

A Government of the Oblivious

"Canadian Students Urged to Study in China despite Kovrig and Spavor's Arrest" is an article by Michael Blanchfield of the National Post dated 22 February 2019 and shows that Global Affairs Canada has not learned that China has changed and returned to an older form of government, more akin to Mao than Deng. Essentially, Global Affairs wants more Canadian students to attend schools in China and to increase our individual interactions with China. This seems short sighted at best under the present circumstances, as noted by David Mulroney in the article. Mr Mulroney is a former Ambassador to China and he has issues with the attitude in Global Affairs, as one sees in reading the article.

The constant refrain that China is too big to ignore and that we need to interact at the individual level wears thin when the state you are dealing with is essentially a "mafia state" with little or no regard to the "rule of law." Does Canada wish to support cultural genocide such as is occurring to occupied Tibet and East Turkestan, invaded by the People's Republic in 1950? Surely concentration camps should be enough to bring us back to reality when dealing with China. Global Affairs cannot bring itself to understand that China is changing rapidly and not for the better. Under President Xi, there have been major crackdowns on ethnic groups, political rivals, religious denominations, human rights activists, lawyers, and journalists as well as blatant action against China's smaller neighbours. China has changed, but Global Affairs still has on rose-coloured glasses. Things between Canada and China are not normal now, as one seen by hostile action taken by China against Canadian citizens and businesses. Canada is a target for China. China will continue its actions to separate one of the key opposition groups, the Five Eyes community.

China has been conducting what is essentially an information warfare campaign against Canada. Just examine the interview given on 19 January 2019 by the Chinese Ambassador in relation to Huawei. In this interview the Ambassador belittled Canada's judicial process and made a wide ranging series of threats if Huawei was excluded from Canadian telecoms' modernization to a 5G configuration. At least two Canadian telecoms have made major investments using telecommunications equipment of an adversary, one taking aggressive action against Canadian citizens. One telecom, Telus, has made representations to the effect that Huawei's equipment is essential in order to roll out 5G as early as possible. Bell has made comments that though it will delay introduction of a 5G network through the loss of Huawei equipment, it would not be a major blow to the overall project. As stated before by RUSI(NS), private companies do not have the responsibility for national security, it is the Government of Canada. There is no way Canada can guarantee the security of Huawei equipment whilst that company is under the very real power of the Communist Chinese Party (CCP). It is the ability to exert coercive pressure on companies to work on behalf of Chinese intelligence agencies or face extreme punishment that should raise questions as to the safety of using not only Huawei's equipment but that of any other Chinese manufacturers of telecom equipment. This issue is the real question: can we trust the CCP? The answer at this point is no.

NRU Asterix helps warships flex their naval might

Canadian military public affairs staff have routinely been using the term NRU Asterix in a fashion that can be confusing to readers. NRU is the Royal Canadian Navy's Naval Replenishment Unit which generates detachments of RCN sailors to operate equipment aboard MV (Motor Vessel) ASTERIX, a civil ship that has been converted and leased to serve as a replenishment oiler for the RCN. Sometimes reporting appears to refer to the oiler as NRU Asterix. That is a result on military reporting focusing on the RCN people of the NRU. It is the oiler, master and crewed by civilians, which is MV ASTERIX.

The Kremlin Hierarchy Is Fast Decaying

Problems at the Top?

The article "The Kremlin Hierarchy is Fast Decaying" in the Moscow Times written by Tatyana Stanovaya on 22 February 2019 is an interesting portrayal of the Putin regime. Keep in mind it is open source, but it fits with recent other stories. In the article the author comments on attacks on previously impervious targets. As an example, Mr Putin's chief spokesman, Dimitry Peskov, is mentioned in the article as one now under attack. On 26 February, in another Moscow Times article called "Putin Spokesman Downplays Daughter's Internship at EU Parliament"

(https://www.themoscowtimes.com/2019/02/26/putin-spokesman-brushes-off-criticism-of-daughtersinternship-eu-parliament-a64625), Mr Peskov's daughter, Yelizaveta Peskova, is being attacked for accepting a position as an intern in France at a right wing party. Again, Mr Peskov, who until now has had the support of President Putin. He is just one individual but the first article includes many key members of the Putin regime who have previously untouched by the media.

