fought together, and formed our world famous comradery.

The Canadian Corps and their supporting troops learned to work seamlessly together to improve combat effectiveness.

Their cohesion and stability bred a sense of identity and national pride among both soldiers and civilians.

At the beginning of the war, recruitment was very narrow.

In 1914, strict medical exams required a potential soldier to be white, at least 5 feet 3 inches tall and between 18 and 45 years old.

Good eyesight, arched feet and healthy teeth were essential. Because of the initial surge of recruits, many eager volunteers were turned down. Upon their rejection, some gap-toothed soldiers remarked that they wanted to "Fight Germans, not Bite them."

At that time, recruiters rejected most visible minorities. They denied the applications of Aboriginal, Black and Asian Canadian volunteers.

Racist feelings ran deep and the early war effort overseas would be carried out largely by white Canadians.

But as the war continued, recruiting centers were forced to broaden the margins and let minorities join in.

Highly decorated Aboriginal war heroes emerged as snipers and scouts.

The No. 2 Construction Battalion, made up of mostly African Canadians, conducted extraordinary operations including building roads and bridges and defusing land mines so advancing troops could move forward, as well as bringing out the wounded.

By 1917, the government took a more active role in recruitment as a response to the need for more personnel.

Indigenous agents held recruiting events on reserves to encourage more First Nations members to enlist.

It was at that time that bonds formed between people from all over Canada...

... from different walks of life...

...different cultures...

...different ethnicities.

We stood as one.

Notwithstanding the social and political challenges of the post-war years, most Canadians emerged from the struggle believing the magnitude of their accomplishments were achieved together in unity, despite any cultural differences.

This war marked a beginning.

For the first time, Canada stood on the international stage as an independent nation.

The Canadian Corps attained a first-class reputation as one of the most effective formations on the Western Front.

100 years have now passed, and their legacy lives on.

But the glorious stories of great battles and heroes have come at great cost.

Our population was only eight million then.

Still, some 650,000 men and women signed up to serve in uniform.

Of those, 66,000 gave their lives and more than 172,000 were wounded.

Close to 46,000 Canadians were killed or wounded during the last 100 days.

Canada has a proud and rich history built on their shoulders of people like those soldiers, airmen and women.

Brave, and courageous; willing, at any cost, to protect Canadian values, their comrades, and the people they love.

However...

...long-term stress and trauma takes a toll on our health, both physical and mental.

War can change people.

At that time, doctors knew very little of what we now term Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

In fact, we are still learning about the effects of trauma and long-term stress.

Mental health issues have taken on many names since the dawn of time but in the end, invisible wounds are difficult to diagnose.

According to a Stats Canada study on mental health in 2013, about 1 in 6 full-time Regular Force members of the Canadian Armed Forces reported symptoms of at least one of the following disorders: major depressive episode, panic disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder, generalized anxiety disorder, and alcohol abuse or dependence.

Post-traumatic stress disorder and panic disorder were twice as high among Regular Force members who had been deployed in support of the mission in Afghanistan compared to those who had not.

Depression was the most common among Regular Force members and they had higher rates of depression and generalized anxiety disorder than the general Canadian population.

Why am I mentioning this, you might ask?

Because military populations are at potential risk of mental health problems since the nature of our work involves exposure to trauma, separation from family, frequent moves and stressful living conditions.

We, in the Canadian Armed Forces, have come a long way in identifying and establishing the services and programs our ill and injured members need...

... but we recognize there is a lot more work to be done.

Our leadership continues to work with its partners to ensure that our members and their families receive the support they need...

... and have access to the full range of care, compensation and benefits available to them.

We owe this to our people.

Every man and woman who willingly serves their community and country deserves an accepting environment in which they are treated with respect and dignity, no matter what their injury or health condition.

This we can all agree on.

That fight will not be over until each and every one of us feels comfortable reaching out for help when we need it.
