Adequate National Defence-Help Wanted: A For-Real Architect

response to our and others' submissions to *The Defence of Canada Review Panel*. Our own eleven-page tome went out to them on May 8th of <u>last year</u>, Trudeau's reaction is not encouraging. Plain and simple: he's sloughing it off! Defence Minister Sajjan did address "insiders" at a 3 May meeting sponsored by CDA, but was not & is not at all impressive. He acknowledges CAF is in dire straits, but focused on apportioning blame anywhere but within his own government. The reality though is Defence just isn't a Liberal priority; it's not soft enough for any <u>serious</u> new money. As of today (19th May) smoke screens and dithering continues the norm at the confluence of the Ottawa and Rideau waterways.

Financial gurus are projecting the Federal National Debt will rise anew by almost \$30 Billion, just this year, set to reach the \$720 Billion total mark in 2019, when the current Trudeau Government is scheduled to leave office. Servicing our existing National Debt this year alone will cost the taxpayers between \$29

and \$30 Billion. That's just about double what will be spent on National Defence this same year...which is about half of what we should

be investing in our Armed Forces (CAF). I leafed back through my Musings Columns, rediscovering that I've beat-the-drum on inadequate funding on Defence five times in 15 months. Like some of the Blue Jays, I'm zero for five times up-to-bat. Arguing for just adequate spending on National Defence is a classic example of trying to roll a big bolder up a steep hill.

At \$15.5 Billion, we are only achieving 1 % of GDP spending on National Defence, half of the goal set for us by NATO. That's roughly fourth or 5th from the bottom in NATO. Even more embarrassing is our per capita spending (PCS) on defence. At \$477, our PCS pales compared to the Dutch at \$760; the Danes & Luxembourgers at \$800; the French at \$1000; the Brits at about \$1100; Greece & Norway at about \$1200 each; and, the Americans at \$1900, all PCS. No wonder Trump is so quick to be PO'd with his perception of us as freeloaders. Even neutral Sweden and Finland do better than we do, while Australia's PCS is almost twice ours.

Let me be fair in my criticism; Liberal inertia today merely perpetuates that of the Conservative, Liberal and Progressive-Conservative Governments that preceded Trudeau the Second. Egged on by the Greens and the Social Democrats, Canadians live in a dream world of absolute denial when it comes to National Defence. They simply do not realize or simply will not accept that *Peace* in Our Time has again slipped away from us. The United Nations has turned out to be as hollow, feeble and as ineffective as was its League Nations predecessor. If anything, the UN is even more bloated.

The vast majority of Canadians are preoccupied with getting their share of our pampered publicly

funded way-of-life...free or subsidized health care; a car for everybody in the family who can drive; more and more asphalt to accommodate those cars; low or no-cost schooling right through to university; publicly-funded day care; increasing public funding for the marginalized; and, the seemingly mindless entitlement that encourages the vulgar chowing-down at the public trough that goes on and on today. The conditions of selfreliance & self-sufficiency that marked the way most of us were raised have been washed away in waves of entitled expectations. Few Canadians today grasp the simple reality that from here on... it's downhill for the Western Way of Life, an eclipse of the largess on which we have come to rely since the end of the Second World War.

In my year-long Confluence Series, I tried to sketch that gloomy picture for you. But, most Canadians simply neither see, nor hear, nor want to be bothered about anything that seems likely to upset their day. Even the few who even think seriously about National Defence, haven't hoisted in the fact that the next big war will be won or lost in the first thirty to 60 days. There will be no time for recruiting and mobilization, or, for laying the hulls of ships we don't have now, or, building the 4th and 5th Generation aircraft our most likely enemies are already flying. Oh, the wars will drag on into months & years, but, will do so simply because we and our allies were not ready or smart enough to discourage and prevent those coming wars in the first place. The other reality is no one, but no one, wins the Big War, once it gets going. In the absence of meaningful deterrence, we all

Canada needs to seriously launch itself into a readiness mode. It will take a commitment to **progressively double our defence budget beyond inflation**. That won't be accomplished overnight. DND, CAF and our personnel & resource production systems just couldn't absorb & spend that kind of money. But, it simply has to happen with a **degree of real urgency**. Time for kitting-out CAF has run out. Members of our Institute have seen the similar recommendations on the part of the Senate of Canada. Their Report was an excellent one. Pity, though! Most Canadians won't read

F-35 jets waiting in wings as Liberals' 'interim' Super Hornet purchase in limbo

OTTAWA — The federal government's suggestion it may trash plans to buy "interim" fighter jets from aerospace giant Boeing Co. may open up a window for F-35 producer Lockheed Martin Corp. to swoop into.

Boeing convinced the U.S. Commerce Department and International Trade Commission this week to launch an investigation into much-subsidized Montreal-based Bombardier Inc. for "dumping" commercial airplanes into the U.S. market — a dispute overshadowed by an impending renegotiation of the North American Free Trade Agreement.

Foreign Affairs Minister Chrystia Freeland's subsequent chastening and promise Thursday to review military procurement involving Boeing leaves in limbo Canada's purchase of 18 Super Hornet jets, a deal expected to cost \$5 billion to \$7 billion.



A spokeswoman for Lockheed Martin — which, meanwhile, is partnering with Bombardier on a U.S. Air Force procurement — reacted Friday, saying the company "would openly welcome discussions about interim fighter solutions."

Still, said Cindy Tessier, "it would be inappropriate for Lockheed Martin to comment directly on a matter between the Government of Canada and another company."