The Putin regime has been increasingly unpopular. President Putin has been aloof from internal affairs and spends more time on external matters at the expense of his base. This is not a winning formula in the long term. Recent changes to pensions and running a major surplus while the country as a whole stagnates is not going to play out well. Russia is currently running the surplus while services to the public deteriorate. Demonstrations are increasingly common and there have been violent attacks on security services that have gone unmentioned in the Western press. At the moment none of these demonstrations, etc., show the "fall" of the Putin regime, but it does appear to make it seem more vulnerable than anytime since demonstrations in 2011 against Mr Putin.

Another interesting article was written for the Moscow Times called "Surkov Hints Putin Himself is No Longer Essential for the System to Persevere" (<u>https://www.themoscowtimes.com/2019/02/12/surkov-hints-putin-himself-no-longer-essential-for-the-system-to-persevere-a64471</u>) by Mark Geoleotti on 12 February 2019. In the article, Mr Geoleotti talks about Vladislav Surkov, who can be equated as the "philosopher" of the Putin regime. Many of the terms used by the regime were developed by him such

as "sovereign democracy" to explain the current structure of the Russian system of government. He is, in other words, the inner brain of the regime. The final couple lines of the article are the most interesting as they state: "Rather, that this bellwether of the Kremlin is willing to broach transition in a context that suggests that Putin himself is no longer essential. Bit by bit, he is being turned from a president to a precedent, from hetman to history."

While these three articles are by no means an indicator of an imminent decline of the Russian system, they do point to an increasing level of criticism of the regime that has not been there since 2011. There are other articles within other parts of Russian media that also show a new willingness to report on critical issues such as foreign interventions. It is worth watching and being aware of the issues facing the current regime. Russia still has the largest number of nuclear weapons in the world and thus should not and cannot be ignored. High level maneuvering within the regime may not bode well.

The Article Misses the Point

In the Global Times 26 February 2019 there is an article by Wang Wenwen called "Scholarly Article Documents Western Stereotype of China" that misses the point about the West's view of China. In paragraph 4 of the article the author brushes over the problems of the West's view of China's human rights and specifies that this is mainly a Western media issue. China cannot be ignored nor should it, but the reason for not ignoring it is because of its actions against the West as a whole and at the moment against Canada in particular.

Mr Wang tends to forget to mention the following issues that also disturb the West and are not simple misunderstandings but deliberate and ongoing acts of the Communist Chinese Party (CCP) that show they are untrustworthy. "Minor" issues like corporate espionage, intellectual property theft, lack of rule of law, cyber-warfare, unfair business practices, cultural genocide against Tibet and East Turkestan, ongoing bullying of their neighbours, arbitrary arrest of Western visitors on trumped up charges, attacks on the legal and governance system in many countries including Canada, and the list of CCP actions could continue. So where is the misunderstanding here? The West seems to understand the current CCP regime very well indeed in most cases. In the West there are those who put profit over anything else. Such as seen in recent Telus comments on Huawei.

The article is quite right to point out the lack of Western connections and scholarship. This is a problem as it does prevent a view into China that is appropriate. China has more than 140,000 students in Canada. Canada has few in China and growing smaller due to Chinese actions. There is a need for Canadians and others to gain further insight into the Chinese regime and to fully understand its actions. There is a strong requirement for linguists and Chinese specialists, especially for organizations such as CSIS, the RCMP, CSE, and the military all of which will be needed to counter CCP actions in the future.

As commented on in previous RUSI(NS) Facebook and *Dispatches* articles, China uses its international student population to stifle opposition in other countries.

The time has come for Canada to make some decisions. These types of actions by China will grow as seen in Australia and New Zealand. China will use any pressure it can to separate potential opponents, which is why China reacted so badly to Canada calling for international support against the unlawful and arbitrary arrests of Michael Spavor and Michael Kovrig. Keep in mind both Canadians are undergoing what is considered torture and that Michael Kovrig is apparently being questioned about his time as a diplomat, which is not how civilized "rule of law" countries conduct themselves. In Canada, we do not have the necessary security forces to deal with the Chinese threat to our way of life. The Chinese Ambassador has made outrageous comments about Canada and its legal system, at bare minimum he should be asked to leave immediately as being no longer acceptable to Canada. He has obviously not provided (using the Chinese normal commentary) correct advice and comment. Anyone reading the Chinese press will be familiar with those words. The correct view of course is the Chinese Communist Party's (CCP) view, which of course has little to do with reality.

Canada needs to deal realistically with the CCP. It is a truly corrupt organization and all dealings with it should be conducted with that in mind. The CCP rules by whim and fiat. No agreement can be guaranteed under the circumstances. Thus any agreements should be limited and carefully crafted to prevent any "extortion" attempt by the CCP. Investment should be limited and as a minimum any agreement must be examined for second and third order effects.

Any consideration of Chinese equipment in key infrastructure should be curtailed. China has consistently proven itself untrustworthy. The Canadian government needs to ignore calls for greater "buy into" Chinese business opportunities such as Huawei and other Chinese ventures that result in a majority Chinese investment as it will give China too much leverage. Any treaty that was negotiated by our previous government such as under Mr Harper under different Chinese leadership should be cancelled as soon as possible.

China is an adversary and needs to be treated as such before we get too much further in their influence.

Surely, the Ambassador knows people have escaped to tell a much different story, that of punishment







INSTITUTIONS

NAC North Atlantic Council: Brings together all of NATO's 28 members, decisions are taken by inter-governmental consensus

FNC Framework Nations Concept: Forms part of broader idea to strengthen the "European Pillar" of NATO, e.g. by pooling and sharing military capabilities

CSDP Common Security and Defence Policy: Inter-governmental framework for military cooperation housed within EU foreign policy structures, part of broader international security policies

PESCO Permanent Structured Cooperation: A legal mechanism to allow a smaller group of EU countries cooperate more closely together on military matters, may be triggered during 2017

2016 PROPOSALS + PLANS

Schengen Zone for NATO: Freedom of movement for soldiers and military equipment across NATO internal borders, an idea supported by US Army Europe & others

Strengthening NATO's "European Pillar": Europeans to take on more of NATO's military burdens, such as meeting NATO's 2% of GDP spending goal – highlighted in July German White Paper

EU-NATO Joint Declaration: A cooperation program agreed at the July NATO Warsaw summit, 40+ proposals in 7 areas such as migration, cyber, hybrid threats, exercises etc.

EUGS EU Global Strategy: A document published in June outlining the objectives of EU foreign and security policies, drafted by EU HR/VP Mogherini

Strategic Trends 2017 (Center for Security Studies, ETH Zurich)

EDAP European Defense Action Plan: December Proposals to augment financing of military research and joint equipment programs, and opening up national defense markets, presented by the European Commission

SDIP Security and Defense Implementation Plan: Follow-on document to EUGS focusing on security and defense aspects approved in December, drafted by EU HR/VP Mogherini

European Security Compact: A June Franco-German call to beef up the EU's contribution to international security and improve EU's ability to tackle internal security threats

ESDU European Security and Defense Union: A long-term goal to create a common defense for the EU, proposed in July German White Paper

Schengen of Defense: An August Italian proposal for a permanent multinational European force outside institutional structures but available to EU/NATO/UN.

Letter of Four: An October Franco-German-Italian-Spanish call for exploring the use of the PESCO mechanism in the EU treaties

OTHER FORMATS

Bilateral: Examples include Franco-British, German-Dutch Regional: Examples include Nordic, Benelux, Visegrad

Multinational: Examples include the European Air Transport Command, Eurocorps

Ad Hoc: Examples include military operations like current one against Daesh
